- FROM THE PRINCIPAL -

We are now mid-term, Term 2, and I am happy to say that the school has been running smoothly. We started the term with students participating in the ANZAC services, march, and our own ANZAC assembly at school. It was great to be a part of our school delegation for the march and to also see several of our students participating in other organisations, such as the local cadet units. It was also good news that council reversed their decision regarding school use of the CEX stadium so that we were again able to use the venue to host our school athletics carnival. Our school does not have a full size oval and so without the use of this facility it would have been extremely difficult to manage an athletics carnival with so many students at a more open public venue.

Cold and Flu Season

I have included advice below regarding whooping cough following notification of student illness. It is a timely reminder that we are entering the winter cold and flu season, on top of the lingering COVID pandemic and the occasional outbreak of illnesses such as whooping cough. While we really want all of our students to attend school all of the time, this is only if they are well enough to do so. I would encourage students who are unwell, especially if they have cold or flu symptoms, to stay at home. This will both help the student to recover faster as well as help prevent the further spread of illness. We ask parents and carers to notify the school to explain your child's absence for our records. While I have no doubt that we will have days when we will have a number of staff absent once we progress further into the cold and flu season, I would note that we have so far been able to avoid any minimal supervision due to the way we have pre-employed additional staff as "in-built" relief for absent teachers. This means that it is most likely that any impact on student learning from teacher absences during winter months will be minimised.

Year 7 - 2025

For those parents with Year 6 students transitioning to high school next year, we have already planned a number of activities over the coming months to help familiarise Year 6 students with high school. We have had our peer support leaders out into primary schools supporting activities and events this term. We are also running a Year 6/7 inter-school trivia competition late this term. Moving into next term, there will be a number of visits to primary schools from our transition team and students, including our Year 6 Adviser – Mr Darby Pearce. We are also currently finalising our processes around the Year 7 E-Class, following parent, student and teacher interviews and survey feedback. We expect to advertise this early next term with information sessions outlining the purpose of the class and the application process, with applications due around mid-Term 3.

Whooping Cough

There has been a recent increase of whooping cough (pertussis) amongst primary-school-aged children and a modest increase in high schools.

Coughing spreads the infection to others nearby. Whooping cough caught at school can spread to any younger brothers and sisters at home. Whooping cough can be especially dangerous for babies. Whooping cough starts like a cold and progresses to bouts of coughing that can last for many weeks. Older children may just have a cough that is persistent and is worse at night. The infection can occur even in fully-vaccinated children.

- · Children with symptoms should see a GP.
- · If your doctor diagnoses whooping cough, please let the school know and keep your child at home until they have taken 5 days of antibiotics. Keep coughing children away from babies.
- · Whooping cough vaccines give good protection against infection but immunity fades. If your school-aged child has younger siblings, it's a good idea to check that they are up to date with their vaccines.



Thank you to Mr Valentine, Ms Munro and Ms Bevand for coaching the teams and giving up your time to organise training sessions.






Rugby League

The Stage 5 Industrial Technology: Multimedia course is currently merging creative design with practical application. Students are actively involved in the development of their own board games, encompassing all stages from concept to completion.

This term project involves designing game layouts and assets, utilising software skills developed last term. Beyond the core gameplay elements, students are further challenged to develop clear and concise instruction manuals, ensuring smooth gameplay for future users. Additionally, they are exploring marketing principles by crafting engaging packaging and promotional materials and developing a well-rounded understanding of product presentation.

The creativity on display is truly impressive, with students coming up with an array of game concepts; a few of note are:

- Donut Dash: A turn-by-turn race game where players compete to capture their opponent's donuts while navigating obstacles, strategic movement, and the element of chance with special cards.
- Shark Attack!: A strategic battle unfolds as players take command of either the mighty Battleships or the cunning Sharks in a reimagined version of the classic Battleship game.
- Towering Tensions: This game puts players' skills to the test as they attempt to build a towering structure, similar to Jenga, but with a unique twist that might just topple their plans.
- The Power Struggle: Students delve into the world of politics by creating a game where citizens vie for influence against the established Parliament in an empire-building simulation akin to Monopoly.



Students are not only developing their creative vision but also acquiring practical skills in 3D printing, technical writing, and marketing fundamentals. This comprehensive approach provides them with a valuable foundation for future exploration within the ever-evolving realm of Multimedia.
