## A message from Ms Barnott-Clement

Welcome to Term 3, and goodness isn't it cold! Nonetheless, it is wonderful to be back at Ambarvale High School following my three months as Relieving Principal at Walgett High School in the Central West of the state. I would like to thank Mrs Fitgerald and Ms Arts for relieving in the principal chair whilst I was away.

It was lovely to see so many parents at the Stage 6 parent teacher night in Week 2 of this term. I could see and hear the rich conversations about learning, as students, parents and teachers worked together to maximise learning and results.

In Week 3, we were excited to celebrate Education Week with our Thursday morning tea, which included an opportunity to enjoy student performances and view a wide range of student work samples. We also held our NAIDOC Assembly during Education Week and it was fantastic to see the level of commitment and pride our students had in their culture.

For our students in Years 7-10, we have our Student Learning Conferences (SLCs) starting Week 4 and occurring each day until Thursday Week 6. If you haven't booked yours yet, now is the time to do so.

#### **Accident Insurance Information**

In the event of injury, no accident or medical insurance cover is provided by the NSW Government Treasury Managed Fund for students participating in school sporting activities, physical education lessons or any other school endorsed activity, unless there is a breach of duty of care by department or school staff. The NSW Department of Education is insured to meet the financial impact of any legal liabilities arising from its activities. It does not provide, nor has it ever provided, accident or medical insurance for students enrolled in government schools. Parents/Carers are advised to assess the level and extent of their child/ward's involvement in the sport program offered by the school, school sport zone, region and state school sport associations when deciding whether additional insurance cover is required prior to their child's involvement in the program. Personal accident insurance cover is available through normal retail outlets.

#### **Concussion Management**

When a student enrolled in a government school is diagnosed with concussion, the Principal must be advised in writing as soon as the diagnosis is confirmed. Students may only return to sport and physical activity once a medical clearance has been provided to the school and if at a school sport event, to the supervising teacher. Any student that experiences a suspected concussion during a school endorsed activity, will be removed from the activity and parents/carers will be advised that a medical follow-up is required. If medical clearance is not provided, the student cannot participate in vigorous or competitive school sport or physical activities for 21 days from the concussion date.

NSW Ambulance Schools and Group Cover Scheme 2025 The NSW Ambulance Schools and Group Cover Scheme 2025 is an insurance policy that provides coverage for emergency ambulance services to NSW public school students attending approved, fully supervised school activities. In the first instance, students are covered by their family's private health insurance or Centrelink concession health care card, where available. If the student is not covered by either of these, they will be covered by the NSW Ambulance Schools and Group Cover Scheme.

# TAS Food Technology Update


It's been a busy and creative term in Food Technology. Some Year 8 students have transitioned from woodwork to the kitchen, creating colourful and artistic fruit salads.

# Science Faculty

Last term, Year 8 Science students dove into the world of magnetic fields with curiosity and excitement! The highlight? We're looking forward to Science Week this term where students will get to engage in a variety of fun Science activities, including an excursion for Year 9 and 10 to the Royal Botanic Gardens and Australian Museum. ## Junior Leadership


Several of our junior leadership students attended the Campbelltown Council Youth Forum.
