


Stage 5 have been hard at work completing their discursive writing assessment tasks, exploring and comparing different aspects of their identity against other composers.



This term, Stage 5 students have been exploring the world of biomes in Geography. Biomes are geographical areas characterised by the types of plants and animals found within them. Students have explored the interrelation between biomes and climate and have created their own climate graphs measuring average monthly temperatures and precipitation. They have also examined how human actions, particularly resource extraction, impact the various biomes in Australia. Central to the study of Geography and to the curriculum more generally is the idea of sustainability and students in Stage Five have been encouraged to reflect on how we can all act more sustainably in relation to the environments we live in. As part of their assessment, students were invited to suggest their own sustainability practices to support the protection and maintenance of different biomes around the world.

Relocating school signs around Coomealla High School, Dareton

Community Notification

August 2025





Transport for NSW acknowledges the Barkindji people as the Traditional Custodians of the lands and waterways on which we work and pays respect to Elders past and present.

Transport for NSW will relocate school signs and paint new line markings around Silver City Highway and Tallawalla Road, Dareton from Monday 8 September.

This work will improve visibility of the school speed zone limit around Coomealla High School, improving safety for school students and other pedestrians.

What work are we doing?

Work includes:

- installing new static and flashing school zone signs and posts
- new line marking, including 'dragon's teeth' to alert drivers to reduce speed.

When we'll be working

We'll be working up to four day shifts between Monday 8 September and Friday 12 September 2025, weather permitting.

Our working hours are **9.30am to 2.30pm, Monday to Friday**. We will not work on Saturday or Sunday.

Why are school zones important?

The 40 km/h speed limits in school zones help protect children on their way to and from schools, during busy times at the start and end of school days. The lower speed limit reduces the risk and potential severity of a crash. School zone signs, road markings and flashing lights help improve the visibility of school zones.

What will this mean for you?

You may notice:

- workers and vehicles
- traffic controllers and signs.

Changes to traffic conditions and reduced speed limits may be in effect while we are working.

Managing our impacts

We aim to manage our work to avoid impacts to the community and the environment.

This includes:

- turning off equipment when not in use
- · reducing our noise as much as possible.

Traffic and pedestrian impacts


There will be temporary traffic changes while we complete this work. This includes lane closures and a reduced speed limit.

Please keep to the speed limits and follow the direction of traffic control and signs.

Traffic control will assist pedestrians through the work area if required.



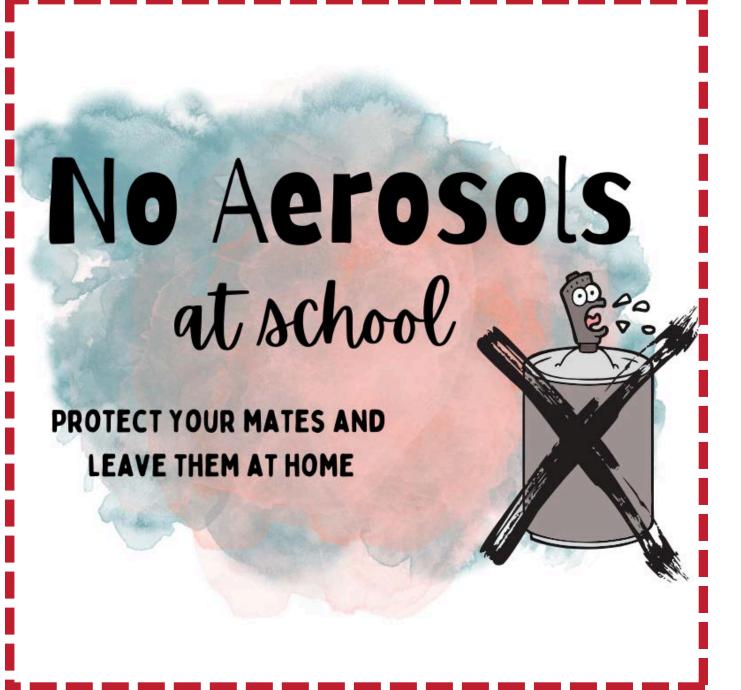

If you, or someone you know, are feeling worried or no good, we encourage you to connect with 13YARN on 13 92 76 (24 hours/7 days) and talk with an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Crisis Supporter.

This is your story; your journey and we will take the time to listen. No shame, no judgement, safe place to yarn. We're here for you.

Our vision is to achieve a nation free of suicide. We know the current statistics for suicide and self-harm for Aboriginal people are disproportionately high. To tackle this problem head-on, this service will be led by an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Advisory Board and employ professionals in suicide prevention and crisis support utilising Lifeline's extensive experience and infrastructure.



13YARN is an Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander crisis support line funded by the Australian Government with the support of Lifeline and developed in collaboration with Gayaa Dhuwi (Proud Spirit) Australia. It is run by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

We have co-designed this line using Lifeline expertise with several Aboriginal mental health professionals including NACCHO, Black Dog Institute Aboriginal Lived Experience team and the Centre for Excellence in Suicide Prevention along with input from Torres Strait Islander, remote, regional, and urban peoples with lived experience.

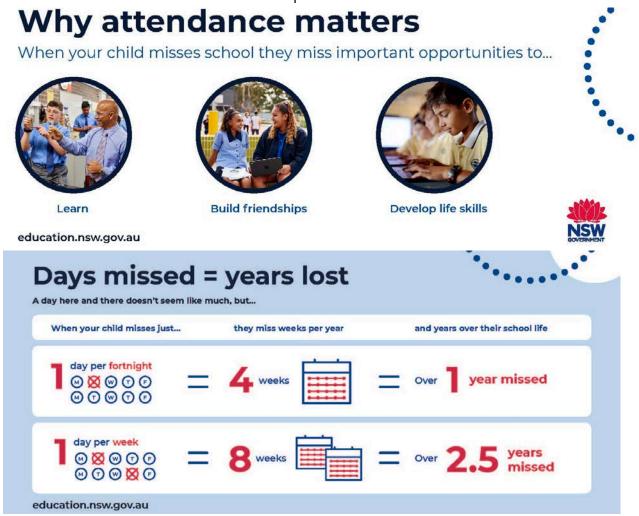

VALUES CHART






INTEREACH
