PRINCIPAL'S AWARD

Our Merit Award system started in 2010 and is accumulative across each year a student is at Crestwood High School. So, from arrival in year 7 until now all the awards achieved count toward the achievement of a Principal Award and Crestwood has now achieved its 13th recipient.

To achieve a Crestwood Principal Award a student must receive 3 Crestwood Gold Awards.

To break this down, a student must have a minimum of 27 Bronze Awards of which at least 1 is an Academic Bronze Award being 10 teacher issued Academic Awards across any KLA per Gold. Students need 9 Silver Awards to achieve the 3 Gold's. This gives the student a Principal Award.

This student has contributed to the school community through Sport as well as many Academic & AIM awards. She has achieved 152 teacher issued awards over the last 5 years in order to qualify for her Principal's Award. Congratulations on this extraordinary achievement goes to Ella Dickson of Year 11.

WELFARE NEWS

The teenage years are often marked by rapid growth, exploration, and a search for identity. Yet, in today's digital age, teenagers face challenges previous generations never encountered: constant comparison, exposure to unattainable beauty standards, and an intense pressure to fit in. A large survey of Australian teenagers found that 46% did not feel confident or secure in themselves, while 54% were worried about not fitting in, and nearly half were unhappy with the way they look (Waters, 2011). This environment can lead to self-doubt, low self-worth, and a longing for belongingness.

Let's look at these key challenges and explore practical ways that we can support teens in building lasting self-confidence and self-worth.

<u>Tips to build confidence and self-worth in your</u> adolescents

Encourage Self-Reflection Instead of Comparison

Tip: Teach teens to use social media mindfully. Encourage them to focus on their own progress rather than comparing themselves to others. Reflection exercises, such as journaling about personal goals and achievements, can help teens see their growth and strengths.



Promote a Healthy View of Beauty and Strengths

Tip: There is some wonderful PDH-PE content and other program initiatives that help students talk openly about the editing and filtering that goes into images they see online. Highlight diverse role models who embrace authenticity and uniqueness over perfection. This can help teens appreciate their own natural qualities and focus on inner strengths.



Foster Growth Mindset to develop resilience

Tip: Remind teens that setbacks and challenges are part of growth. Praise their effort, determination, and learning rather than focusing solely on outcomes. This can help reduce feelings of inadequacy and boost confidence by seeing each experience as a step toward personal growth.

Support Positive Social Connections and Belonging

Tip: Help teens identify friends who uplift them and encourage authenticity. Involvement in sport, hobbies, youth groups and activities where they feel accepted and valued can also support their need for belonging without the pressure to conform.



Teach the Power of Self-Care and Boundaries

Tip: Encourage teens to prioritise self-care activities that make them feel good, like exercise, creative hobbies, or downtime. Emphasise the need to set boundaries with digital media to protect their mental and emotional wellbeing, but don't just leave them to master it alone – work with them together on setting boundaries as they still need adults to be involved.



Navigating the challenges of adolescence in today's world can be overwhelming, but with the right tools and support, teens can build self-worth and confidence. By shifting the focus from comparison to personal growth, helping them find belonging in healthy spaces, and reinforcing positive self-care, we can empower the next generation to thrive with resilience and authenticity.

MATHS MUSINGS

It is a busy time for assessments, with Years 7 and 8 having completed their tasks, Years 9 and 10 in Week 5 and Years 11 and 12 with tasks later this term.

All students should be thinking about how to maximise their performance, both now and into the future, as Maths topics will build on themselves in upcoming units of work.

CONSISTENCY

The best way to achieve this is through -

- A consistent study pattern.
- Revising current and past work each night, even for a few minutes, helps the brain to retain information better and leads to a deeper understanding of the content.

There are many options, including practicing questions from the textbook, Mathspace, or asking your teacher for specific work.

Your teachers can help you, but only you can do the work!

On this day in 1576, Tycho Brahe was given use of the island of Hven (now Ven in Sweden) for his astronomical observatory. He built two observatories: Uraniborg and Stjerneborg. The observations made by Brahe and others led to a greater understanding of our universe. He was also an important figure in the development of early medicine, and the inspiration for a number of poets including Edgar Allen Poe.

HSIE HAPPENINGS



Luna Park is the business case study that is our focus for this upcoming Year 11 extended response assessment task.

To enable students to develop a deep understanding of Luna Park as a business, we visited Luna Park on Friday 9th May to experience the park operations. Students immersed themselves in the experience as a way to better understand the business. They rode the rides and experienced other elements of the park such as the food & beverage outlets. They completed a worksheet about Luna Park throughout the day to help them build up their case study knowledge and understanding of how the business operates.

YEAR 11 BUSINESS STUDIES - LUNA PARK

An important element of the HSC Business Studies course is the requirement for students to write a case study extended response. This requires students to develop an indepth knowledge and understanding of case study businesses in the context of the Business Studies syllabus dot points. During the Year 11 Preliminary course, students are learning how to write this style of extended response as preparation for starting Year 12.



Students in Year 12 Software Engineering have successfully completed their major software projects, showcasing months of hard work, creativity, and technical skills.






INTERACTIVE GAMES


Stage 6 Work Experience!


















New Playground Activities!


