Our attendance goal is for all students to attend school 95% of the time.

Regular attendance at school is essential for students to achieve quality life outcomes.

Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Here are some of the highlights:

- Our SDD focused on the work of Dr. Brene Brown and the importance of vulnerability in creating a deep collaborative culture for both staff and students.
- In our SDD we also explored the work Dr. Pasi
 Sahlberg and his body of research on the effects
 of shorter sessions and more opportunities for
 play for children. From this research, we have
 trialled our new learning session and break times.
- Mr South, Mrs Brett and Miss Sally attended tutoring training with the NSW Centre for Effective Reading, learning how to provide key intervention strategies for struggling readers.
- Mr Clifton led a session for us to improve our Personalised Learning Plans and Individual Education Support Plans to set more effective learning goals for all students.
- Miss Lesker and Mr South continued their work
 with the Confidence in Teaching Reading
 seminars. These sessions are designed to build
 knowledge and understanding of the key
 processes that underpin the teaching of reading.

Later in the week they have the opportunity to have a go at creating their own sentences from 'Sentence Stems' and then finally putting together their own sentences using the skills they have built over the course of the week.

These skills are so crucial in building a solid foundation for emerging writers and we're so excited to see what wonderful texts Marrawuy will come up with next!

3-6 have also been deeply studying the Olympics, delving into the rich history, cultural significance, and the spirit of the Games. They've explored the origins of the ancient Olympics, learnt about different events, and written about different athletes. We hope they are inspired to appreciate the values that the Olympics embody.

Biodiversity Excursion

On the 30th (Years 3–6) and the 31st (K–2) of July 2024, EWPS students had the opportunity to join their friends in the Rural Innovative Education Network (RIEN) to engage in a range of biodiversity and cultural activities, connecting our Geography lessons specifically to our local area.

We travelled to the stock route just north of Rankins Springs, where students participated in various educational tasks. These included identifying wild species of fungi and moss, classifying microscopic insects collected from local waterways, learning how to maintain healthy dams and waterways, creating effective habitats for local native bees, and exploring how First Nations people used technology to communicate over long distances.
