

For our Elders



Uncle Terry Denzil is Alexandria Park Community School

Uncle Terry was a highly respected, and passionate Elder who worked relentlessly on behalf of his Community to ensure culturally nourishing schooling for over 30 years.

When Cleveland Street High School, Redfern, Waterloo and Alexandria Public Schools closed, Uncle Terry was the lead spokesperson who argued with the NSW government for the need for a school in the local area. As a result of his voice and leadership APCS was created.

After wide community consultation, recognition and honour was given to Uncle Terry when the school gymnasium was named after him.

For decades Uncle Terry shared his extensive knowledge and understanding of Aboriginal histories, culture and experiences of Aboriginal people with local schools, ensuring that school leaders, staff, students and parents have access to high quality Cultural awareness learning opportunities.

As a Cultural mentor to APCS Uncle Terry was the linchpin in forming relationships with local Aboriginal organisations and families ensuring that APCS had authentic programs. He supported an ongoing commitment to increasing knowledge and understanding of Aboriginal histories, culture and experiences of Aboriginal people.

Uncle Terry sought knowledge and permission from Cadigal man Shayne Beckham to work with the school leadership team to name school buildings and significant spaces. Uncle Terry was the visionary for a P-12 school, which could cater to the educational needs of the local communities of Redfern, Alexandria and Waterloo.

As a lifelong local resident, Uncle Terry's children attended APCS and Cleveland Street High School and his wife Lorraine worked for many years as a SAO at schools in the local area including Cleveland Street.

Uncle Terry's passion, drive and commitment to ensuring the highest quality public education for his local community at both APCS and Green Square School, was honoured in the 10th birthday celebrations of APCS when the indoor basketball arena was named in his honour. "The Denzil".

As a member of the Board of the Aboriginal Education Union, with close links to the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Lands Council, Terry supported strong authentic links between the Aboriginal Community Organisations and APCS. Long-time coach of APCS basketball teams, his philosophy of sport brought students together regardless of skill level, cultural background or experience.

Uncle Terry will always be an integral part of our school, through his support of its students, staff and community members by talking to them passionately and honestly about the legacy being created and paying respect to traditional owners.

Behaviour Code

In NSW Public School Students are Expected To:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members.
- ✓ Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers.
- ✓ Strive for the highest standards in learning.
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members.
- ✓ Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly.
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code.
- ✓ Attend school every day (unless legally excused).
- ✓ Respect all property.
- ✓ Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools.
- ✓ Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools.

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

Positive Behaviour For Learning

At APCS, we have a Positive Behaviour for Learning Student Management system. Our PBL system is underpinned by the following values:

- √ Be a Learner
- ✓ Be Respectful
- ✓ Be Safe

PBL encourages positive behaviour between students and between staff and students to improve their self-concept and motivation to learn. PBL operates as a systemic umbrella for a broad range of programs in schools, including values education, anti-bullying and learning support teams. This model is applied across all years of schooling, 7–12, and all curriculum areas. All classrooms and learning spaces should display the APCS Positive Behaviour for Learning posters.

Alexandria Park Community School Rules and Expectations

At APCS all students are expected to:

- ✓ Attend school every day, unless they are legally excused, and be in class on time and prepared to learn.
- Maintain a neat appearance, including adhering to the requirements of the school's uniform policy.
- ✓ Behave safely, considerately and responsibly, including when travelling to and from school.
- ✓ Show respect at all times for teachers, other school staff and helpers, including following class rules, speaking courteously and cooperating with instructions and learning activities.
- ✓ Treat one another with dignity and respect.
- Care for property belonging to themselves, the school and others.

Behaviour that infringes on the safety of others, such as harassment, bullying and illegal or anti-social behaviour of any kind, will not be tolerated. Repeated misbehavior will result in formal disciplinary action, which may result in suspension and in extreme cases, expulsion.

Behaviour Code

Reward System for Positive Behaviour

At APCS, we use a reward system where students are given 'Deadlies' for showing the PBL values of 'Be A Learner, Be Respectful & Be Safe'.

Deadlies are accumulated by individual students and students are able to participate in 'achievers' excursions' if they reach a particular count of Deadlies.

Students may be given verbal praise, positive acknowledgement, merit awards or letter of commendation to reinforce the PBL values.

Anti-Bullying Policy

We work hard to prevent bullying in our school, and we recognise that the best outcomes are achieved by school communities, parents, students and teachers, working together to help prevent and respond to bullying.

Our Anti-Bullying Plan includes protection, prevention, early intervention and response strategies for student bullying. Any student who experiences bullying and any person who witnesses bullying should report it to a teacher or the school principal.

Bullying is repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or group towards one or more persons.

Bullying is an abuse of power. It can involve individuals or groups and it can be planned or thoughtless.

Cyberbullying refers to bullying through information and communication technologies.

Bullying can involve humiliation, domination, intimidation, victimisation and all forms of harassment including that based on appearance, sex, race, disability, homosexuality or transgender.

Bullying of any form or for any reason can have long term effects on those involved including bystanders.

Everyone in the school should be aware of the indication of potential bullying and should act in response to these situations.

Students are required to:

- ✓ Follow the DEC and APCS 'Behaviour Code for Students' which states that students are not to bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our school.
- Report incidences of bullying to a staff member.
- Work with staff and other students to resolve the situation.

Attendance

Regular Attendance

Regular attendance at school is essential if students are to maximise their potential. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Schools, in providing a caring teaching and learning environment, which address the learning and support needs of the students, including those with additional learning and support needs or complex health conditions, fosters students' sense of worth and belonging to the school community.

Students are required to attend school on each day the school is open. Regular attendance is essential to gain maximum benefit from schooling and parents should ensure that no days are missed unnecessarily.

Regular attendance is essential for the award of a Record of School Achievement (RoSA) and a Higher School Certificate (HSC). It is the responsibility of students and parents/carers to ensure that students attend school regularly. In the event of an absence, if the school has not been notified by 9:30 am APCS will text parents/ carers to inform them if their child is absent from school. Parents can respond to this text with a legitimate reason, and this will count as an explained absence. Alternatively, a note can be written and handed to Administration Staff on the child's return to school.

Absences are recorded as being either justified or unjustified on student school reports. The Education Act requires the Principal to review students' attendance patterns if they have an unsatisfactory pattern of attendance.

Absences

- Official student attendance is recorded during roll call each day.
- ✓ Student attendance is monitored each period and absences are recorded.
- ✓ The Truancy Officer will place students who are truanting on Truancy Monitoring.
- ✓ Multiple truancies will be reported to the Deputy Principal and students may be placed on Level 3 Deputy Principal Monitoring.

Absence - What to do when student is away

- ✓ Please wait for the text message and respond to that message – it is not necessary to phone the school. Please note this is not the school mobile number which changes daily; or
- ✓ Log in to the Parent Portal, click above your child's photo on the 'absences' button and on the left click on the grey 'explain absence' button; or
- ✓ Send in a hand written note with parent/ carer signature within seven (7) days of being absent. Note is to be placed in our absentee box located in our school student front office foyer.

Extended Absences

- ✓ If students will be absent for more than two (2) days, parents should contact the school and inform the school of a possible return date.
- ✓ If students will be absent for more than five (5) days, parents should contact the Administration office to be sent an extended leave form. The form needs to be completed and sent for Principal approval.

Attendance

Notification of Student Absence

- ✓ Students who are absent need to provide a notification explaining that absence within seven days. Preferably by replying to the SMS that same day.
- ✓ In relation to sick leave, the note must provide a reasonable and specific explanation of the student's sickness. In cases where sickness is in excess of four school days, medical certificates detailing the nature of the sickness and the duration of the sickness are required.
- ✓ The Deputy Principal, Head Teacher Wellbeing or Year Adviser will make contact with parents when student absenteeism becomes a concern.
- ✓ In the case of students absent sick for examinations and/or assessment tasks a medical certificate is required along with an Illness Misadventure Form (from Deputy Principal).
- ✓ If a student has been absent from school and has not supplied an acceptable note within seven days they are recorded as an Unexplained Absence.

Senior Attendance

- ✓ It is expected that senior students will attend school regularly and will participate in associated activities and assemblies.
- ✓ Satisfactory completion of any course for Year 11 or the Higher School Certificates requires that classes be attended regularly and that application and effort be acceptable.
- Where attendance is deemed to be unsatisfactory a Certificate or Record of Achievement may not be issued.

Year 12

- ✓ Students must sign in at the Jenla when they arrive at school if they do not have class in the first period.
- ✓ If their last period is prior to Period 5, students may sign out through the Jenla.
- Regular attendance at school is essential if students are to maximise their potential. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Sport Attendance

- ✓ Sport is a mandatory requirement for Years 7 to 10. Where possible, it is encouraged that medical appointments are not made for sport afternoons.
- ✓ Students who need to leave school before sport commences must have a note signed by the Deputy Principal.

School Uniform & Dress Code

Students of Alexandria Park
Community School are expected to
wear full school uniform. It is an
important part of our school's
"Code of Behaviour", which was
introduced after extensive
consultation with students,
parents, teachers and community
groups. All students are to wear
full school uniform every school
day. This presents a positive school
image outside of the school and
contributes to a shared school
identity within.

High School Uniform – Year 7 to Year 12

- APCS white with blue sleeve polo shirt OR
- a white school shirt and tie
- Navy or black shorts, pants, skirt or skort –
- shorts and skirts are to be worn to a modest and reasonable length for school attire
- Navy blue jumper or jacket with school logo
- School Tie (optional)
- Black/Navy school shoes

The High School Sport uniform:

- APCS red polo shirt with logo
- Navy blue or black shorts, or track pants.

These items are NOT school uniform:

- Hoodies
- Tights
- Jeans
- Non-APCS jumpers, cardigans & pullovers
- Non-navy pants or shorts.
- Tops or pants with random logos
- Non-compliant shorts.
- Non-compliant shoes.

The Uniform Shop

Uniforms can be purchased via the Flexischools website. Uniforms purchased through Flexischools can be picked up from the office. Alternatively, purchases can be made in person from the school office.

Our school Aboriginal Education officers (AEO's) can also support students with this process. Students can see the AEO's before school starts to gain assistance. Where possible, we will support students with borrowing school uniform items, so they are still able to participate in practical activities.



Curriculum

The curriculum for students entering Year 7 at APCS provides a set of broad learning outcomes that encompass the skills, knowledge, values and attitudes essential for all students to succeed in and beyond schooling.

In Stage 4 (Years 7 & 8), the school has an emphasis on foundation learning across the core curriculum. The delivery of this core curriculum is designed to enable students to build a deep understanding of the individual subjects and how they connect with each other and to the world at large.

The curriculum structure for Years 8 – 10 builds upon the foundation of Year 7 while introducing, in Year 8, a focused study of a language – Chinese, as the language that the school offers. In Year 9 the first elective choices are made by the students.

The school also has a strong cocurricular program running that allows students to build on their classroom experiences or to engage in an area of interest. These programs are in areas such as:

- ✓ Music Performance (band)
- ✓ Student Leadership (SRC)
- ✓ Sport
- ✓ Volunteering
- ✓ Debating and
- ✓ Model United Nations

Participation in co-curricular programs develops a stronger educational relationship with the staff and has been shown to have a positive impact on the academic and social achievements of the students.

Enrichment Programs

APCS has implemented a range of "Enrichment Programs" as a response to the need to extend and challenge all students, develop critical and creative thinking skills and have students work collaboratively in project management teams.

As a result, Enrichment Programs have been timetabled into our curriculum schedule on Tuesdays, which allows the opportunity for our school to deliver "project-based learning" to support student engagement without missing regular classes. This allows students the opportunity to participate in a wide-ranging curriculum designed to increase student wellbeing and engagement in education.

DoE Student Volunteering Awards Program

By participating in community volunteering activities, young people have an opportunity to learn and demonstrate care, respect and responsibility. Service learning activities link this experience to curriculum to enhance and deepen student skills.

International Competitions and Assessments for Schools

The school participates in the Australasian Schools Competitions administered by the University of NSW each year. Competitions are held in mathematics, English and writing, and are available to students in Years 3 to 12. Parents are advised of the competition dates and fees. To enter, a permission note must be completed and returned with payment to the school.

Sports Program

Sports Program

Students at APCS have a multitude of opportunities to engage in sport and physical activity. These include; weekly integrated school sport, sporting carnivals, CHS Knockout Competitions and additional APCS extra-curricular clubs.

We are also affiliated with the Eastern Suburbs Zone, as well as the Sydney East Regional School Sport Association.

Weekly Integrated School Sport

At APCS we follow the Integrated School Sport Model. This means weekly sport lessons are delivered to Stage 4 and Stage 5 cohorts separately.

Stage 4 Sport for students in Years 7 and 8 occurs on a Thursday morning between 8.50am-10.50am. Depending on the school term, students will engage in the following programs outlined in the table below.

Term 1, Year 7 students complete sport registrations to sign-up to a team and use sport sessions to learn the rules, develop skill competence, and foster team cohesion in preparation for the Zone Gala Day which will be held at the end of the term.

Alternatively, Year 8 engaging in the Denzil Shield. This is an ongoing tournament where Stage 4 students are divided into sport houses and participate with their peers from their sport house to develop fundamental movement skills and game awareness. In the final two weeks of the term, sport houses compete against one another to battle it out to win points for their Sport House. At the end of the year, the Denzil Shield winners will be announced at our annual Sports Presentation Day ceremony.

Stage 5 Sport for students in Years 9 and 10 occurs on a Wednesday afternoon between 12.50pm-2.50pm. This program provides students with more choice as students self-register to select either community sport, competitive school sport or noncompetitive school sport options.

Each term, the PDHPE Faculty will strive to provide a wide range of sporting activities to cater to all students' sporting interests.

Additional Extra-curricular Clubs

Fitness Club

This has been an ongoing traditional extra-curricular club that has been operating at the school for over 8 years. All students are welcome to attend Fitness Club, which runs every Tuesday morning before school from 7.30am-8.30am. No prior experience is required to attend this club. After the fitness session, students are also welcomed to attend Breakfast Club in the Bistro afterwards to start the day off right and to encourage life-long healthy habits.

Sport Houses

The School has four Sport Houses and all students are allocated to a Sport House before the first sporting event of their first year if School. The Sport House system is used for sporting contests such as swimming and athletics. Children will be encouraged to wear shirts/colours specific to their Sport House.

Wellbeing at APCS

Wellbeing at APCS

The guidance and counselling aspect of the school emphasises the importance of helping each student gain the most benefit from their years at Alexandria Park Community School.

Services are designed to aid integration upon arrival and to provide support, help or information at any stage throughout a student's school career.

Our wellbeing system is directed at individual needs and there is a number of staff available to talk about concerns for both students and parents/caregivers. These include:

Class Teacher

- ✓ Year Advisers these staff members are the first point of communication for students and parents for all wellbeing matters in that year group
- ✓ School Counsellor a contact point for all personal or sensitive issues providing expert knowledge and support
- ✓ Head Teachers/Assistant
 Principals the contact for all
 curriculum related matters.
- ✓ Head Teacher Wellbeing
- Deputy Principals and Principal

The Head Teacher Wellbeing provides for students' individual needs and care. They coordinate the Wellbeing Team of the school and hold regular meetings with the Year Advisers, Counsellors, Executive and other staff.

The Year Adviser supports students through the transition into high school and remains with that

year group until they complete Year 12. The Year Adviser's role is one of support and guidance. They communicate directly with parents, teachers and students to assist in the various stages of a student's schooling.

The School Counsellor is a psychologist employed by the

NSW Department of Education and is available to provide confidential assistance to students with learning, social and psychological and emotional difficulties.

Referrals to the counsellor may be made by the Head Teacher Wellbeing, Deputy Principal, Year Adviser or Principal. Students in Years 7-12, can self-refer without

parent permission being required.

Learning and Support Coordinator

The Learning and Support (L&S) Team aims to ensure the diverse range of learning and wellbeing needs of all our students are met. This is achieved through individual and group professional learning models, role modelling and mentoring, the development of programs that meet perceived needs, accessing extra support, and referral to outside resources and agencies.

There are many programs and systems currently operating within our school that enhance the regular curriculum and support students who are not making expected progress.

Wellbeing at APCS

Aboriginal Education Officer

The Aboriginal Education Office provides support for Aboriginal students and parents and their teachers in developing student outcomes. They are a point of contact between the school and the Aboriginal community.

Careers Adviser

APCS careers programs aim to expose students to a variety of opportunities throughout their senior years. The school works closely with many community organisations and tertiary institutions to help develop the best fit for each individual student post school pathway.

All students are offered:

- ✓ The opportunity to undertake a school based part time traineeship, available in all industries.
- ✓ Visits, speakers and meetings at the school from a variety of university representatives.
- ✓ Enterprise development opportunities and exposure to large corporations who offer mentoring programs, work experience, workshops and excursions.
- ✓ Full time apprenticeships and traineeships are arranged for those students choosing a school to work pathway.
- Access to dual accreditation vocational courses through weekly access to TAFE.
- ✓ Work experience.
- Scholarships and bonus point schemes applications for university placements for exploration.



Homework Policy

Homework reinforces and extends work done in the classroom.
Students must realise that homework is part of their day's work and non-completion will put them at a disadvantage. Students are expected to record their homework and plan for assessment tasks, research assignments, day-to- day homework and examinations.

Procedures

- ✓ Students are to record all homework, assignments, assessment tasks and exams.
- ✓ Students are to complete homework/study/revision in the afternoon or evening.
- ✓ Students present their homework on the due date.
- ✓ Students should check their Google Classroom pages for homework and resources when required.

Follow Up

- ✓ Teachers will check and record whether homework has been completed.
- ✓ Parent/guardian contact will eventuate if students fail to complete homework or fail to complete assessment tasks or assignments.
- ✓ Non-completion of assessment tasks/assignments will result in warning letters being


Homework Centre

The APCS homework centre is available for students every Wednesday afternoon from 3:00 pm to 4:00 pm in the Library (Yaka Takka).

Staff from across the various curriculum areas volunteer their time to assist students to:

- ✓ Deepen their knowledge and understanding of the syllabus
- ✓ Strengthen their understanding of classwork to enable students to complete homework.
- ✓ Prepare and study for assessment tasks and exams.

The atmosphere is very collaborative and encourages student engagement. This has contributed to improved student results, attitude and confidence in learning.



Mobile Phone Policy

In June 2023, the NSW
Government announced a ban
on all mobile phones on all
Department of Education High
School sites from Term 4
2023.

Alexandria Park Community School has established, in consultation with students, staff and community, a Mobile Phone and Electronic Devices Policy including:

- 1. No mobile phone use for all students in Years 7 to 12 (includes headphones and smartwatches).
- Covers all aspects of the school day, including breaks.
- Covers exemptions for learning, wellbeing or medical purposes.
- Covers all school organised events – excursions, sports carnivals, etc.
- Covers the use of canteen and other services students may pay for (cashless transactions).
- 2. Every student at Alexandria Park Community School will be assigned a YONDR pouch.

3. If a mobile phone is seen at any time during the school day the consequences are listed below.

- First Time: Student sent to Jenla office, issued Yondr pouch if none. Phone locked in Jenla locker. If student does not comply DP will be contacted.
- Second Time: DP contacts parents/carer to pick phone up.
- Third Time: DP contacts parent/carer and emails Formal Caution Letter. DP places student on Level 3 Mentoring Card.
- Fourth Time: DP interview
 with parent/carer and student
 issued with Suspension. On
 return from Suspension,
 parent/carer and student sign
 DOE Student Contract and
 student placed on Level 3
 Mentoring for 2 weeks.
 Student & Community Advisor
 will follow up with student.

4. In case of refusal to hand over the device, the Behaviour Policy will be followed.

5. If a student damages or loses a pouch the following applies.

Students who have lost or damaged their pouch are not to bring their phone to school until they have organised a replacement pouch.

Students are required to pay \$35 for the replacement of the damaged or lost pouch. An invoice will be sent home for the damaged school property.

The Deputy Principals will keep a minimum amount of replacement pouches. Students who wish to bring their phone but have lost their pouch, may hand the phone to the Deputy, Principal to collect at the end of the day without consequence.







In the interests of student safety, skateboards are discouraged modes of transport to or from school. There is no storage space for skateboards on either Campus.
