Amina returned home with 7 gold, 2 silver, and 1 bronze medals across a range of events, 7 gold 2 silver and 1 bronze medal in Paris, placing her in 1st place in the under 18 years level – a truly remarkable feat.

Our Yr 11 students participated in a 'Transition to Further Education' workshop that aimed to prepare them for both the HSC and life after school.




VET Crew Identity

Train replacement buses

Sydenham to Bankstown - Making way for Sydney Metro

The NSW Government announced the T6 Lidcombe & Bankstown Line will close for approximately two months due to Sydney Metro construction work.

From Sunday 27 April to Sunday 29 June 2025, fare-free buses will replace T6 trains between Lidcombe and Bankstown.

During this time, T3 Liverpool & Inner West Line trains will continue to run between Liverpool and the City via Lidcombe, and Southwest Link bus services will run as normal between Sydenham and Bankstown.

T6 rail replacement bus routes

T6 trains between Lidcombe and Bankstown will be replaced the following fare-free bus routes:

- 8T6: Bankstown, all stations to Lidcombe and return (up to every 8 minutes on weekdays)
- 8AT6: Bankstown, express to Lidcombe and return (up to every 8 minutes on weekdays)

The diagram below shows bus routes 8T6 and 8AT6 and available connections to T1, T2 and T3 and Southwest Link buses.



Before travelling, it's important that students plan their journey and allow extra travel time.
