Attendance Matters

Our attendance goal is for all students to attend school 95% of the time.

Regular attendance at school is essential for students to achieve quality life outcomes.

Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Curriculum Focus

Goal setting can be a difficult skill to master initially, but we want to ensure your children feel challenged at school while being supported by staff and peers. This is something we are actively encouraging, and we hope to celebrate success alongside them.

NAPLAN is right around the corner, and I look forward to our Year 3 students giving it their all. There are some key ways you can help support students when preparing for an assessment (or school in general).

- Check in with your child about how they're feeling about it. Anxious feelings can reduce problem-solving skills.
- Ensure your child is adequately hydrated.
 Adequate hydration improves brain function.
- Ensure your child is getting enough sleep. The Raising Children Network recommends 9–11 hours of sleep each night.
- Ensure your child gets a nutritious breakfast.

 This will help them stay focused throughout the morning
- Treat the morning of the assessment like any other day. A relaxed and calm attitude is the best way to tackle it.

A little encouragement and support can go a long way in helping our students thrive.

The class has had the opportunity to create their own blurbs based upon the beginning of the book and look at some of the characteristics of the inhabitants of Longboat Bay. We've unpacked some wonderful language about the ocean and fishing that comes with the book's coastal setting.

Last week, students had the opportunity to create maps of Abel's and Dora's property based upon the descriptions in the first few chapters of the book. We've also explored what makes a good orientation of a book and will be diving headfirst into the complication next week.

The students have also dived right in to their new literacy routines in the morning. One of the activities the students complete four days a week is an individualised fluency read. The students enjoy monitoring their improvement each day and seeing how many more words they can read per minute.

At **Euabalong West Public School**, we believe in fostering a **workplace** where **staff** are happy and fulfilled through a culture built on:




