
I have included a photo feast taken over the last few weeks as a testimony to "Blackwell's potential" in all its glory.

What is bullying?

Bullying is when people **repeatedly and intentionally** use words or actions against someone or a group of people to **cause distress** and risk to their wellbeing. These actions are usually done by people who have more influence or power over someone else, or who want to make someone else feel less powerful or helpless. Bullying is not the same as conflict between people (like having a fight) or disliking someone, even though people might bully each other because of conflict or dislike.

The sort of repeated behaviour that can be considered bullying includes:

- Keeping someone out of a group (online or offline)
- Acting in an unpleasant way near or towards someone
- Giving nasty looks, making rude gestures, calling names, being rude and impolite, and constantly negative teasing.
- Spreading rumours or lies, or misrepresenting someone (i.e. using their Facebook account to post messages as if it were them)
- Mucking about that goes too far
- Harassing someone based on their race, sex, religion, gender or a disability
- Intentionally and repeatedly hurting someone physically
- Intentionally stalking someone
- Taking advantage of any power over someone else like a Prefect or a Student Representative.

Bullying can happen anywhere. It can be in schools, at home, at work, in online social spaces, via text messaging or via email. It can be physical, verbal, emotional, and it also includes messages, public statements and behaviour online intended to cause distress or harm (also known as cyberbullying). But no matter what form bullying takes, the results can be the same: severe distress and pain for the person being bullied.

It is very important that teachers are aware of situations like the above before it goes too far. Often we will hear from students and parents who have said that their child has been bullied for the entire year and nothing has been done. Neither the student nor parent had let the teachers or school know. The only way we can STOP bullying is if we know about it.

As a school we cannot make students play with other students if they don't want to and if their parents have asked for this to happen. Sometimes students make mature choices to move away from friendships because they have had enough of the friendship for whatever reason. This is not bullying, this is making a mature decision.

ACP & I Message

We hope you had a restful break! Just a friendly reminder about reading!

Reading has always been an important skill. In our modern world it is more important than ever. Children learn about the importance of reading as they watch family members use reading and writing for everyday purposes. Reading with your child at home will help your child in all learning areas of school. Children see you reading and writing in everyday life – reading for pleasure, sharing a story with your child, using a recipe, making a shopping list, writing a birthday card or reading street signs. This teaches them that reading and writing are useful skills in today's world. Often parents are asked by the school to listen to their child read at home. It's a good way of supporting your child's reading. Books can be borrowed from your school library each week and you can access St Clair's library for free.

What can you do at home to help?

- Be yourself.
- Involve children in everyday conversations.
- Read aloud to children. It helps them to learn the language of books and will encourage them to enjoy books and reading.
- Talk about books, read together and make reading an enjoyable, shared activity.
- Make sure there is a wide range of reading material for your child at home, both fiction and non-fiction.
- It is important to read to your child in your home language if your first language is not English. Experience shows that using your home language will help your child to learn to read in English.
- Try not to let television intrude on reading time. Make a special time for reading with your child, away from interruption.
- Listen to your child every day, even for a short time.
- Give books as treats and presents.



Hints for listening to your child read:

- Before reading, talk about the cover, the title, the pictures, and discuss what the book may be about.
- During reading, discuss what has been read up to that point, and imagine what will happen next time.
- After reading is finished, talk and ask questions about the story and the pictures.
- When reading a harder book together, take turns. Beginning readers can read the repetitive parts and more experienced readers can read a paragraph or a page.

On finding an unknown word:

Pause to give your child time to work out the word.

Prompt – go back to the beginning of the sentence or read past the difficult word to the end of the sentence. Look for a clue in the picture or the words. Look at the first letter and think about what the words could be – ask "Does this make sense?" Try to sound out the word, if necessary, tell your child the word.

Praise your child for trying even if mistakes are made.

What to read and do:

- Tell and re-tell stories of all kinds including favourite stories, fairy tales, movie plots, local news items and family history.
- Play games such as "I spy... something beginning with d, that is the colour...starts with the sound 'c' (stating the sound)".
- Ask your child to read out simple recipes while you cook together.
- Read comics, magazines, short stories, poems and rhymes, including nursery rhymes.



- Do crosswords & other word puzzles together.
- Look at letterbox leaflets together.
- Read directions and signs when driving and shopping.
- Read and write notes and letters to family members.
- Play board games together and read the rules.

Please remember to:

- Discuss the meaning of stories and words.
- Encourage your child to read anywhere and at any time.
- Let your child see you enjoy reading.
- Visit and use a library near you. Borrow books for yourself as well as your child.
- Talk to your child's classroom teacher or the principal for further help and advice.
- Enjoy reading it should be fun



I would like to thank parents for their continued support of our many events and also extend my appreciation to the teachers who generously give up their time to provide these valuable opportunities for our students.

Blackwell's **Athletics Carnival** was held at **Blair Oval** on **Friday 15**th **August**. What a successful day- we had! It was wonderful to see so many Stage 3 students competing and having a go in both the track and field events. Several records were broken too. The District Carnival will be held on Thursday 4th and Friday, 5th September at Blair Oval, St Marys. We would like to take this opportunity to wish all students the very best of luck moving into this next round.

Our class competitions for our annual **Public Speaking Competition** either started this week or for some classes next week. All students were required to plan, prepare and present a speech at class level. Two students from each class — one from Year 5 and one from Year 6 will then be selected to participate in the school finals which will be held in Week 8. Classroom teachers will notify the two finalists, and an invitation will be sent home for parents detailing the starting times of the finals if they would like to come and watch.

This Friday is the **Regional Premier's Spelling Bee**. We wish **Rikuto** from S3B all the very best as Blackwell's representative in the senior competition.

Just a reminder to please be vigilant with your child's use of social media. We have had a few incidents recently where students have posted images of other students or created content about other students without consent. When we know who has created these accounts, we have asked these posts to be removed and/or the account to be shut down. Unfortunately, we are not always able to determine the creators, and this is where we need your help to monitor your children's accounts and ask them to remove images, posts or content that could potentially be hurtful. Students have also been reminded about the importance of keeping their account passwords confidential to ensure their online safety and security. While the use of social media and online gaming primarily occurs outside of school hours, any issues arising from these activities can impact student wellbeing and relationships within the school environment. We appreciate your ongoing support and vigilance in helping to maintain a safe and respectful online environment for all students.

Remember that the final instalment for our **school camp** is Wednesday, 15th October 2025 (Term 4 - Week 1). Payments for camp can be completed based on your family's financial situation. For example – you might like to make weekly or fortnightly payments or perhaps you prefer to pay the amount in one lump sum. It is whatever works best for you. Additional information about camp will be sent home closer to camp.

Teachers are already talking to our **Year 5 students** about the **leadership roles** and opportunities available for **2026**. We have positions as school captains, leaders, Junior AECG, house captains and library monitors. To be eligible for one of these roles, students need to **attend school regularly**, display **good manners**, **good thinking** and **good learning** and **show commitment** which means following through with tasks or activities. It is important that students interested in stepping up into these leadership roles display respectful behaviours and have had no more than 3 white or blue reflection slips in Year 5. Nominations for School Leaders will start next term.

At the end of the year, our **Year 6 students** run a special **Mini Fete** to help raise money for their farewell. During the mini-fete, students from K-5 participate in a variety of fun games or challenges that Year 6 run. As part of the fun, the Year 6 are asking for donations of old McDonald-like toys to be used as some of the prizes. If you have any of these type toys that you are willing to donate, Year 6 would be extremely grateful. They have started a collection box for donations between Miss Balloch's and Miss Harris's classroom.

Blackwell Public School - Primary Athletics Carnival 2025

Last Friday's Athletics Carnival at Blair Oval was a whirlwind of energy, sportsmanship, and school pride. Our students brought their best to every event—cheering each other on, embracing challenges, and showing incredible determination across the track and field events.

One of the true highlights was watching so many students step outside their comfort zones to try something new. Some discovered hidden talents, others found newfound confidence and pride in their abilities. It was a day of growth, grit, and great fun. We're thrilled to celebrate several outstanding achievements:

On the Track:

Brady H (11 years) ran an impressive 27.19s in the 200m, surpassing the 2023 record of 27.44s.

Mila H (11 years) clocked 6:48.43 in the 1500m, shaving seconds off the 2023 record of 7:05.19.

Mia E broke the 2022 Senior's 1500m record of 7:13.65 with a stellar time of 6:16.94.

Chaise B took down the 2024 Senior's 1500m record of 6:25.28 with his new record time of 6:06.10.

In the Field Events:

Sophie (11 years) smashed the 1997 Shot Put record of 8.03m with a powerful 9.47m throw—and she didn't stop there! Sophie also broke the 2000 Discus record of 19.41m, launching the Discus to an incredible 24.58m.

A huge thank you to our dedicated staff and supportive families who helped the day run smoothly and ensured every student felt encouraged and celebrated.

What's Next?

The High Jump competition will be held at school—keep an eye on our closed Facebook pages for updates.

The District Athletics Carnival will take place over two days later this term. Students who have qualified will receive a permission note via Sentral.



Information for parents and carers



Phonics is the relationship between letters and sounds and is vital in learning to read. Some children struggle with learning to read, so it is important that these children are identified quickly. This way, teachers can plan for any specific support they may need.

What is the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check?

The Year 1 Phonics Screening Check is a short statewide assessment that tells teachers how your child is progressing in phonics. This screening check observes how your child can read English words with different letter combinations. Your child will sit with a teacher and will be asked to read 40 words aloud. These words include 20 real words and 20 nonsense words. The purpose of the nonsense words is to see if the student can use their knowledge of blending to read a word rather than their memory of having seen that word before. The test normally takes 5-7 minutes. If your child is struggling the teacher will stop the check. The check is carefully designed not to be stressful for your child.

The main purpose of the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check is to provide your child's teacher with information which will allow them to plan for your child's learning. Each child is individually assessed by a teacher and all Year 1 students will be assessed.

Why is phonics important?

Phonic knowledge and skills are essential for learning to read and write in English. To be successful, students need to learn the sounds represented by individual letters or different letter combinations, and the skill of blending these sounds together to read words. Beginning readers need to learn how to blend sounds together in words quickly and fluently, so as not to disrupt the flow of reading and their comprehension of the text.
