#### **Curriculum Focus**

As we get to the end of another busy term, we are still committed to ensuring every student receives the support and challenge they need to succeed. This term, we have been analysing data from our PAT (Progressive Achievement Tests) in Reading and Mathematics to help identify each student's individual learning needs. These assessments provide valuable insight into how students are progressing with key literacy and numeracy skills, allowing us to tailor our teaching and support more effectively.

By closely examining the PAT data, we are able to pinpoint specific areas of need and areas where students may benefit from further consolidation or extension. This data then becomes a foundation for setting clear, achievable learning goals as part of each student's Personalised Learning and Support Plan (PLaSP).

Our PLaSPs are living documents that guide targeted teaching and track progress over time. They are created in collaboration with students, teachers, parents, and support staff to ensure a shared understanding of each learner's goals and the strategies that will support them. These plans are especially important to support students' individual needs.

We believe that when learning is personalised, students feel more confident, motivated, and successful. Thank you for your ongoing support as we continue to use data to inform our practice and create the best possible learning experiences for every child at Euabalong West Public School. ## **Kukuparra News**

The K-2 Kukuparra students are nearing the end of a wonderfully productive term, that has been filled with new and exciting learning experiences. In English, the Year 2 students have been exploring the art of dialogue, learning how to write conversations between characters using a helpful dialogue checklist. They've discovered how to use quotation marks to highlight spoken words, start dialogue with a capital letter, add punctuation before closing quotation marks, and incorporate action verbs to describe speech. They've also learned to start a new line when a different character speaks. Meanwhile, the Kindergarten students have been making great progress with their sounds and tricky words. They've begun blending their sounds together to form CVC words and are now beginning to write sentences using these words along with their tricky words.

In Mathematics, the Kindergarten students have been making great progress in writing and solving addition equations up to five using hands-on materials. They have been enthusiastically using counters to represent story problems and are learning to apply addition and subtraction symbols to create and solve equations. The Year 2 students are continuing to build their understanding of adding and subtracting one and two-digit numbers. They are enthusiastically exploring number bonds and number fact families within 10 and 20, to strengthen their number sense even further.

#### **STEM Day**

Euabalong West Public School

Euabalong West Public School was buzzing with excitement recently as we hosted a fun-filled STEM Day for our RIEN small schools' group. We welcomed students and staff from Tallimba, Weethalle, and Naradhan Public Schools for a day packed with hands-on learning in science, technology, engineering, and maths.

The day began with exciting coding sessions, where students explored programming through real-world applications. They used Ozobots to complete a game of bowling, learning how to sequence commands and problem-solve through trial and error. They also guided Sphero Indi cars through colourful puzzle tracks, using sensors and colour codes to help their robots navigate challenges.

In the engineering sessions, students tackled ageappropriate building challenges. Our K-2 students designed and built their own sail cars, experimenting with different sail shapes and materials to catch the wind. Meanwhile, the 3-6 students took on a more advanced challenge—constructing land yachts with adjustable sails. These were tested in a wind tunnel, where students discovered how changing the sail angle affected speed and direction. The classroom turned into a racetrack as the land yachts zoomed across the finish line!

The day wrapped up with a tower building challenge. Students used limited materials to create the tallest and strongest towers possible. There was lots of creative thinking, teamwork, and friendly competition, with prizes awarded for the tallest tower.

A big thank you to our amazing P&C for providing a delicious morning tea of cakes and a scrumptious lunch, which kept everyone fuelled and smiling throughout the day.

STEM Day was a wonderful success, filled with laughter, learning, and collaboration.

#### Taronga Zoomobile

Earlier this term, the students had the opportunity to take part in an exciting excursion to St Francis Xavier Catholic School in Lake Cargelligo. The event was hosted by Lake Cowal Conservation Centre and featured a special visit from the Taronga Zoo Mobile all the way from Sydney!

The day kicked off with an entertaining and educational performance by Uncle Col, who shared a selection of songs and Dreaming stories. The students particularly enjoyed singing along to "Tommy the Termite" and listening to "The Rainbow Serpent," which taught important lessons about animals and their significance in Aboriginal culture.

After the music, the real stars of the show arrived—the animals! Students were delighted to meet a variety of native creatures up close. They saw snakes, frogs, a ringtail possum, and a bluetongue lizard. One of the highlights was meeting 'Reggie,' a bogeye lizard, who quickly became a crowd favourite with his calm nature and impressive features.

Throughout the day, the students learned about the habitats, diets, and special adaptations that help these animals survive in the wild. They discovered how the bluetongue lizard uses its bright tongue to scare away predators, how possums use their tails to balance and climb, and why frogs are important indicators of healthy ecosystems.

It was a fantastic day of hands-on learning that helped deepen the students' understanding of Australian wildlife and conservation. A big thank you to the Lake Cowal Conservation Centre, Taronga Zoomobile, and St Francis Xavier for hosting such a wonderful event. The students of our school can't wait for the next adventure!
