#### — FROM THE PRINCIPAL —

Welcome back to Term 3 for all of our staff and students. The theme for this newsletter is "opportunities" for our students, and there has already been a lot happening this term, and a fair bit to share with parents. I hoped this newsletter would also include photos of our yearly Agstravaganza, but this has been postponed for a few weeks until Tuesday, 2nd September, due to the weather.

#### **Subject selection**

Our school held its Year 10 into 11 subject selection evening this week—a big thank you to Ms Ellis for organising the evening. We had representatives from TAFE and the Department of Education, Educational Pathways Program, present to advise students and parents on various educational pathways. Our school gives students a choice in selecting their subjects for the HSC, so we form our classes based on students' preferences. Next year, we will be working in partnership with the other comprehensive public high schools in our area, Toormina HS and Orara HS, to see if there are some subjects we can run across schools, to give all our students an even greater choice. Coffs Harbour HS is one of only two Coffs Harbour schools in the NSW Government's Education Pathways Program. This program directly supports our students wanting to engage in school-based traineeships and apprenticeships, helping connect with employers and educational programs. This support is not available to other schools, so we are very fortunate to receive it.

As a parent and an experienced principal across multiple schools over the last 15 years, I realise that the transition from Years 10 to 11 is significant and often a point at which children or parents may look at options at other schools. Sometimes the lure of different settings can seem irresistible, but I would encourage caution in moving schools at this stage of a child's schooling. Each year, I find that several students return to our school partway into Year 11 after finding things were not quite what they expected, with the unfortunate reality that, in some cases, the subjects they wanted to study are already full. In most cases, children have attended our school for the last four years and have developed strong relationships with their peers, the school and our staff. We know our students well and are in a position to nurture and support them further to complete school successfully. The lure of different settings may give the appearance of greater freedoms, but sometimes this greater freedom can result in further distractions and adjustments that might impact a child's education.

#### – FROM THE PRINCIPAL —

As a father of two, my children went to Coffs Harbour High School through to Year 12. They had outstanding teachers and were well cared for and supported. Our Careers Adviser assisted my son in applying for early entry at Southern Cross University, and he has recently completed a double degree in Business and Law. During this time, he has worked within our court system and has just completed his Practical Legal Training working with the Aboriginal Legal Service. This training is the final requirement for his appointment as a practising lawyer, which I will be privileged to attend at the NSW Supreme Court later this year. He aspires to be in public service and wants to practise law within our court system, maybe one day becoming a magistrate or barrister. My daughter is completing a Bachelor of Nursing with Charles Sturt University and would like to work in rural areas, again, in public service. Both my children benefited from their public education. It gave them the self-discipline, motivation, values and skills they needed to be successful. I doubt they would have achieved as well as anywhere else.

#### **Trial HSC**

I wish our Year 12 students the best for the Trial HSC exams, which began last week. The school sets aside money and resources to employ external invigilators to supervise our senior exams. Many of these invigilators are the same staff who oversee the final HSC exams in Term 4. This means we can run our senior exams under almost the same conditions as the actual HSC to better prepare our students. We have found that this makes the final HSC exams a much more familiar experience for students and helps them to achieve their best. Our Year 11 exams will follow Year 12 next week, and this experience will similarly help prepare our students for the rigour of exam conditions.

#### Resilience in our Teens (RIOT)

After a discussion amongst our school executive staff and several other schools in the Coffs Harbour and surrounding areas, I am thrilled to announce that we have decided to engage in the Resilience in Our Teens program from the start of 2026. Several NSW secondary schools have implemented this evidence-based program to help teenagers learn skills to manage anxiety and build resilience by engaging "the significant adults" in their lives in training. The program specifically addresses anxiety in high school students using proven CBT early intervention strategies. It improves teachers' abilities to identify and manage student anxiety. In particular, it includes parents in a whole-of-community response to student anxiety. The program will involve training for all school staff, special lessons for all students, parent workshops, webinars, and support so that parents/carers are equipped with the knowledge and skills to help their children build resilience. I am very much looking forward to the staff training in the coming months and the rollout of this program next year.

#### **Concussion management**

Before I get into all the other happenings in the school, I need to draw the attention of parents and carers to the severe issue of concussion management. I made parents aware of this last year with changes to concussion management affecting all NSW schools. The Department of Education's policy and procedures around concussion management mirror those of most sporting organisations, based on the most recent medical advice. Whilst concussion has proven to be a significant issue for adults participating in contact sports, it is an even more serious matter when impacting children, given the ongoing development of their growing brains. Accordingly, we treat concussion very seriously, and I am asking parents and carers to assist us in keeping their children safe concerning this issue.

#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL —

Any student who experiences a suspected concussion during a school-endorsed activity will be removed from the activity, and parents/carers will be advised that medical follow-up is required. Similarly, suppose the school is informed by a parent/carer that a child has suffered a concussion. In that case, we will ensure that staff know that the student cannot participate in vigorous or competitive school sport or physical activities for 21 days from the concussion date. We will remove this restriction if a parent/carer provides medical clearance before this date.

Parents and carers can assist the school by ensuring that they contact the school's admin office to inform us if their child has suffered a concussion outside of school. This will allow us to put in the appropriate management and arrangements for the student. As always, your cooperation in this issue is greatly appreciated.

#### Royal Australian Navy 725 Squadron helicopter visit

I want to finish my newsletter report on a "high" note by sharing the recent experience of our students when our school was visited by a Navy Seahawk helicopter last Friday. I was recently approached by Lieutenant Noah Learoyd, a helicopter pilot from HMAS Albatross at Nowra, about the possibility of landing a helicopter on our school oval so that our students could have this incredible up-close experience and talk to Navy support and air crews about their role and the Sea Hawk helicopter they operate. I, of course, said, "Yes, please!" This was an excellent opportunity for our students, whether they were interested in a career in the military, the Royal Australian Navy specifically, or even aviation in general.

725 Squadron operate the Sea Hawk helicopter, and their squadron has an ongoing relationship with the City of Coffs Harbour. They visited Coffs Harbour last weekend for a "Freedom of Entry" to the city parade and had three helicopters in the area for a flyover and display for the public. An invitation was sent to all the careers advisers at high schools in the Coffs area, so we were joined by students from Toormina High School for this unique experience. I will leave you with some photos from the event below.

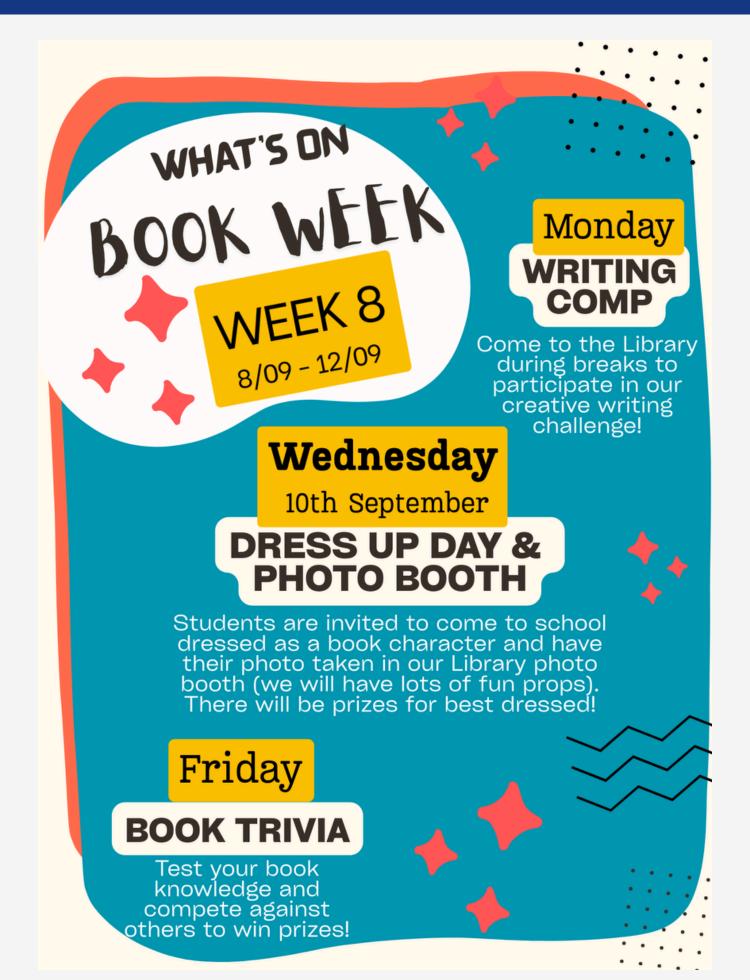

Throughout the week, students displayed outstanding participation, determination and behaviour both at the Sport and Rec Centre and on the slopes. Their willingness to have a go, support one another and show perseverance was recognised by staff, instructors and even members of the public, who commented on the positive attitude and conduct of our school group.

A highlight of each day was free skiing and boarding time, where students were able to put their new skills into practice, explore the slopes with friends and celebrate their progress. Is your child struggling with sleep? Is it hard to wake them in the morning?

Sleep Ninja is an app that can help you and your child master sleep. It is currently the only app available that has been codesigned with parents/carers, their teens, and mental health experts that has been shown to be effective in helping young people improve their sleep and reduce signs of depression.

It is designed for use during the day, not at bedtime, and helps teens master their sleep over six weeks by:

- Teaching them about the importance and role of sleep
- Helping them become aware of any habits contributing to poor sleep (e.g., sleep environment, daytime routine, bedtime routine).
- Teaching both behavioural and cognitive strategies to change their unhelpful sleep patterns

#### Tips on introducing Sleep Ninja® to your child

You can play an influential role in helping your child get the most out of Sleep Ninja®, especially in terms of engagement and participation.

Below are some key points we suggest familiarising yourself with before talking to your child about Sleep Ninja®.



#### Checking in is important

Remember to check in on their use of Sleep Ninja®. You may like to ask them how they are going tracking their sleep and support them to create a sleep environment with minimal distractions. Discuss any barriers that have come up and help them to problem-solve these.



#### Get to know the app

Get to know the key features and how the program works. Demonstrating that you know what's in the app and that you think it's helpful is a significant first step in building confidence with the young person.



#### **Getting started**

If they seem nervous or unsure, suggest looking at it together another time or ask if they prefer to work with the app alone. If that's the case, let the young person know they can talk to you about what they learn or think of the app or if they have any questions.



#### Downloading the app

Suggest sitting down with your child and helping them download the app and get started.



#### Encourage your child to:

- Use the app regularly (during the day, not before bedtime).
- > Track their sleep when the app prompts them to do each morning.
- > Use the 'wind down routine' in the evenings.
