Graduating year 12 marks the culmination of 13 years of schooling, hard work, perseverance and growth. It is a moment of pride and reflection.

To Year 12, this evening is a tribute to you and your achievements. You have faced challenges with courage and embraced opportunities, and we are proud and privileged to celebrate your growth, your spirit, and the bright futures that lie ahead.

As we celebrate your graduation, I want to take you back to where your high school journey began — in 2020, when you first walked through the doors of Crestwood as year 7 students. Some

students have described walking through the gates, "like being a small fish in a big ocean". Nervous and uncertain, you walked into a new environment, met new teachers and new classmates.


The transition to high school can be challenging, let alone some 8 weeks later when the school went into the first of two lockdowns due to the COVID-19 pandemic. COVID profoundly disrupted traditional learning, forcing a rapid shift to online education that challenged both you as students and us as teachers. Even the most experienced of us could not have imagined a world where virtual classrooms became a central part of daily teaching and learning.

This lasted 7 weeks and the classroom environment transformed into online learning, "Oodies" became the uniform of choice, and teachers insisted cameras remain on to check that students were present. The second lock down, a little over 12 months later, would last 3 months where online learning extended for all of Term 3 and into the first two weeks of Term 4. It was new territory for us all, but as year 7 & 8 students you had to adapt quickly....and you did. Adaptability allows us to overcome challenges and embrace new opportunities in any situation, fostering personal growth.

Social media became an even more vital way to keep in touch, with social platforms such as TikTok exploding in popularity, creating connections beyond the school gates. While it gave students greater access to information and avenues to express themselves, teachers and parents had to guide individuals on safe and responsible online behaviour, helping them understand privacy settings, and encouraging a balanced approach to screen time.

One of the traditions you did get to do throughout high school was to attend all 3 camps - in year 7, 9 and 11. Not every year group given the impact of COVID can say they attended all 3 camps. There were carnivals, excursions, commerce market days, Relay for Life fundraiser, leadership camps, sausage sizzle fundraisers, knock out sports competitions, public speaking events, Model UN events, competitions and more and your participation in these activities enriched your experience, helped you discover new interests, and built a strong sense of community and belonging.







Years 7 to 10 was filled with fun activities like woodwork, art, cooking, grade sport, and elective subjects - where there was more time to explore creativity and enjoy hands-on learning. As you moved into Years 11 and 12, the focus shifted more towards academics, with a greater emphasis on study and preparation for your future.

As you worked hard to master challenging content in year 11 and 12, the quality of the student-teacher relationship has truly strengthened through a common purpose and a desire to get the best outcomes for you. These interactions have not only helped you grow academically but have built a strong bond of support and understanding. They say, "it takes a village to raise a child", and this idea holds true within our school community as well. Raising good individuals is a collective effort that involves not only parents but also teachers, office staff, canteen staff, school counsellors, student support officers, school learning support officers, exam invigilators, band conductors, general assistants and many others who contribute to the daily life of the school community. Each member of this "village" plays a vital role in supporting students' growth, providing guidance, care, and encouragement. Together, we aim to create a nurturing and inclusive environment where every student feels valued and empowered to reach their full potential.

Some of you have grumbled along the way about school rules and expectations, but it is only in time that you will gain an appreciation of how this fosters responsibility and positive behaviour and promotes safety and respect. The camaraderie of shared experiences—whether it was surviving a difficult exam, working well into the early morning to hand in an assessment task or laughing with friends about a situation or inside joke that no one else understands, these connections with your friends and peers give you a sense of belonging.









In the last few weeks, many of you have reminisced about experiences and memories that come to mind. Two students have told me in the last week that they think school should start later than 8.30 am as is too early. To the basketballers who play every day at recess and lunch, I know these connections will remain beyond the school yard. Even the handball games being played in the COLA seem to have taken on Olympic status in the last few months, perhaps in the knowledge that they will not last forever. To the musicians, I hope that your love of music is only the start of something great beyond school, inspiring you to continue building and sharing your talents.

To the leaders, public speakers, and dancers, your passion and dedication have the power to inspire change and bring people together. May you go on to achieve great things, using your talents to make a positive impact in the world.

To the Year 12 students in the Support Unit, your strengths and kindness have made a lasting impact on your teachers and peers alike. You have shown incredible resilience and growth throughout your time at school. We are all going to deeply miss your positive spirit and contributions you bring to the classroom every day. Every Minute Counts - The Importance of Being On Time

At Crestwood, we understand that mornings can be a challenge. However, consistent punctuality is essential for student success and wellbeing. Arriving at school on time sets a positive tone for the day, helps young people feel settled, and ensures they don't miss vital learning opportunities.

Why is punctuality so important?

- **Smooth start to the day**: The first few minutes of the school day are when teachers explain the day's plan and establish the focus. Students who are late often miss this critical time, which can impact their ability to engage and feel confident.
- **Social connections**: Morning routines help children build relationships with peers and teachers. Arriving late can lead to feelings of disconnection or anxiety.

• **Learning time adds up**: Being just 10 minutes late each day adds up to over 6 days of lost learning over the course of a year.

What DECS Guidelines Say

The Department for Education (DECS) regards punctuality as a key aspect of school attendance. Schools are required to:

- Record all instances of lateness.
- Follow up with families when patterns of lateness emerge.
- Provide support where needed to help improve punctuality.

We understand that lateness may occasionally be unavoidable due to unforeseen circumstances. If this is the case, we ask that you notify us if this occurs. At Crestwood High School students will receive a lunch-time detention for being late to school if there is no reason provided to the school.

Supporting Families

We are here to work with families to reduce barriers to punctual attendance. If you're experiencing difficulties that make it hard to get your child to school on time, please don't hesitate to reach out. We can connect you with support services or develop a plan that works for your family.

Let's work together to ensure every child gets the best start to their day — every day.


HSIE HIGHLIGHTS



In week 4 (Mon 11th Aug - Fri 15th Aug), Crestwood students competed online in the Education Perfect International Science Championship 2025.





Students competed against 1413 schools across dozens of countries, with some exception results at both the school and personal level. Crestwood was **17th globally** out of 1413 schools, and **8th in NSW**, where 273 schools competed.

7 Students received special commendations for their effort in the competition, including one **Gold award** and one student, Bryant in Year, 8 receiving an **Elite award**, the top level of recognition available, for his incredible **6th place** in the overall worldwide competition.

Well done to all the students who participated, working hard to show the positive attitude that makes Crestwood students exceptional.








Artwork of the week



YEAR 11 END OF YEAR MAJOR PROJECTS

Our Year 11 students have been working hard this term on their major projects across Industrial Technology and Design and Technology. These projects have challenged students to apply creativity, problem-solving skills, and technical knowledge, resulting in some impressive outcomes.





INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY - TIMBER



Students in Timber have designed and constructed bedside tables, each with its own unique features. While the overall form followed the brief, students personalised their designs with individualised tabletops and creative modifications to drawer fronts and table sides. This allowed them to experiment with different woodworking techniques while producing highly functional and aesthetically pleasing pieces.

INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY -MULTIMEDIA

Multimedia students have been busy combining video production skills with digital creativity by designing and producing music videos. Their projects feature a variety of special effects and animations, with students exploring advanced editing tools and storytelling techniques. These music videos not only highlight their technical capabilities but also showcase their ability to engage an audience through visual design.







DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

In Design and Technology, students were challenged to design and create a desk lamp in a style of their choice. Each lamp incorporated at least three different production techniques and three different materials, encouraging students to think critically about design movements, functionality, and aesthetics. The results are a collection of unique and innovative lighting solutions that reflect both practical skills and imaginative thinking.







These projects have been an excellent opportunity or Year 11 students to prepare for the demands of their Year 12 Major Design Projects, while also giving them the chance to develop independence and pride in their creative work.

Windows 10 End of Support and the Consumer Extended Support Program

MPORTANT After 14 October 2025, Windows 10 Devices will no longer receive Security Updates from Microsoft

> We still have a handful of Student BYODs that are running Windows 10. Parents and Students need to be aware that once Windows 10 reaches End of Support, the lack of ongoing security updates will pose a significant and ever-increasing risk to users of Windows 10 Devices. That risk extends to everyone else sharing the same network with a device that is no longer receiving security updates.

If you cannot afford to replace an aging laptop that is still running Windows 10 before the support deadline, there is an option to extend support for your device for up to 12 months until 13 October 2026.

The following video discusses in detail and demonstrates how to access the Extended Support Program- (CNTRL+Click to follow link below, opens in a new tab). https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=l7tYo_YZkeY

If, after watching the video, you aren't confident you can carry out the required steps, please bring your laptop to Mr Kuch in the Library.

Be advised that at about 7mins 30, the guy in the video mentions installing Linux.

Linux is not a supported or recommended operating system for BYODs. It is, in most cases, impossible to successfully connect a Linux device to the **DETNSW** Enterprise Network.

Unsure if you are running Windows 10 or Windows 11?

Type WINVER in the Windows Search Box (or run winver from the command line), and a window pops open, telling you what version Windows is presently installed on your device.

If it is Windows 10, then you need to act prior to 14 October.

180 Days after signing out of the school, your DET Account will be de-activated and you will lose access to –

Your school email account (GMail)
Your Google Drive, Google Classrooms and all other
Google Applications,

Your Department of Education Office 365 subscription, and

Your NSW Department of Education "One Drive".

Any files you want to keep should be downloaded from your OneDrive before the 180-day grace period expires.

You don't need to delete unwanted files in your OneDrive or Google Drive. Anything you leave behind will be deleted automatically when your account is deactivated.
