Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Curriculum Focus

We are committed to providing the best possible start for our youngest learners. Our teachers have recently taken part in professional learning focused on the evidence-based teaching of reading. This training is helping to ensure that every child builds strong foundations in reading from the very beginning of their schooling journey.

The course focused on the six key areas that are essential for learning to read successfully: oral language, phonological awareness (like hearing and playing with sounds), phonics (knowing how letters and sounds go together), vocabulary, reading fluency and comprehension. Each of these components plays an important role in helping children become confident, capable readers.

Teachers explored the foundations of phonics and how to ensure that it is taught in a clear, structured and consistent way. They also looked at how to support students who may need extra help and how to use resources effectively in the classroom.

By learning more about how reading develops and the best ways to teach it, our teachers are even better equipped to support every child's reading progress.

We're excited to see the positive impact this learning will have on our students and look forward to continuing to provide rich, targeted reading instruction that sets our students up for success.



Kukuparra News

In Mathematics, this term, kindergarten students have been working on developing their understanding of number stories and number bonds. They have learned how to make number stories from pictures and then use their own drawings to create new stories to share with the class. Through these activities, students have practised writing number sentences that match their stories and explored how the same picture can show both addition and subtraction. By connecting their stories to number bonds, students are building a stronger sense of how numbers can be put together and taken apart in different ways.

Year 2 students have been working on developing strategies to support their addition skills. They have learned how to identify the largest number in an equation and to label an empty number line to assist with their thinking. Students have also practised partitioning two-digit numbers into tens and ones, which helps make calculations easier. These strategies are supporting students to confidently solve addition equations.

This term in science, students have been exploring the many ways plants and animals help us in our daily lives. They have discovered that plants and animals can be used for food, as well as for materials to make clothing and shelter. As part of their learning, students investigated a range of foods from different cultures and examined items created from natural fibres such as wool and cotton. This has helped them understand how closely our everyday needs are connected to the natural world.

3-6 students have been working hard to build their mathematical fluency and deepen their understanding of key number concepts. Through structured routines, visual learning supports and explicit instruction, students are developing confidence and accuracy in mathematics.

Each maths session begins with fluency practice, where students focus on strengthening their automatic recall of number facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. By using a range of visual aids such as number lines, arrays, and place value charts, students are able to see the patterns and relationships in numbers, making these facts easier to understand and remember.

To support long-term learning, students also complete daily reviews. These short and focused sessions revisit previously taught content, helping students consolidate their knowledge and build strong mental connections. This consistent revision is a powerful way to move learning into long-term memory and ensures students are ready to apply their skills to new concepts.

Currently, the class is exploring decimals and fractions, with a focus on understanding numbers smaller than one. Through hands-on activities, visual models and guided discussions, students are learning how to compare, represent and order these numbers. They are also discovering how decimals and fractions are connected and where we see them used in real life.

It's been fantastic to see students growing in confidence and showing enthusiasm for their learning. With strong foundations in place, they are well on their way to becoming flexible, capable mathematicians.

Reading Matters

Reading is the single most important skill a child can learn. It is the key that unlocks every other area of learning. Whether it's solving a maths problem, understanding a science experiment, or following instructions in technology, strong reading skills make all learning more accessible. Beyond school, reading also builds vocabulary, imagination, empathy, and the ability to communicate clearly — skills that will serve children for life.

One of the simplest and most powerful ways to build reading skills is by reading together at home. Even just five to ten minutes a night can make an enormous difference. When families read with their children, they are not only practising the mechanics of decoding words and building fluency, but also sharing the joy of stories, building connections, and modelling that reading is valued. Regular practice at home reinforces what is taught in the classroom, helping children grow in confidence and ability.

For younger children, hearing stories read aloud develops listening skills, phonemic awareness, and comprehension. For older students, nightly reading strengthens stamina, expands vocabulary, and encourages a lifelong love of books. Just as importantly, it creates a special time for families to slow down and connect in an otherwise busy day. These moments of shared attention and curiosity can be some of the most treasured memories of childhood.

The research is clear: children who read regularly at home make faster progress, achieve higher outcomes, and are more likely to see themselves as capable learners. At Euabalong West Public School, we encourage all families to make reading part of their daily routine. A few minutes each night can have a lasting impact — opening doors, building confidence, and setting children up for success in every part of their learning journey.

Euabalong West Public School


In Kindergarten, writing is all about building confidence, developing essential skills, and, most importantly, discovering that writing can be both fun and meaningful. Every day, Bryce, Brodie, and Kelly work with Mr Clifton in the library, where they take part in guided writing sessions carefully designed to help them grow as young writers. This daily practice, paired with ongoing support, ensures that the boys are steadily building their knowledge and skills.


The boys began their writing journey by learning to compose simple sentences based on predictable decodable texts. From there, they progressed to writing short descriptions of animals and characters, using their growing vocabulary and understanding of sentence structure. Now, they are learning to write recounts of books and short films, as well as beginning to explore simple procedures. Each new step gives them the chance to experiment, apply what they know, and develop greater independence in their writing.

A definite highlight for the boys was when we watched the short film Mike's New Car. The movie had them in giggling fits from start to finish, and they were so excited to write their recount about the flick. It was a wonderful opportunity to capture their enthusiasm and channel it into their writing, producing pieces that were full of personality and fun

To further support their progress, each student has two personalised writing goals that they work towards every day. These goals are tailored to their individual needs, helping them focus on specific areas of growth while celebrating their achievements along the way. The boys are also supported by the use of a writing card, which contains pictures to remind them how to form letters and letter combinations they are still practising.


