### Year 12 Geography Expedition: Kosciuszko National Park - Tuesday March 18 - Friday March 21, 2025

This term, our Year 12 Geography team took part in a Doonie first and travelled south to Mt Kosciuszko to complete a four-day expedition to fulfill their NESA-mandated fieldwork hours. Our twelve students travelled with Mr Culhane and Ms Morris to meet Mr Darron Watt, Principal of Riverina EEC - a school specialising in environmental education, with experts leading students through fieldwork such as the Mt Kosciuszko climb.

### Mr Watt commented on our students:

This impression left on me has been so profound that I have returned to my school reinvigorated for public education and the possibilities that our future students will bring. After 31 years of teaching in our system, it is hard at times to remain fully charged and totally appreciative of what we have. Mr Culhane, Ms Morris, the geography students, and Doonside Technology High School had given me that little extra spark to be reminded that we are always here for our students, the community, and the benefit that they will bring to our future society.

### Reflection by Kirsten Solonga, Year 12 Geography student

Geography camp easily took the spot of being one of my most memorable experiences throughout high school. It allowed our class to establish a closer bond with each other, putting us in positions where we had to work together and encourage one another, such as our hike up Mt Kosciuszko, where the weather tested our resilience due to the rain and strong winds that reached 65km/h at the summit. Nevertheless, we still made sure that if any of us were to touch the top, we would do it together. On our first full day of staying at KNP (Kosciuszko National Park), we completed all of our paper-based fieldwork about the alpine and subalpine ecosystems around Dainers Gap, Perisher, Charlottes Pass, and Spencers Creek. Our second day was dedicated to our hike up Mt Kosciuszko, where we learnt about the galaxias fish and the change of flora and fauna as altitude increases. While it was very educational, thanks to Darron, who took us around the KNP, one of the main things it allowed me to take home was the memories we made during the camp, which I know I wouldn't be able to recreate anywhere else or with anyone else.

### Year 11 Geography Fieldwork: North Era Beach, Royal National Park - Friday February 21, 2025

To start their senior experience of Geography off with a bang, our 23 Year 11 Geography students took on North Era Beach at the Royal National Park to gather field data for their first senior assessment task: a 2000-word field report. Fieldwork is an essential component of the Year 11 Geography course, with students required to complete a minimum of 12 hours out in the field over the year to develop their understanding and application of geographical tools. The class did an amazing job encouraging each other throughout the day as they traversed rocky rainforest slopes, hot grassland hills, and rocky wavecut platforms while recording temperature, vegetation, water, and fauna observations.

A special thanks to Ms Morris and Robert Holmes, who accompanied Mr Culhane with his class. In Term 2, Year 11 Geography is looking forward to starting their Geographical Investigation - a research project on a geographical issue of their own choice. Towards the end of the term, the class will be heading to Cabramatta to complete fieldwork on cultural change within Sydney's suburbs.









Geography & Science Team Up for the 50°C: Climate, Heat and Resilience Program
A project sponsored by the Powerhouse Museum in partnership with Western Sydney University

### The program:

Since December 2024, students in 10.1, 10.3, and 10.5 Geography, in partnership with students from elective course 10iSTEM, have participated in the interdisciplinary 50°C Climate program run by the Powerhouse Museum and Western Sydney University. The purpose of this project has been to examine heatwaves and extreme urban heat in Greater Sydney through learning experiences in class, supported by their collection of data within the school. Students set up thermal sensors across 10 locations on Doonside Technology High School's campus, which recorded the temperature every 10 minutes between December 10 2024, and February 18 2025, and collected over 10,220 moments of data!

### Student Reflection: Thu Zar Khan, 10.5 Geography

I think that thermal cameras as a new technology, are an interesting way to find and identify the temperature, and it's more accurate than other ways. It was fun learning about more effective ways to stay cool and avoid heat stroke and other health problems caused by heat, and noticing how many problems there are in the community that you aren't really aware of.

### What have students been doing?

Since then, students have engaged in multiple face-to-face events to explore the challenge of increasing extreme heat, in order to develop solutions for our school and local community. These events include:

- A launch day at Parramatta Riverside theatre, to be introduced to technologies connected to climate
- Learning directly from academics such as Sebastian Pfautsch in face-to-face events and his university resources
- An immersive full-day megagame at our school
- Incursions delivered by Blacktown City Council on cool materials and Always Collective on designing with Country
- Three fortnightly meetings with industry experts and mentors, Namika and Davide, who supported students in completing their data analysis and development of recommendations
- Showcasing their projects at the 50°C Climate Summit on Frida,y April 11, with special guests such as the Deputy Secretary of NSW Education, Channel 7, the Daily Telegraph, the ABC, Powerhouse Chief Executive & Powerhouse scouts for Sydney Design Week.

### Student Reflection: Georgia Ennab, 10.3 Geography

My favourite activity we did during the heat project was playing the mega game. The reason why it was my favourite was because it taught me how heat can impact different areas around Blacktown and Parramatta unevenly & how the government is in charge of where funds are directed to.

Geography & Science Team Up for the 50°C: Climate, Heat and Resilience Program

A project sponsored by the Powerhouse Museum in partnership with Western Sydney University

### **Our projects:**

This project has inspired students' interest, participation, and understanding of this global and local problem of rising heat, and empowered them to implement changes in their communities. Together in teams, students have developed discipline-specific knowledge and skills associated with fieldwork, data science, communication, and community leadership as they build resilience in their communities through the following projects:

- **Geography with 10.1 and 10.3 Ms Kaur and Mr Bueno**: developing a heat report that analyses the heat profile of a zone within the school and designs a solution to mitigate the impacts of heat on student health, learning, and outdoor time presented to Mr Campbell;
- **Geography with 10.5 Mr Culhane**: creating a heat safe messaging campaign for a specific group in their community, in their language of choice, for DTHS social media pages;
- Elective iSTEM with Year 10 Mr James: designing a digital product that will provide a cooling effect in an identified area in DTHS, using data collected from thermal imaging (WSU), building material data (UNSW), and Blacktown Council data collection.

### Presenter Reflection - Always Collective:

I was incredibly impressed by how rooted your students are in their cultures and how respectfully they were able to embrace and connect ideas of Country. I learnt a lot from that session and those students... and I'm excited to see how their ideas develop for the Summit.

### **HPGE Intellectual**

The High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) Policy, introduced in NSW public schools in 2021, provides a framework for developing the talents of high-potential and gifted students. At Doonside Technology High School, talent development takes many different forms, such as Elevate Days, which are run once a term.

On the 28th of March, HPGE Intellectual students of year 7 and 8 participated in an Elevate Day 'Crime Story' workshop, where they were tasked with using their critical thinking skills to solve a variety of problems through the lens of a detective! The day-long workshop was set up with dual 'crime scenes' where students were able to, with guidance from former detectives, assess a variety of evidence and link said evidence to a potential narrative of what actually happened. Students were also provided with hands-on demonstrations of fingerprinting and DNA testing, and the science behind crime scene forensics. Looking forward to more exciting opportunities for our HPGE Intellectual students!







### Luna Learning: Year 11 Business Services Class Takes on Luna Park!

On 3 April, our Year 11 Business Services students took their learning beyond the classroom and into the thrilling world of Luna Park, Sydney! This unique excursion provided an exciting, hands-on opportunity to see business operations in action, reinforcing key concepts taught in the classroom while adding a touch of fun and adventure.

The day kicked off with an exclusive behind-the-scenes tour of the park, where students gained insight into business processes such as customer service, financial management, marketing, and workplace health and safety. Following the tour, students put their analytical skills to the test, evaluating different aspects of the park's business model. Students got an insight into the historical enquiry process and were given bountiful advice on how to construct their History Extension Project, which is the culmination of their studies on historiographical issues and debates in their chosen field.



### Macquarie University Ancient History Museum

On 14th March, Doonside Ancient History students were given a unique opportunity to engage with the Ancient past in a hands-on way at the Macquarie University Ancient History Museum. With the guidance of Dr Yvonne Inall, students from Years 11 and 12 were able to analyse several artefacts (some over 2000 years old!) and draw some interesting conclusions about how people of the ancient Roman town of Pompeii lived their lives. Students not only gained valuable insight from an experienced archeologist that will help them with their HSC studies, but they also got to engage with learning at a university level, in world-class facilities in a unique learning environment!











# **Keeping Up With PDHPE**

### **Year 7 PDHPE**

Year 7 students have kicked off high school by exploring important topics like identity, puberty, and body image. For their assessment, they created informative PowerPoint presentations to educate others on the physical, social, and emotional changes that occur during puberty. In practical PE lessons, they focused on building essential skills through two exciting units—fundamental movement skills and initiative games—promoting teamwork and coordination in a fun, interactive way.

### **Year 8 PDHPE**

Year 8 students tackled the "Risky Business" topic, where they explored the difference between healthy and unhealthy risks and delved into drug education. They learned about the various types of drugs and their short-and long-term effects on the body. For their assessment, students planned and delivered a simulated press conference to educate the community on youth drug use and how to take a proactive approach in this area. In practical PE lessons, they enjoyed playing volleyball and cricket, honing their skills and teamwork.

### **Year 9 PDHPE**

Year 9 students have been focusing on building a strong understanding of relationships, covering topics such as communication skills, rights and responsibilities, and the impact of friends and family. They also explored the critical differences between unhealthy and abusive relationships, promoting awareness and healthy choices. In practical PE lessons, students have been developing their skills in badminton and softball, improving coordination and teamwork while having fun.





# **Keeping Up With PDHPE**

### **Year 10 PDHPE**

Year 10 students recently completed their "Equal Opportunity" unit, where they explored the concepts of equity and equality, gaining a deeper understanding of how marginalised groups experience different health outcomes. This unit encouraged them to consider the importance of fairness and support for all individuals. In practical PE lessons, students have also been learning the fundamentals of golf and touch football, fostering teamwork and skill development in a fun, engaging environment.





PASS

Year 9 and 10 PASS students have been diving into the body's systems, studying the skeletal, muscular, and cardiorespiratory systems to understand how they support physical activity. They also explored the different energy systems used in various sports and exercises, with practical activities such as heart rate testing and applying energy systems to different workouts. Additionally, students learned about the importance of hydration for optimal performance, gaining valuable insights into how to keep their bodies fueled and ready for action.

### Stage 6

In Year 11 Sport Coaching, students have been focusing on event management and are currently in the process of planning their own sporting events. They also had the opportunity to visit the SCG for an educational tour, where they gained firsthand experience of the grounds and operations, insight they can apply to their event planning. Year 12 students have been studying "Coaching the Individual," exploring how to tailor coaching techniques to meet the unique needs, goals, expectations, and preferences of each participant, ensuring a more personalized and effective approach to coaching.





# **Keeping Up With PDHPE**

### Stage 6 SLR

SLR students have been focusing on fitness, putting in hard work at the gym while learning key concepts such as the components of fitness, the FITT principle, and fitness testing. They also explored the physiological and psychological benefits of regular exercise, gaining a deeper understanding of how it impacts both the body and mind. Additionally, they learned about important considerations when developing a training plan, ensuring that their workouts are effective, safe, and tailored to specific goals.



### Stage 6 CAFS

This term, our Year II Community and Family Studies (CAFS) students explored Resource Management, focusing on individuals and groups and how they can effectively manage resources to meet personal needs and achieve goals. Students also examined well-being, factors affecting resource management, decision-making processes, and strategies for effective planning. They especially enjoyed analysing wellbeing factors and their effects through their assessment task, as well as viewing relationships and wellbeing factors in Friends episodes, as well as a movie. They have gained insights into various groups and their roles and explored how different influences shape how we can access resources in life.

Through case studies and practical activities, students developed skills in critical thinking, problem-solving, and collaboration—essential for responsible decision-making in personal, family, and community contexts.

### Stage 6 HMS

In Year 11 Health and Movement Science (HMS), students begin their studies by exploring the focus area "Health for Individuals and Communities." This unit examines various definitions and perspectives of health, emphasising the factors influencing health and the indicators used to measure health status. Students also investigate the role of government and non-government organisations in advocating for and supporting youth health, exploring health promotion strategies and frameworks like the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion.

This March, Doonside Technology High School hosted the termly meeting for the Nurragingy Junior AECG. The Junior AECG is a First Nations group of students from different schools within our area that get together to learn about culture and develop young leaders. Ten primary and high schools were successful, and all made the day a memorable moment that their students will never forget.

The amazing presenters, Jason and Trevor from Dalmarri, created a canvas for each school to complete. Dalmarri incorporated each school's colours in the artwork, and all schools were able to complete their artworks and take them back to their own schools to display.

Our Junior AECG members developed their artwork as a team and presented this to Principal Campbell as a gift. Their artwork now hangs outside his office. This Pathways to Dreaming event, organised by KARI, provided students in Years 11 and 12 the opportunity to interact with Western Sydney University to discuss Indigenous culture and experience the university's faculties of education, psychology, and music, engaging in workshops with university professors and lecturers as experts in their field.

A real highlight of the day was the final workshop, which introduced students to the clubs and societies that exist within universities. KARI facilitated this workshop, with students working together with kids from other high schools to build a bicycle that would be gifted to out-of-home care students in need.

# What's Happening in Science

### **Year 7 Science**

This term in Science, Year 7 students had the opportunity to explore the world of science and learn how scientists use problem-solving skills to address real-life challenges.

Skills developed this term include

- How to safely light a Bunsen burner
- How to draw and interpret graphs
- Measuring the density of cubes

Students also learned about the states of matter through the particle model and engaged in hands-on activities, such as "observing Oobleck."

In addition, they were introduced to laboratory safety rules and familiarized with the equipment commonly used in science labs.

### **Year 8 Science**



Term 1 has been an exciting time filled with experimentation and new experiences for Year 8. The students have been exploring various aspects of energy, including its definition and movement.

As part of their assessment task, students experimented with solar ovens and investigated the transfer of heat energy. Each student designed their own experiment with distinct aims, hypotheses, and conclusions. We also introduced some innovative technology, the temperature probe! This Bluetooth-connected device allowed us to collect and graph data remotely, moving away from traditional thermometers. It was great to see Year 8 challenge themselves in their assessment task and demonstrate variety in their science skills!

### **Year 9 Science**

This term in Science, Year 9 has been learning about electrical circuits. This has included making parallel and series circuits, measuring voltage and current, calculating resistance, and learning about electrical efficiency and its effect on the environment. Students have completed a practical assessment to demonstrate their understanding of circuits and scientific skills.









# What's Happening in Science

### Year 10 Science

This term Year 10 has developed a deeper understanding of chemical reactions this term. They've been actively engaged in practical experiments, gaining firsthand experience of how different chemicals interact to produce a variety of reactions. In addition to their hands-on work, students have also been focusing on their Student Research Projects for their assessment, where they are applying their knowledge and exploring chemical reactions with bicarbonate soda and vinegar in more depth.

### Year 7 Paddock to Plate

This term, Year 7 students have had the exciting opportunity to develop essential skills while working on the school farm. They've learned about a variety of farm tools and how to use them, and they've also had the chance to get their hands dirty by planting their very first crops.

### **Year 9iSTEM**

The Year 9iSTEM class has been learning about the design process in Term 1. This process includes 7 steps: Defining problems, Identifying constraints, Brainstorming solutions, Selecting promising solutions, Prototyping models, Testing prototypes, Iterating or improving prototypes, and Communicating solutions. The Year 9iSTEM class was able to successfully demonstrate their understanding of these steps in their assessment task, where they built marshmallow launchers that were able to launch their marshmallows well over the required five-metre target consistently.

### Science Homework

A huge congratulations to all students who have been consistently completing their homework each week. Homework plays a vital role in reinforcing the concepts learned in class, and we are proud of the dedication shown so far. In Term 2, students will have the chance to complete their homework weekly, providing continued support for their learning and helping to further develop their understanding of the subject.


### **Zone Swimming Carnival**






#### Open Boys Cricket

#### Open Boys Volleyball


