Our last 11 weeks of school have seen students and staff have actively participated in a range of career activities, expanding their understanding of the world of work.

The school has been a hive of activity as displays are being created and students have been in creation mode to complete submissions in a variety of areas. I for one, am excited to see the works on display on Saturday.

We held our annual cross-country carnival on Wednesday, and it was great to see the level of participation as students vied for representation at the upcoming regional carnival in. A big shout out to Mr Doust for your efforts organising the event and to all staff for ensuring student safety and wellbeing as they made their way around the cross-country course and congratulations to all category winners.

I'd like to take the opportunity to share some focus areas to help continue BHS moving forward. Attendance is always a focus for the Department of Education and this is also the case at Bourke High School. We are currently tracking very positively in attendance compared to previous years and I would like to thank parents, carers and the community in supporting your children's attendance. Having said that, there is always room for improvement and getting your child to school just one more day a fortnight results in a 10% increase in individual overall attendance.

On a work health and safety note, it is a requirement that students wear enclosed shoes. Crocs and slides are not to be worn to school and will lead to students missing classes where there is a risk of chemical spills, burns or in spaces with sharp or heavy objects. Despite all the amazing opportunities which exist for students at Bourke High School, the primary focus of the school is always teaching and learning. It is an expectation that students are in classes, participating in learning activities, interacting positively with staff and students and following reasonable instructions. Staff in the school are working very hard to ensure students are in class at all times and will continue to do so to provide every student at the school with the best possible opportunity for success. The staff are all focusing on Explicit Teaching strategies and we are very fortunate that there are some very experienced and motivated staff at the school who are developing and leading teacher professional learning in this area. I am genuinely excited about this focus area and how it leads to improved teacher practice and improved student outcomes.

The school has been looking at ways to improve communication with parents and carers. Wellbeing and Health In-reach Nurse Coordinator

Meet our new WHIN Coordinator.

We are delighted to welcome our new Wellbeing and Health In-reach Nurse Coordinator (WHIN Coordinator), Bella.

Bella is a Registered Nurse who will be working across our school, with our learning and support team, to help connect students and families with health and community services. She is here to help support students and families in addressing health needs, coordinate appropriate assessments and assist with referrals to any needed medical or social services.

Bella will be based in Dubbo and will be doing outreach to Bourke and Brewarrina. Bella will be attending BHS a couple of times a school term and her schedule for dates at the school is available upon request. If you would like to speak to Bella, you can contact her directly or speak with any other member of our learning and support / wellbeing team, and a referral to the WHIN Service will be made.

This isn't a First Aid position. Bella is employed by the Local Health District and is one of around 100 similar roles which are being introduced in schools across NSW in a partnership between NSW Health and the Department of Education Wellbeing and Health In-reach Nurse (WHIN) Coordinator program - Youth health and wellbeing (nsw.gov.au)
