








# NSW School Merino Wether Challenge

A big congratulations to the 7 Ag students who represented our school at the NSW School Merino Wether Challenge in Dubbo in Week 4. DCS, along with 76 other schools, participated in this year's challenge, working with the sheep for 6 months prepping for this main event.

The sheep were delivered to Dubbo Showground on Monday afternoon.

On the first day, DCS Team A was awarded 2<sup>nd</sup> place in Zone 4 - Best Presented in Wool - Restocker value. With over 450 lambs at the show, divided into 4 zones, this was a fantastic result!







Throughout the day students attended various workshops including scanning, wool handling, careers, young judges and a Fletchers presentation. They also had time to explore various industry stall holders and view the Rabobank National Ram Show and Sale.

On the second day, our Team A were awarded a 3<sup>rd</sup> place in Zone 4 – Best Presented out of Wool. Students also participated in workshops on sheep dogs, fleece and competed in the Farmer's Challenge.
