Attendance

At Ermington Public School, we place a high value on regular attendance, as it plays a vital role in every child's learning, wellbeing, and long-term success. When students attend school every day, they are more likely to stay engaged in their learning, make steady progress, build strong friendships, and develop positive habits for life. We have high expectations for attendance and encourage all families to make school a priority. If you are experiencing any difficulties in getting your child to school, please don't hesitate to reach out—our staff are here to support you.



Compulsory school attendance

| Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

- Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

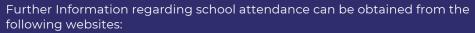

School Excellence Plan

Our School Excellence Plan: Supporting Every Learner at Ermington

Our <u>2025–2028 School Excellence Plan</u> is a shared commitment between staff, students, and families to help every child grow, learn, and thrive. It reflects the values and goals of our school community and outlines how we're working together to support every learner.

We'll continue to share our progress through newsletter updates, so you can stay informed with what's happening in classrooms and how we're tracking against our goals.

Below are bite-sized details on how we're focusing our efforts this term.

Strategic Direction 1: Student Growth and Attainment

Goal: We're committed to helping every student reach their full potential in reading and numeracy. Through quality teaching, targeted support, and meaningful use of data, we aim to ensure strong progress for every child.

What we've achieved: All students in Years 1–6 have completed the DIBELS reading screener, providing valuable insight into their current reading development. Based on this data, targeted intervention groups have been established. Our Number Ninjas program has launched for K–2, and all teachers have continued explicit teaching of mathematics units aligned with the new curriculum.

Where we're heading: K-2 teachers will be engaging in professional learning focused on best practice in early reading instruction. Additionally, staff will work with our Assistant Principal, Curriculum & Instruction to collaboratively map out student reading goals that support growth and success.

Strategic Direction 2: Attendance and Engagement

Goal: We're building a school culture where every student feels safe, supported, and excited to learn. Strong wellbeing systems and positive partnerships with families help foster a real sense of belonging.

What we've achieved: We've established clear systems and processes to support staff and families in tracking attendance. High Potential and Gifted Education (HPGE) strategies have been implemented to ensure teaching and learning programs are engaging and responsive. A range of new and existing extracurricular activities are also up and running.

Where we're heading: We're continuing to strengthen our whole-school approach to wellbeing by embedding proactive strategies in every classroom. Staff will take part in professional learning to support engagement and behaviour, helping us create inclusive, positive learning environments for all students.

Strategic Direction 3: Leadership and Culture

Goal: By growing leadership across our school and encouraging collaboration, we're creating an environment where students and staff can flourish together.

What we've achieved: We held an executive induction and planning day to set clear roles and priorities aligned with our School Excellence Plan. Three staff members have been supported to achieve accreditation at the proficient level, and clearer support guidelines have been shared across the school.

Where we're heading: We're committed to developing leadership at all levels through mentoring, targeted professional learning, and collaborative planning. Upcoming initiatives will support aspiring leaders, build team effectiveness, and ensure all staff feel empowered and connected to our shared school vision.

This term, Kindy has had so much fun participating in the Moving Bodies gymnastics program. They have enjoyed challenging their bodies and learning many new skills.









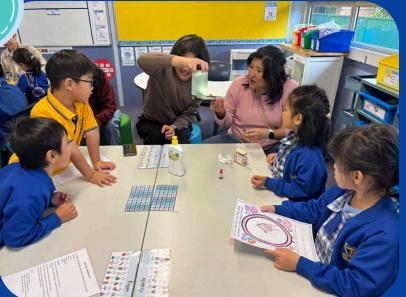

This term Stage 2 have been participating in the Moving Bodies gymnastics program. Their focus and determination has been admirable.

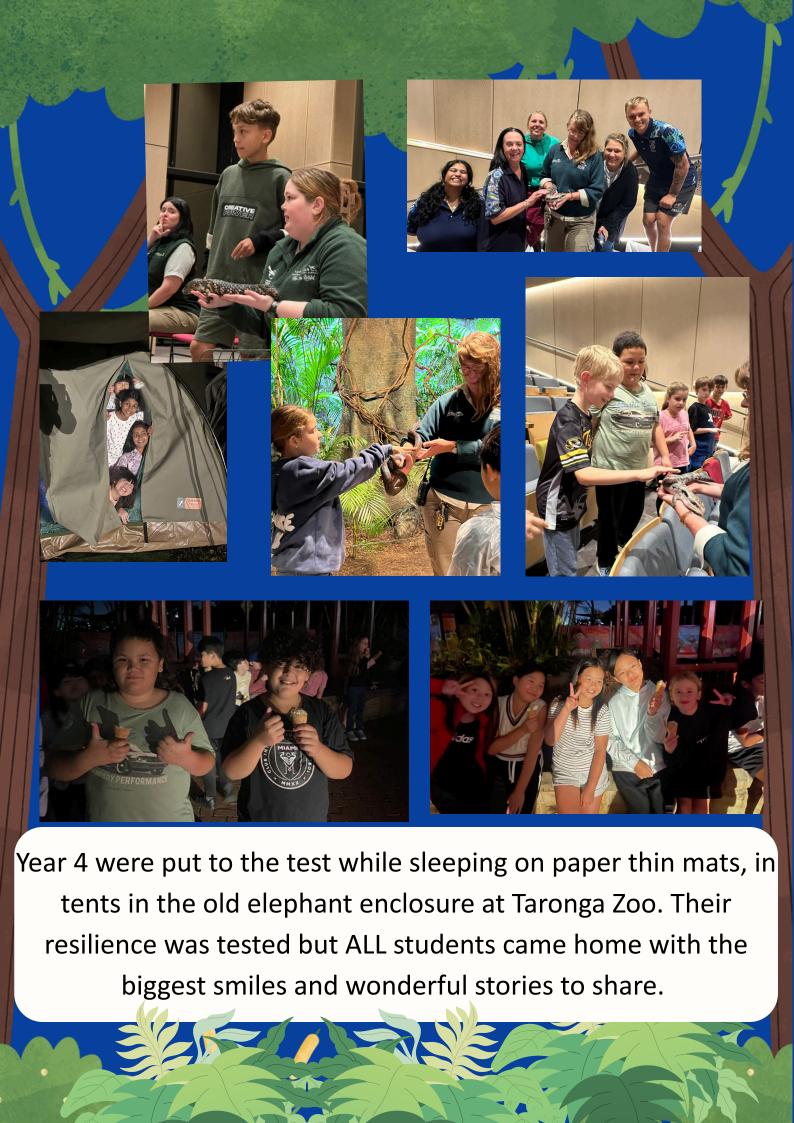

Our QKR! App is super easy to use.

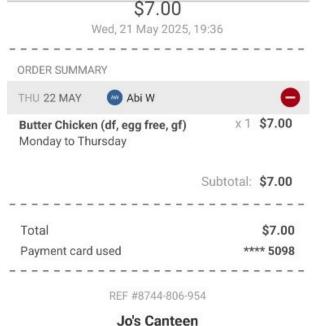
The cut off time is 9am, refunds can be made before the cut off time on that day by clicking the red circle at the top of the order summary. This will be kept as a credit on your account.

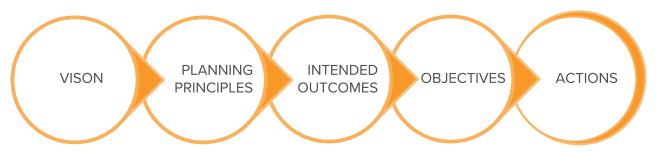


Figure 1. Key components of the City of Ryde's social and cultural planning (City of Ryde 2025)

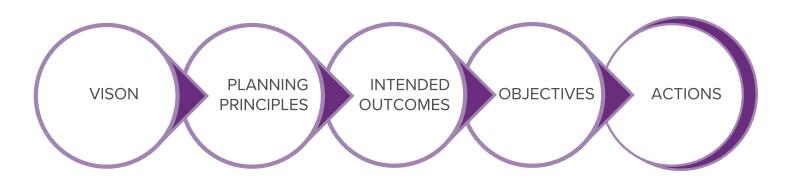


CREATIVITY STRATEGY AT A GLANCE

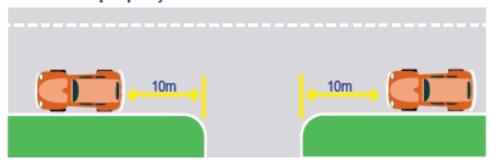

> PENALTIES & DEMERIT POINTS APPLY

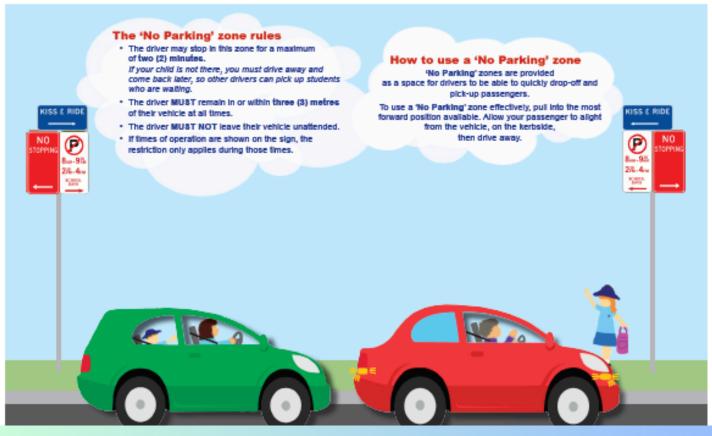
You must park in the same direction of travel and parallel and as close to the kerb as possible.

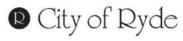
