Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Road Safety: Click, Clack, Front and Back

At Euabalong West Public School, student safety is always our highest priority, and that includes keeping our students safe when travelling to and from school by car.

We are becoming increasingly concerned that some students are being transported without wearing seatbelts. This includes very short trips, such as up or down the street. It's essential that families understand this is extremely dangerous and places children at serious risk of injury or worse. No trip is too short for a seatbelt.

Seatbelts Save Lives

It has been compulsory to wear seatbelts in NSW since 1971. On average, around 29 people are killed and 76 seriously injured each year on NSW roads because they were not wearing a seatbelt that was available to them. Wearing a seatbelt doubles your chance of surviving a crash and significantly reduces the risk of injury.

In a crash, an unrestrained person continues to move at the speed of the vehicle until something stops them – this could be the dashboard, windscreen, or even being ejected from the vehicle altogether. In the back seat, this could mean being thrown into the front seat with such force that it causes further injury to both the front and back passengers.

Even in vehicles fitted with airbags, seatbelts are essential. Striking an airbag without a seatbelt can cause serious injuries.

It is against the law, and incredibly unsafe, for children to hang out of windows. This creates the risk of a child falling from the car, potentially resulting in serious injury or death.

Fines and Penalties

The fine for drivers with unrestrained passengers in NSW ranges from \$423 to \$1784 and carries between 3 and 6 demerit points. The driver is legally responsible for ensuring all passengers are properly restrained.

Child Restraints and Legal Requirements

Children under 7 years of age must use an approved restraint suited to their age and size. This may be a rear-facing or forward-facing child car seat or a booster seat. The jingle reminds us all: "Click, Clack, Front and Back." Every trip, every time.

Drop-Off and Pick-Up Safety

When dropping off or picking up, children must always enter and exit from the kerbside. No student should ever walk around the car to the roadside, even if they need to climb across a seat to get in. This is especially important on Uabba Street, where trucks and other vehicles often ignore the speed limit and travel at high speed.

A Serious Safety Matter

School staff are Mandatory Reporters, legally required to report concerns about child safety. If we become aware of students travelling unrestrained or entering/exiting from the roadside, we are obligated to report this to the Child Wellbeing Unit.
