Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

They provide vital resources, learning experiences and access to STEM for students, particularly in remote and isolated communities.

This Lego will support our ongoing stop motion unit of work across the school, giving students access to a wider variety of settings and characters to allow their narratives to evolve and be even more detailed.

Putting together the sets will give them access to procedural informative texts and they can see how a combination of pictures, visuals and text can combine to create a multimodal text focusing on a process.

Turn off the screens and get more sleep

In our modern, digital age, screens are an integral part of daily life, from computers and tablets to smartphones and televisions. While these devices offer many benefits, it is essential for parents and carers to enforce digital downtime, particularly in the evenings, to ensure the wellbeing of our children. Reducing screen time at night and encouraging healthy sleep habits are critical for developing brains and bodies.

One of the most significant factors affecting children's health and academic performance is sleep. Growing children need a good night's sleep to support their physical and cognitive development. The Australian Sleep Health Foundation recommends that school-aged children get between 9 and 11 hours of sleep each night. However, many children fall short of this target, often due to excessive screen time before bed.

Exposure to screens at night can interfere with the body's natural sleep cycle. The blue light emitted by screens can suppress the production of melatonin, the hormone responsible for regulating sleep. This can make it harder for children to fall asleep and stay asleep, leading to insufficient rest. Furthermore, engaging in stimulating activities such as gaming or watching exciting videos can keep the mind active, delaying the onset of sleepiness.

The consequences of inadequate sleep for children are profound. Lack of sleep can impair cognitive functions such as memory, attention, and problemsolving skills, which are vital for learning and academic success. Children who do not get enough sleep may struggle to concentrate in class, retain information, and perform well on assignments and tests. Additionally, chronic sleep deprivation can affect mood and behaviour, leading to increased irritability, anxiety, and difficulty managing emotions.

A consistent lack of sleep can have long-term impacts on physical health. It can weaken the immune system, making children more susceptible to illnesses, and contribute to issues such as obesity and diabetes. Ensuring that children get sufficient sleep is crucial for their overall health.

To help children develop healthy sleep habits, parents and carers should establish a bedtime routine that includes digital downtime. Removing devices and screens from children's bedrooms is a vital step in this process. Without the temptation of electronic devices, children are more likely to settle down and prepare for sleep. Encourage activities such as reading a book, listening to calming music, or practising relaxation techniques before bed to help them unwind.

Setting clear boundaries around screen time is essential. Parents and carers should set a cut-off time for device usage in the evening, ideally at least two hours before bedtime. This allows the child's body to begin producing melatonin and start the natural process of winding down for the night. Consistency is key; maintaining a regular bedtime and wake-up time, even on weekends, can help reinforce healthy sleep patterns.

Additionally, creating a sleep-conducive environment can make a significant difference. Ensure the child's bedroom is dark, cool, and quiet. Using blackout curtains, white noise machines, or fans can help create an optimal sleep setting.

Reducing screen time at night and enforcing digital downtime are essential steps in promoting healthy sleep habits for children. Adequate sleep is crucial for their developing brains and bodies, impacting their ability to learn, grow, and thrive. By removing devices from their bedrooms and establishing consistent routines, parents and carers can help ensure that children get the restful sleep they need to succeed both academically and personally.

This does not have to result in arguments. If all else fails, turn off the internet by a set time each night, for example 9 pm, as a first step to reducing screen time and helping your children get the sleep they need.


