Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

# Kukuparra News

K-2 Kukuparra students have had a wonderful start to Term 2, where they were kept busy with lots of interesting and exciting learning with our new teacher Mrs Turner last week. Thank you, Mrs Turner for taking care of our four beautiful K-2 students while Miss Lesker was at camp with Mr Clifton and 3-6. We really appreciate it.

The students created some wonderful art and craft out of natural and made materials. They made a kookaburra out of pine cones, feathers and paper. They then glued the kookaburras onto a stick and they look amazing!

In maths, the students have been learning about 2D shapes. They have been learning to use the terms 'side', 'vertex' and 'two-dimensional'. They are also learning to compare, sort and classify polygons according to the number of sides or vertices.

As you can see in the picture below, the students did an absolutely wonderful job creating different two-dimensional shapes using rubbers bands on a geoboard.

# Marrawuy News

Early this term we are beginning our work with measurement. This week's maths investigation involved proving that 100cm was equal to 1m.

Students broke into groups and used 1m long teacher rulers as a guide and then used smaller 30cm rulers lined up correctly to prove that 100cm does in fact equal 1m.

We also looked at how to convert between millimetres, centimetres, metres and kilometres, eventually realising that the 36.9km journey to Lake Cargelligo is in fact 36 900 000 millimetres. We are looking forward to exploring measurement more as the term wears on. This problem solving is incredibly important in making real-world connections to learning and understanding how these concepts can be applied beyond the classroom.

During literacy sessions, the students have been learning how to break words into their parts to assist with spelling. 3-6 have learned about base words and how prefixes are added to the beginning of base words to make new words with different meanings.



## **STEM Week**

It was an absolute honour to visit Euabalong West at the end of Term 1! We managed to have an action-packed week of STEM.

#### The Bouncy Ball Challenge

Initially we spent some time building our background knowledge and thinking about how engineers and scientists design things to move efficiently. We identified our design criteria as a group, gathered the resources, then spent our time building, testing, adjusting, retesting and finally sharing! It was fascinating to see all of the different engineering ideas built in a range of creative ways.

#### Catapult Peg Challenge

It is safe to say this was the challenge that caused the most angst! Using only a peg, an elastic band and any other 'found' objects around the classroom, the students were tasked with the challenge of launching a Skittle as far as they could across the classroom (although some may argue the bigger challenge was not eating the Skittle). With a smidge of persistence, a lot of collaboration and many retests, we were off to the playground for final testing. Every catapult launched a Skittle further than the indoor testing stage and luckily, we had some spare packets to eat too!

#### Splat 3D Design Tool

The Splat tool provides a hands-on, unplugged solution that allows learners of all ages to master the art of drawing in 3D. We began by experimenting with how to draw a basic cube, cylinder and cone. Then onto the challenge of the impossible triangle – a very difficult optical illusion





design. Finally, the students used the Splats and their imagination to create the ultimate adventure playground design. Their ideas were so impressive and creative that Vinny had a very difficult time choosing a winner, so he picked three!

#### **Robots**

The K-2 students loved exploring with Spehro Indi. With Indi's onboard colour sensor, the students can communicate instructions to Indi by placing coloured tiles on the floor that tell it what to do and where to go (and how fast!). There were squeals of excitement as we discovered how Indi reacts to each colour tile. Then the real fun began with building mazes with endless combinations of coloured tiles and strengthening problem-solving skills by navigating the challenging puzzle cards.

The 3-6 students were lucky enough to explore using the EV3 robots. The students spent a significant amount of time building their EV3 Mindstorms piece by piece and collaborating with each other to help solve and for challenges. Once the bots were built and connected to the laptops, the students were able to begin to build their block code to bring their robot to life! Unfortunately, time was not on our side and only some groups got to the stage of making their bots perform some tasks. But, alas, I leave you all in very capable and very knowledgeable hands with Mr South!

A special thank you to Mr South for organising the robots to arrive at school the week before I arrived.

I was so proud of the persistence you all showed in all of the STEM tasks throughout the week and I am grateful that you were all so enthusiastic...even if it was out of your comfort zone! It truly is a team effort at Euabalong West, and I am truly grateful for the work everyone does.


## Office News
