

Our Year 12 Geography students recently travelled to Cairns, QLD, for an unforgettable field trip exploring coral reefs as part of their HSC studies - and what an adventure it was. Snorkelling and Culture at Green Island – Great Barrier Reef.

We began our journey at the stunning Green Island, travelling by boat from Cairns Port. Students snorkelled over parts of the Great Barrier Reef, observing an incredible variety of marine life including green sea turtles, parrot fish, anemone fish hiding in their anemones, sea grass meadows, giant clams, spaghetti and brain corals, and more.

The day also included a cultural talk where students learned about the traditional significance of the reef and island to Indigenous communities. We wrapped up the visit with a crocodile feeding show at Marineland Melanesia – a thrilling highlight for many.

Students also got hands-on with reef management strategies, including observing a dissection of a crown-of-thorns starfish, a species that poses a major threat to coral health.

Visit to Cairns Aquarium & Turtle Rehabilitation Centre: Back on land, we explored Cairns Aquarium and visited the Turtle Rehabilitation Centre. Here, students learned about the threats facing marine turtles and the important work being done to rescue and rehabilitate them.

This trip brought classroom learning to life, giving students a powerful understanding of marine ecosystems and conservation in action.

ahead.



In Week 7, our Year 10 Child Studies class participated in an infancy first aid course. We had Emily and Matilda from 'How To Save A Life' come in and teach us about infancy and child first aid with a focus on CPR and DRSABCD.

Emily and Matilda are young mums and paramedics who are passionate about teaching people about the proper technique for CPR and other necessary medical treatment such as: burns, bee stings, choking, fevers, seizures and poisoning.

We learnt how to deliver back blows and chest thrusts to safely dislodge an object while a child is choking and know the signs before it gets serious. We learnt how to cover burns, remove stings and monitor fevers and febrile convulsions. Did you know that only 34% of Australian people are confident in the delivery of CPR? Now with the guidance of Emily and Matilda we can all agree we are confident in performing CPR.

AGRICULTURE NEWS FROM THE FARM


Winter has hit the farm and the harvest of the winter veg has begun.

Year 10 have worked tirelessly to prepare the veg and have now managed to see the fruits of their labour with the harvest of the cauliflower and broccoli. In the coming weeks, we hope to plant some more seedlings so that we are able to continue to produce huge quality vegetables for our school community.

With the farm out of action for students for a few weeks, Year 10 have been looking into alternative industries that we could implement and explore on the farm. One of the industries that has caused some excitement is the introduction of mushroom cropping. Student will grow a variety of mushrooms in the warmer, darker areas of the farm and hope to be able to see the differences in growth between the varieties of mushrooms.

Students have also started prepping the seeds for a spring planting of flowers. We hope to grow a variety of different flowers that we are able to cut and make bunches from. The seeds planted range from native flowers all the way to Ranunculus, Sweet peas and Daffodils.

Theres always lots to do on the farm and Year 10 are working hard to make it an inviting, productive space.
