

K-2 News

This fortnight in English, we have been looking at two fabulous, Australian narratives. Our first text, 'A Bag and a Bird' by Pamela Allen, gave us a wonderful insight into key places in Sydney and taught us that we should always put our rubbish in the bin. 'The Great Rabbit Chase' by Freya Blackwood gave us a chance to consolidate our understanding of prepositional phrases as 'Gumboots' teaches us the value of community.


We have explored the features of narratives (stories either real or imagined, that often have a message to teach us). Our newest learners have worked hard developing storyboards to highlight the main features of narratives: settings, characters and events.

They have been looking at events using either the beginning, middle and end, or, problem/solution as a way of retelling the story. Our 'Barracuda' and 'Bull Shark' tables have begun to retell narratives using time connectives such as first, then, next and at the end to support their understanding of events.

This week, 3-6 started our new English unit based on the text, Yahoo Creek: An Australian Mystery by Tohby Riddle. This is certainly a very different style of text than our first text for the year, Just Tricking. The unit focuses on developing students ability to identify different points of view presented by authors, and assess the authority and accuracy of a text.

We concluded our unit on Just Tricking by each writing a new chapter for the book. Peers then reviewed each others writing to provide feedback on which success criteria had been met.

In Mathematics, students are learning to apply efficient mental and written strategies to solve addition and subtraction problems, and use estimation to determine the reasonableness of their solution.
