






















One story about NAIDOC:

Students focused on creating sets of architectural drawings. character illustrations. or product developments.















MATHS - STEM - ENGINEERING STUDIES

It has been another busy and exciting term in the Mathematics and STEM learning areas, with students across all year groups engaging in hands-on, challenging, and creative projects.

Year 7 Mathematics students explored experimental probability versus theoretical probability, comparing their predictions with real-life trial outcomes to deepen their understanding of chance.

Year 8 Mathematics students successfully completed their algebra unit, strengthening their problem-solving skills and preparing for more advanced applications of mathematics.

Year 9 STEM students have handed in their mission patch designs for the Australian Virtual Astronaut Challenge and are now beginning the ambitious task of designing ideas for a home base on Mars.

Year 10 STEM have started investigating the UN Sustainable Development Goals. They recently took part in a speed round of the Start-Up Showdown, designing innovative companies to tackle global problems. Soon, they will be creating prototypes of their very own solutions to some of the world's biggest challenges, which will be showcased to both school and industry

experts. Alongside this, Year 10 STEM students are also working on prototypes for their major projects.

Year 10 Mathematics, students have been strengthening their understanding of algebraic expressions, with one class participating in a creative breakout challenge to apply and showcase their skills.

Year 11 Engineering Studies students are diving into the world of technical drawing, focusing on sectioned views.

Year 12 Engineering Studies are analysing past HSC papers to identify key patterns in questions and have also been investigating crystalline structures in a handson experiment using lemonade icy poles!

Year 12 Mathematics students are demonstrating high-leverage strategies in their revision, preparing effectively for their upcoming HSC exams.

It's been an inspiring term filled with problem-solving, creativity, and innovation. We look forward to seeing the outcomes of these projects in the coming weeks.










PDHPE

SPECIAL ED






The piece shows the journey from sadness to hope. The blue hand represents struggle, isolation and despair. The gold hand shines as a symbol of light, joy and giving. Where the



LEARNING AND SUPPORT

With the HSC examinations beginning in Term 4, Learning Support have been working alongside students and their families who are applying for disability provisions. Year 12 students who intend to apply should have their forms submitted no later than Friday Week 10 of Term 3. If your student requires new forms, or you are seeking further information regarding provisions, please contact a member of Learning Support to discuss.

Earlier this term, students in Years 7 to 9 participated in the Check-In assessment. The Check-in assessment is an annual online assessment for students in Years 3 to 9 in NSW Public Schools. These results have been released to teachers, who will be using it to inform their next steps in teaching and learning. The data collected from this assessment aids schools and teachers in identifying student strengths and areas for development, and in selecting differentiation strategies based on student need.

This term, Casula High School was selected to participate in The Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA). PISA is a worldwide study by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation Development (OECD) that measures 15-year-old students' academic performance in mathematics, and science. The results help assess the equity of the Australian school system and identify areas for growth and improvement. We would like to thank all students and families who participated in this study and look forward to seeing the data it produces.

We wish all students and families a safe and happy break and look forward to an exciting close to the year in Term 4.

TEACHING AND LEARNING

Staff have recently engaged in Professional Learning focused on Explicit and Direct Instruction (EDI). Our recent staff meeting comprised of individuals devising definitions of EDI and how they lead it within their classrooms. Staff had the opportunity to share their thoughts and beliefs around EDI within groups, while evidencing its impact that has been seen across the school. Mental health and wellbeing support

Headspace have some great advice on common responses and concerns and what you can do to for extra support.

Safe Haven is a place you can go if you're feeling distressed or having suicidal thoughts It is a safe place where you can talk openly about how you are feeling and what you're going through. You can talk to a peer-support worker who may have experienced what you're going through, or to a mental health professional.
