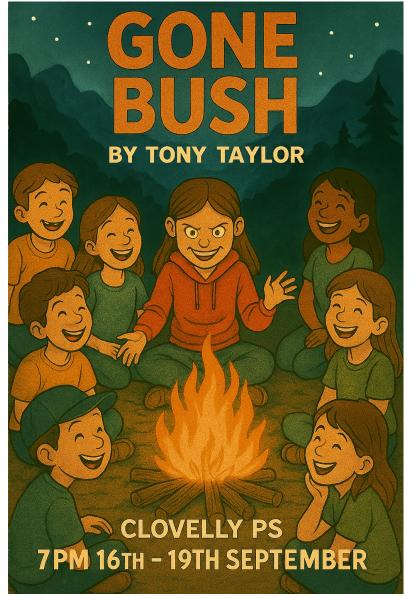

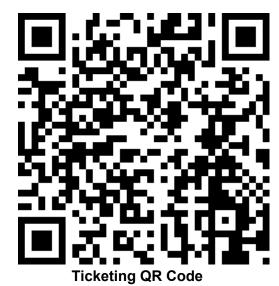

The Anxiety Project - Cognitive Distortions and Open- Ended Questions

Our Anxiety Project lessons continue in the classrooms this term and one area we have found helpful as a staff to explore when supporting students is the concept of Cognitive Distortions. Emotional reasoning

Emotional reasoning refers to the acceptance of one's emotions as fact. It can be described as "I feel it, therefore it must be true." Just because we feel something doesn't mean it is true. Can you think of any factual evidence that supports your idea? What other explanations could there possibly be, in your situation? If you were in a better mood - on another day - would this situation seem different?

Disqualifying the positive

This distortion acknowledges positive experiences but rejects them instead of embracing them. Can you think of a reason you could accept this as a positive / happy experience? Are you ignoring some of the evidence that you might have done ok? I know you find it difficult to accept that you deserve this result (situation, achievement) but what did it take for you to get here? Can you see how it was your effort that paid off?

Mind reading

This "Jumping to Conclusions" distortion manifests as the inaccurate belief that we know what another person is thinking and it is usually something negative. How do you know this? What are some alternative explanations for this? Where is the evidence? How do you know that X thinks, feels or intends that?

All or nothing thinking

This distortion manifests as an inability or unwillingness to see shades of gray. In other words, you see things in terms of extremes – something is either fantastic or awful. I know you think that that one thing went badly but is there anything that went well with what you did? Is there a middle ground here - one where you can see things a bit more compassionately? Can you imagine an 'in-between' where things are not perfect but by the same token they are not a disaster?

Catastrophising

This is a habit of skewing your perspective. This distortion involves exaggerating the meaning, importance, or likelihood of things. What would you tell a friend who had these catastrophic thoughts? Are you jumping ahead of yourself? If you looked at this situation with less emotion, what other words might you use to describe it? How would an objective observer (like a more mature friend) see this situation?

These are some examples, but there are many more and you will be able to come up with some of your own. Don't worry if you can't accurately identify the cognitive distortion, just ask a question that seems to challenge the faulty thinking.

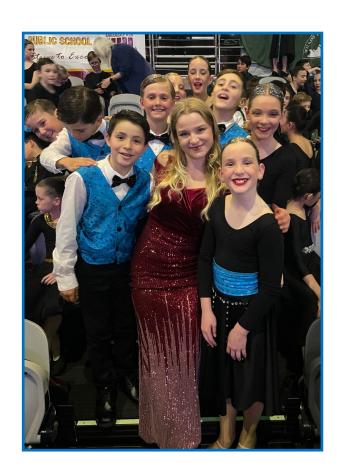




Dancesport

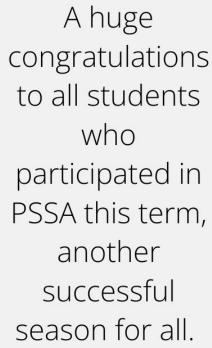

Thursday, 11 September (Week 8) is R U OK? Day.

R U OK? is a charity that inspire and empower everyone to meaningfully connect with the people around them. They have a mission to get everyone having more conversations to check-in with each other to see how they are doing and to provide people with the skills and confidence to do this.

> It is all about what we can do to help our friends, our classmates and our family to get through tough times.

The organisation holds a dedicated R U OK? Day annually on the second Thursday of September, which encourages Australians to connect with people who have emotional insecurity, to address social isolation and promote community cohesiveness. The theme for this year's campaign is "Ask R U OK? Any Day" because life happens every day. A lot can happen in a year, a month, a week. Whether it's your friend, family member, colleague, partner, or teammate, the people you care about go through life's ups and downs every day. By having regular, meaningful conversations, you build trust and normalise talking about what's really going on, so when the people in your world find themselves struggling, they know you're someone they can talk to.

You don't need to be an expert to reach out - just a good friend and a great listener.

A Conversation Could Change a Life

Got a feeling that someone you know or care about isn't behaving as they normally would? Perhaps they seem out of sorts? More agitated or withdrawn? Or they're just not themselves. Trust that gut instinct and act on it. Learn more about the signs and when it's time to ask R U OK? https://www.ruok.org.au/signs



By starting a conversation and commenting on the changes you've noticed, you could help that family member, friend or workmate open up. If they say they are not OK, you can follow the R U OK? conversation steps to show them they're supported and help them find strategies to better manage the load. Should children be asking each other if they are ok?

YES! It's all about learning how to be a kind and respectful friend, classmate or team mate and that's an important life skill and it's important that children are learning it early. It's not up to kids to fix a friend's problem (you don't have to fix a person's problem) they just have to listen and show they are a support. They CAN notice if a friend is struggling, make the time to listen and encourage them to speak to a trusted adult if they do need support.

Sometimes we find we are the ones asking someone if they are okay, however, other times we may need to be the one who is asked. So, by encouraging children to look out for their friends and have these conversations we are helping them build the skills to be strong and to trust in their relationships throughout their life.

The acronym ALEC is a useful 4-step model to have a conversation that could change a life:

- 1. Ask R U OK?
- 2. Listen
- 3. Encourage action
- 4. Check in

Dr Hannah Brown (Campaign Manager for Education and Young People at R U OK?) outlines what this 4 step model can look like for a parent having a conversation with a child. She advises that for different people we have these conversations in different ways, depending on our relationship to the person. A parent talking to a child will look a little different to a child talking to another child. Generally the steps are:



A - Ask

Sit down with them. Pick your moments so you have time to connect, and you are not rushing to get out the door. Use the **Notice, Ask model.** This is where you say I've noticed that you (insert a change in behaviour) have been a bit quiet lately/playing with your friends, is everything okay/what has been happening?

L - Listen

Often parents feel they need to have a solution, however, often kids just want to talk, and they just want to be listened to. So not having the stress of 'oh my goodness my child is going through this how will I help them?' Just give them the space to talk to you.

E - Encourage Action

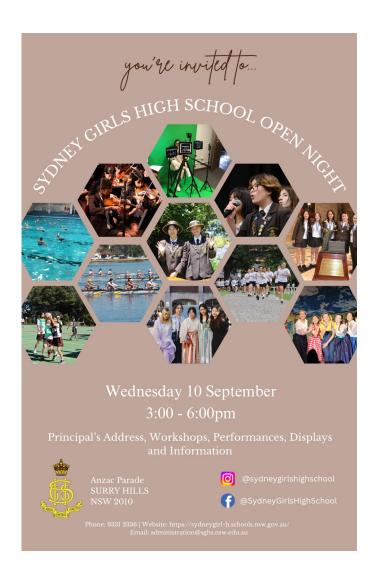
This step will change depending on the situation, however, it might be working with your child to see 'what do you think might be a solution to what you are going through?' Whether it's having a problem with a friend – what do you think we could do? Work **together** with your child to come up with some actions to take.

C - Check-in

A couple of days later or a week after this initial conversation just check-in- with your child. "Hey, how are things going since we had that conversation a couple of days ago?

This shows that it's not just a one-off conversation, that you are there to support them for the long haul.
