# Arranounbai School Behaviour Support and Management Plan

### Overview

Arranounbai School is committed to explicitly teaching and modelling positive behaviour and to supporting all students to be engaged with their learning.

At Arranounbai our vision is to develop each individual to reach their true potential. Arranounbai will prepare students with lifelong learning/life skills through delivering positive and engaging educational experiences in a supportive and innovative environment, enabling them to achieve the best outcomes for independent success.

Every student in our school is known, valued and cared for and will be nurtured to develop an awareness of and take responsibility for their individual learning goals and progress.

Principles of positive behaviours support, trauma-informed practice, inclusive practice and social emotional learning underpin our daily practice. High expectations for student behaviour are established and maintained through effective role modelling, explicit teaching, and planned responses.

The staff at Arranounbai are committed to continuous improvement of skills to best support student needs and growth through delivering high-quality individualised education. This is inclusive of academic, physical, social, behavioural and life skills to promote independence.

To achieve this vision, key programs prioritised and valued by our school community include:

- Personalised Learning and Support Plans (PLSPs) - students participate in learning that is relevant and engaging, maximising their opportunity in post-school options and independent participation in society.
- Functional Communication for all - the school achieves its outcomes for all students in collaboration with families, external providers and community members.
- Positive Behaviour Engaging Learners (PBEL) - focusing on and teaching the behaviours which reflect our expectations of “Communicating”, “Co-operating”, and “Caring”.
- Happy, Relaxed, Engaged (HRE) - promoting students' independence and wellbeing, consistently enhancing the readiness to learn successfully.

Arranounbai School rejects all forms of bullying behaviours, including cyberbullying by maintaining a commitment to providing a safe, inclusive, and respectful learning community that promotes student wellbeing. Staff are committed to establishing evidence-based approaches and strategies that promote a positive climate where bullying is less likely to occur.

All members of the school community are active participants in building a welcoming school culture that values diversity and fosters positive relationships. A key component of a supportive school culture is building respectful relationships and an ethos that bullying is not accepted, in both online and offline environments. School staff actively respond to student bullying behaviour.

### Partnership with parents and carers

Arranounbai School will partner with parents/carers in establishing expectations for engagement in developing and implementing student behaviour management and bullying strategies, by:

- inviting parent/carers and student feedback through formal and informal means such as school surveys, Tell Them From Me surveys, PLSP meetings, information nights, Learning Support Team (LST) meetings, along with consultation with the P & C and local AECG.

Arranounbai School will communicate these expectations to parents/carers through the school newsletter and the Class Dojo App. Our school proactively builds collaborative relationships with families and communities to create a shared understanding of how to support student learning, safety and wellbeing.

Parents work in partnership with staff to plan and support student learning and wellbeing.

### School-wide expectations and rules

Arranounbai School has the following school-wide rules and expectations, providing a rich and positive environment where all students are inspired to achieve.

### Whole school approach across the care continuum

Our school embeds student wellbeing and positive behaviour approaches and strategies in practices across the care continuum to promote positive behaviour and respond to behaviours of concern, including bully and cyberbullying behaviour.

These approaches and strategies are built on a foundation of evidence-based effective classroom practices that set the tone for engagement with learning and respectful relationships. These practices include:

- stating and explicitly teaching classroom expectations
- establishing predictable routines and procedures that are communicated clearly to students
- encouraging expected behaviour with positive feedback and reinforcement
- discouraging inappropriate behaviour
- providing active supervision of students
- maximising opportunities for active engagement with learning
- providing carefully sequenced engaging lessons that provide options for student choice
- differentiating learning content and tasks to meet the needs of all students.

## Planned responses to positive appropriate behaviour, inappropriate behaviour and behaviours of concern, including bullying and cyber-bullying

### Identifying behaviour of concern, including bullying and cyberbullying

A behaviour of concern is challenging, complex or unsafe behaviour that requires more persistent and intensive interventions. A behaviour of concern does not include low-level inappropriate or developmentally appropriate behaviour. Bullying behaviour involves the intentional misuse of power in a relationship, is ongoing and repeated and involves behaviour that can cause harm.

Arranounbai School staff will identify inappropriate behaviour and behaviours of concern, including bullying and cyber-bullying through a range of channels, for example:

- directly observing a child or young person's behaviours, interactions, verbal communications, or work produced (such as written materials, performances or artworks)
- a person disclosing information that is not previously known, either because it is new information or because it has been kept a secret
- concerns raised by a parent, community member or agency.

Students or parents can report bullying to any staff member. NSW public school principals have the authority to take disciplinary action to address student behaviours that occur outside of school hours or school grounds, including cyberbullying. Students who have been bullied will be offered appropriate support (Appendix 1).

### Preventing and responding to behaviours of concern

Arranounbai School uses the following strategies to recognise and reinforce positive student behaviour and behavioural expectations.

The use of verbal and non-verbal specific positive feedback is the most powerful way to:

- help learners to focus on positive social behaviour
- increase the likelihood that students will use the expected behaviours and skills in the future
- decrease unexpected behaviour and reduce the need for corrective responses
- enhance self-esteem and build an internal focus of control.

Specific positive feedback may not be sufficiently reinforcing for some students, so the school-wide continuum provides the opportunity to pair verbal or non-verbal feedback with a positive, tangible consequence.

The school-wide continuum for acknowledging expected behaviour includes:

- free and frequent – Class Dojo’s are awarded throughout the day by staff to students showing positive behaviours and attitudes.
- moderate and intermittent – Weekly whole school assembly awards, when reaching a certain milestone for dojo’s, to recognise positive behaviour, as well as recognition awards for positive behaviour and learning achievements.
- significant and infrequent – Arranounbai School holds an annual presentation day ceremony recognising the efforts of students across various disciplines. Families and community are included in this event. Students also work towards a “Pin Party” at the end of the year as reward for the points they accumulate.

### **Responses to serious behaviours of concern**

Responses, including students who display serious behaviours of concern, are recorded in the centralised recording system. These may include:

- review and document incident
- determine appropriate response/s, including supports for staff or other students impacted
- refer/monitor the student through the school learning and support team
- develop or review individual student support planning, including teaching positive replacement behaviour and making learning and environmental adjustments
- reflection and restorative practices (listed below)
- liaise with Team Around a School for additional support or advice
- communication and collaboration with parents/carers (phone, email, parent portal, meeting)
- formal caution to suspend, suspension or expulsion.

The NSW Department of Education [Student Behaviour policy](#) and [Suspension and Expulsion procedures](#) apply to all NSW public schools.

Responses to all behaviours of concern apply to student behaviour that occurs:

- at school
- on the way to and from school
- on school-endorsed activities that are off-site
- outside school hours and off school premises where there is a clear and close connection between the school and students’ conduct
- when using social media, mobile devices and/or other technology involving another student or staff member.

### **Reporting and recording behaviours of concern**

Arranounbai School staff will use a school specific Incident Reporting form, accessible from School Bytes and/or staff iPads, to record and submit any behaviour incidents that occur. Any major incidents are also reported via the NSW Department of Education Incident Report Hotline and

recorded. This information is collated and examined by the school executive team to inform future responses to behaviours of concern.

Staff will comply with reporting and responding processes outlined in the:

## Reflection and restorative practices

Toilet and food breaks are always included when withdrawal from free choice play at either break is planned as a response to behaviour.
