CONTACTING THE SCHOOL

SWIMMING CARNIVAL

Our annual Swimming Carnival is fast approaching, and will be held at Hawkesbury Oasis Swimming Centre. The swimming carnival is attended by competitors only, children turning 8 this year and above. Children need to be able to competently swim 50 metres.

Please ensure that all student belongings are clearly labelled. It is a good idea to form a habit to check that your child brings everything home that he/she took to school. Lunch boxes, drink bottles, jackets etc should all be clearly labelled with your child's name, and room, their class. SELECTIVE HIGH SCHOOLS AND OPPORTUNITY CLASSES

Applications are now open for Year 4 students to apply for Opportunity Class placement in 2026, and Year 6 students to apply for Selective High School Placement for 2026. Applications will close on 21 February 2025. Please see the information below, and flyers included in this newsletter.

What is selective education?

Selective education is one of the ways that the department supports students with high academic potential. Selective education includes <u>selective high schools and opportunity classes</u>. Selective education has many benefits, including:

Students learn alongside, and form friendships with, other high potential and gifted classmates.

Special teaching methods allow students to learn at a quicker pace and in more detail.

Research shows that students benefit both academically and socially when learning with classmates who have similar abilities.

Opportunity classes and selective high schools are not zoned so you can apply to any of them, even those outside your local enrolment area.

What are opportunity classes?

Opportunity classes are offered in primary school from Years 5 to 6.

There is also an <u>online opportunity class</u> for students in rural and remote areas. Students attend a local host school and complete their maths and science and technology lessons online through Aurora College.

Parents/carers apply for opportunity class placement when their child is in Year 3 and can apply up until 21 February 2025, when their child is in Year 4.

You can include up to 4 school choices when you are applying for an opportunity class.

What are selective high schools?

<u>Selective high schools</u> are offered in high school from Years 7 to 12. Parents/carers apply when their child is in Year 5 and can apply up until 21 February 2025, when their child is in Year 6. There are 4 types of selective high schools:

- fully selective high schools (where all students attending the school have high potential or are gifted)
- partially selective high schools (where one or two classes in each year are academically selective, with some non-selective classes for local students.)
- selective agricultural high schools (day or boarding schools that emphasise the study of agriculture)
- Aurora College (a virtual selective high school students attend a local host school and complete their English, mathematics and science lessons online with their Aurora classmates).

You can include up to 3 school choices when you are applying for a selective high school.

Is selective education the right fit for my child?

High potential and gifted students can be found across diverse family, socio-economic, language, cultural backgrounds and geographic locations.

Your child may have high academic potential if they demonstrate some of the following:

- enjoy learning
- have intense curiosity
- display a good memory
- ask complex questions
- enjoy learning new and often complex ideas or skills
- require fewer repetitions when learning new things
- are creative

become intensely focused in their area/s of interest.

Note: Not all high potential and gifted students will display all of these characteristics, for example, due to disability, disadvantage and/or lack of opportunity.



Online telehealth parenting program – families can participate from anywhere in NSW





Who can participate?

Parents/caregivers (fathers, mothers, grandparents, foster and kinship carers) of children aged between 3-years and
 9-years 11 months.

What is the study about?

- This study is called Measuring Change in Parenting Programs. It offers an evidence-based 8-10 session parenting
 program, delivered via telehealth, to help parents manage their child's challenging behaviours. This study examines
 the effectiveness of measure completion at different time points in the program.
- All families taking part in the study will receive an 8-10 session parenting program and will complete measures about
 their child and family before and after the program, and again after three months. In addition, families will be
 randomly allocated to either complete additional weekly measures before and after sessions or to not complete these
 measures.

What does the parenting program involve?

This evidence-based parenting program is 8-10 sessions and provides parents with evidence-based strategies to manage challenging child behaviour, promote positive parent-child interactions, and support parental teamwork.

 This research will help us find out how often to measure progress and change in parenting programs, so we can better support parents/caregivers.

A guide to selective high schools and opportunity classes

Selective high schools and opportunity classes are specialist school settings that group together high potential and gifted students.

Learning with classmates who have similar abilities helps students' academic development and wellbeing.

Students still follow the NSW curriculum, but teachers may use special teaching strategies for high potential and gifted learners.

Selective high schools

There are 4 types of selective high schools:

- fully selective high schools these are schools where all students have been selected based on the placement test
- partially selective high schools these are schools that have a mix of selected students and local area students
- agricultural selective high schools these are schools that emphasise the study of agriculture and all students are selected on their academic ability. Some of these schools also provide boarding where students live at the school
- Aurora College these are online selective classes. They are provided at local public high schools in rural and remote areas.

Opportunity classes

Opportunity classes are for high potential and gifted students in Years 5 and 6. They are offered in a number of public primary schools across NSW.

Aurora College provides online opportunity classes for rural and remote students in their local primary schools.

Selective high schools and opportunity classes are available across metropolitan, regional and rural NSW. Check the maps below for a school near you.

How do I know if it is the right fit for my child?

Does your child:

- enjoy learning
- · have intense curiosity
- display a good memory
- · ask complex questions
- require fewer repetitions when learning new things
- display creative ways of thinking
- · become intensely focused in their area of interest or passion?

If some of these sound like your child, an opportunity class or selective high school might be a good fit.

How do I apply?

2026 entry into an opportunity class or selective high school

The application period for 2026 entry is from 7 November 2024 to 21 February 2025.

What year is my child in when I apply?

Opportunity classes

Parents apply when their child is near the end of Year 3 in 2024 or at the beginning of Year 4 in 2025.

Selective high schools

Parents apply when their child is near the end of Year 5 in 2024 or at the beginning of Year 6 in 2025.

The placement test

After you apply, your child must sit a test. Students are then selected for placement based on their test performance.

When is the test?

The test will be available across a 3-day period from Friday 2 May to Sunday 4 May 2025.

Students attend one test day only and do not need to bring their own computer to sit the placement tests.



What's in the test?

The test assesses how well students understand what they read, reason using mathematics and their thinking skills. Applicants for selective high schools are also tested on their writing skills.

When will I find out about my child's results?

After your child sits the test, you will get an email in Term 3 with their test performance and next steps. If your child is offered a place, you will get information on how to enrol.

The Equity Placement Model

The <u>Equity Placement Model</u> helps all students to have fair access to selective high schools and opportunity classes.

Under the Model, up to 20% of student places at each selective high school and opportunity class are held for high potential and gifted students:

- from low socio-educational advantage areas
- of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander background
- · from rural and remote locations
- with disability.

The held places are offered to students based on their performance in the placement test.

Applying for my child to attend an opportunity class or selective high school

Why selective education?

Grouping high potential and gifted students together and using special teaching methods supports their:

- academic development
- emotional wellbeing
- · friendships and social life.

Students tell us that they enjoy learning more when their classmates have similar abilities and interests.

Is it right for my child?

Here are some signs that your child may benefit from selective education.



learns quickly and easily



goaldriven



asks complex questions



good memory



curious and creative



deeply explores passions

Keep in mind, some children's high potential may be hidden. Being in an opportunity class or selective high school could help.

How can I support my child through the application process?



Talk to your child about the benefits and challenges of selective education and address their questions and concerns.



Ask your **child's teacher** (or other staff who know them well) whether they think selective education will suit your child.



Apply for any required reasonable adjustments for disability or medical conditions.



Encourage your child to use the department's **free resources** to prepare for the test.



Remind your child they only need to do a **small amount** of **preparation** for the placement test, and **don't** need coaching.



Support your child to continue co-curricular activities, see friends, eat healthily and sleep well in the lead-up to the test.

The Equity Placement Model reserves up to 20% of places in opportunity classes and selective high schools for high potential and gifted:

- students from low socio-educational advantage backgrounds
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander students
- · students from rural and remote locations
- · students with disability



Dear Parents.

Welcome back, and a very special welcome to our new students and parents! We are looking forward to another great year of making music. Correspondence will be via email: please ensure TSA has your current email address and check your junk/spam folder for communications.

NEW BEGINNERS (those learning an instrument for the first time in 2024)

There are two components to the Band Program: group lessons and a full band rehearsal both held on the same day. **Please note, all group lessons take place** <u>after school.</u> Your band director will email you with further details.

Group lessons: Start Thursday 8 February (a timetable will be emailed to parents by your band director)

What to bring: Instrument if already purchased; items ordered through TSA will be

distributed in the first lesson.

Full Band Rehearsal: Beginners will not be required at band rehearsal until Term 2. Training Band

rehearsals will be on Thursdays at lunchtime.

The first lesson will focus on showing new students how to set-up and care for their instruments.

EXISTING BAND STUDENTS (those who already learned an instrument in 2023)

Full band rehearsal: Starts Thursday 8 February at 2:00-2:45pm in the Hall

Group lessons: Start Thursday 8 February (after school). A timetable will be emailed to parents.

What to bring: Instrument & pencil, Accent on Achievement book and band folder.

The first lesson will focus on finalising grouping and assessing how continuing students have progressed across the summer holiday break.

IMPORTANT ITEMS

Fees – In 2024, band and group tuition fees will be \$220 per term plus \$10 resource levy. TSA will email invoices/process direct debits at the beginning of each school term and needs to be finalised within 2 weeks of issue or late fees will apply.

Absence from Band – if your child will be absent from band or lessons please notify the band director. In particular, absences outside of school hours must be communicated clearly so we can confirm your child is safe and accounted for.
