
Outdoor Education Blue Mountains Hike

CHILD STUDIES








YEAR 9 PHOTOGRAPHY (C)

Students have been learning how to centre their clay, open their forms and pull the walls of the forms up. All of the students are producing amazing ceramic forms and are improving their skills every lesson!


