
## **Compass Music Festival Tickets**



#### **Upcoming Events in Week 6:**



## Blue Cottage

Using information from our class text War Horse and students' note-taking of how animals were used in WWI, students have written some compelling persuasive writing about the use of horses and animals in this historic event. Students have used a range of persuasive devices to improve their writing, including: introducing their topic and outlining their opinion, facts and statistics, connectives to commence sentences, rhetorical questions and strong, emotive language to provoke thinking and appeal to the reader. Please ask your child to tell you about this and what they know.

#### Should animals have been used in WW1?

During WW1 a variety of animals were used for different tasks. These include horses, dogs, pigeons, elephants and more. I believe that animals shouldn't have been used in WW1 and will be providing reasons for this.

Firstly, it wasn't right to sell animals to the soldiers for WW1. Did you know around 8 million horses from all around the world died during this event and the ones that did survive got stuck there? This was as a result of people being broke after the war and unable to afford to bring the animals back.

Furthermore, animals had no choice, unlike people. Would you like if you were taken to WW1 given a gun and shoved onto the battlefield.

Yet that's how it was for animals.

Therefore, lots of different animals helped in WW1, these included dogs. Dogs had a lot of jobs including sentry dogs, who stayed with one soldier and guarded trenches. 


## Green Gottage


