

## Principal's Report

Hello Bourke High School Community.

Well it is safe to say that winter has certainly arrived!

I am very excited to announce there is a dedicated team working on the Year 6 into 7 transition and the first of the formal transition events is only a few weeks away. Bourke High School is hosting an information open night on Tuesday 24th June between 4.30–6.30pm. This is a great opportunity for the families of Year 6 students to come and see what Bourke High School has to offer in relation to curricular and extra-curricular activities. We encourage anyone who is interested in having a look at the school or who has questions to come along and chat with our dedicated staff. Over the next 2 weeks, your child will be participating in the NSW Public Schools Survey. This has replaced the Tell Them From Me Survey making the survey more specific to education and more user friendly for students. A notice has already been sent home for this survey giving the option for your child to opt out. The school really values your child's voice, and this is a fantastic opportunity for your child to tell us what they think we are doing well, but more importantly, letting us know where we can do things better. This is a completely anonymous survey.

We have recently been notified by the department that Keenan Cahill and Missy Prince have been made permanently attached to Bourke High School through the Temporary Workforce Transfer initiative as School Learning Support. This is really exciting and demonstrates the Department of Education values the work of long-term temporary staff. Kerrie Fullick has also been successful in gaining permanency as a School Administration Officer through a merit selection process. Congratulations to these staff.

## Principal's Report

Riana Doust has also recently been recognised as gaining her proficiency through the NSW Education Standards Authority. There is a large amount of work which goes in to creating and annotating multiple pieces of evidence on top of learning the craft of teaching as a beginning teacher. This is a great achievement. Well done, Riana!

Teaching staff are continuing to work on a professional development package around improving their Explicit Teaching strategies. Staff are continuing to focus on 'Do Nows, Learning Intentions, Success Criteria and Exit Tickets'. It has been very exciting observe staff developing their understanding of these strategies and embedding them in their classrooms, but even more so, hearing students identifying and discussing that there is common language and consistent practice in classrooms.

Bourke High School has a large range of excursions and extra-curricular activities which are a privilege for students to attend. Students will only be invited on these opportunities if they have demonstrated the Bourke High School values. This includes attending at an acceptable rate as well as behaving in a safe, respectful way and engaging in learning in the classroom.

BHS has had some great successes in recent Agriculture shows. I would like to take the opportunity to recognise the efforts of Miss Claire Burgess who tirelessly manages to keep a number of animals healthy and in great shape along with many plants in the school's Ag Plot. This even includes tending to the plants and animals (and full day excursions) on weekends. #### What is the NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) ensures that all students, including those with disabilities, receive a quality educational experience free from discrimination. It requires schools to make reasonable adjustments to support these students, collaborating with educators, families, and professionals.

#### What are Reasonable Adjustments?

Reasonable adjustments are actions taken to help students with disabilities participate in education on an equal footing with their peers. These can range from school-wide changes, like installing ramps, to classroom adaptations or individual support tailored to specific needs.

#### Who is Included in the NCCD?

The NCCD considers a wide range of disabilities, including learning difficulties and chronic health conditions. Schools determine which students are included based on the adjustments they require, observations, and any relevant medical diagnoses.

#### How is Information Collected and Used?

Each year, schools collect data on the students' receiving adjustments, including their year level and type of disability. This information helps improve education policies and funding, ensuring support for students with disabilities is embedded in everyday school practices.

#### Privacy Protection

The NCCD prioritises student privacy by collecting data without personal identifiers. Ensuring confidentiality is a key aspect of the process.
