Our attendance goal is for all students to attend school 95% of the time.

Regular attendance at school is essential for students to achieve quality life outcomes.

Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Every day counts: why attendance matters

In a child's education, every day counts. Attending school regularly is not just a legal obligation but a crucial factor in shaping each child's future. The NSW Department of Education emphasises the significance of consistent attendance to unlock the full potential of each child.

Education is a cornerstone for personal and professional growth, and regular school attendance is key to unlocking its full benefits. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes more accessible, and they have the opportunity to build and maintain friendships with their peers, fostering a supportive social environment.

Legally, education in New South Wales is compulsory for children aged six and up to the minimum school leaving age of 17. The Education Act 1990 mandates that parents ensure their children attend school regularly once enrolled. This commitment is a shared responsibility between parents and educational institutions to provide a stable and conducive learning environment.

The importance of arriving on time cannot be overstated. Punctuality is not only a practical skill but also a life lesson. Ensuring that students arrive at school and class on time means they do not miss crucial learning activities scheduled early in the day. It helps instill the importance of punctuality and routine, gives students time to greet their friends before class, and significantly reduces classroom disruption.

It is worth noting that lateness is recorded as a partial absence and consistent lateness can add up over time and impact a child's overall attendance record.

Missing one day of school per fortnight equates to over a year missed over the course of a child's school lifetime. Missing one day per week amounts to over 2.5 years lost over the same period. These statistics underscore the cumulative impact of seemingly sporadic absences, highlighting the need for regular attendance to maximise educational opportunities.

Of course, there are justified reasons for student absences, such as illness, medical appointments, religious holidays, or exceptional family circumstances. However, it is essential to communicate with the school regarding any planned or unexpected absences, ensuring that missed learning opportunities can be addressed and supported.

The journey of every student's education is a collective effort, with parents and schools working hand in hand to provide the best possible learning environment for children. Regular school attendance is not just a legal requirement, it's an investment in each child's future, unlocking doors to academic success, personal growth, and expanded life opportunities. Every day your child attends school contributes to their academic and social progress, building a foundation for a lifetime of achievement and fulfillment.
