At Last Newsletter Year to Date 89%

Our attendance goal is for all students to attend school 95% of the time.

Regular attendance at school is essential for students to achieve quality life outcomes.

Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Curriculum Focus

Our teaching staff have been engaging in professional learning around Cognitive Load Theory, and the research in this area developed by Australian educational psychologist Professor John Sweller. This research helps us understand how the brain processes and stores information, particularly how students can become overloaded when too much new information is presented at once.

Cognitive Load Theory highlights the importance of managing how we present learning so that students have the best chance of remembering and understanding new concepts. It identifies two main types of mental "load":

- Intrinsic load the natural difficulty of what's being learned
- Extraneous load how clearly (or confusingly) the information is delivered

The teachers have explored practical classroom strategies such as breaking content into smaller steps, using visuals and worked examples, and removing distractions. These small but powerful changes help free up students' mental capacity so they can focus on what really matters.

Importantly, our teachers are also working on ways to assist students in forming meaningful connections between new content and what they already know. This strengthens understanding and makes it more likely that learning will be retained and applied in new situations.

We are proud to continually invest in research-based practices that improve teaching and learning.






The Aboriginal School Partnership Committee carefully considered and recommended a location that offers privacy, calm, and a connection to Country. The site chosen is nestled among some of our most beautiful native trees – a peaceful and respectful place to gather and share stories. We are particularly grateful to Karen Martin and Jenny Griffiths for their continuing engagement and advice.

We are incredibly grateful to Mrs Glover, our former Relieving School Administrative Manager, who played a key role in organising the purchase of the decomposed granite and sandstone blocks. Earlier this year, the edging was installed, and the team from Griffith Bricks and Pavers delivered the decomposed granite. With the help of our staff, students, and the fantastic local team from Cobar Shire Council, the area was levelled and prepared. This week, the sandstone blocks arrived, and the wonderful Rob from Griffith Bricks and Pavers positioned them perfectly.

There are still a few finishing touches to go, including installing a fire pit and tidying up around the edges, but our Yarning Circle is already a beautiful and important space. We are so thankful to everyone who has contributed. This special place will serve as a gathering point for learning, storytelling, and connection for many years to come.







Kindergarten Writing



Our Kindergarten students have been making wonderful progress in their writing lessons this term, and we're especially proud of the hard work being put in by Bryce, Kelly, and Brodie. These three boys have been working with Mr Clifton in the library three to four times a week, building their confidence and skills as young writers.

Each session begins with a carefully chosen stimulus book, which provides inspiration for the group's Sentence of the Week. This shared sentence helps students learn about sentence structure, vocabulary, and punctuation in an engaging and meaningful way. They also explore three or four stimulus pictures that include words made up of phonograms (letter combinations and sounds) they have already been taught, helping them apply their phonics knowledge in context.

Each student also has two personalised writing goals, displayed on their desk as a visual reminder of what they are working to improve. These goals keep their learning focused and help celebrate individual growth.

We are so proud of the effort, persistence, and enthusiasm that Bryce, Kelly, and Brodie bring to every writing lesson. They are well on their way to becoming fantastic little writers! Keep up the amazing work, boys – we're cheering you on!
