The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school. Children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

Our teaching team utilises a range of high-quality assessments and observations to guide this process, and the information we gather feeds directly into our classroom planning. Students receive explicit instruction based on their current skill level, and we regularly revisit and revise core concepts to ensure deep understanding.

We also celebrate the progress our students make, no matter how big or small. Growth is different for every learner, and we are proud of the effort our students are putting into mastering the basics.

This term in the K-2 Kukuparra classroom, students have been growing their confidence with the two and five times tables while continuing to develop strong reading fluency skills.

Students have enjoyed reading in pairs, using their iPads to record and listen back to their reading, and working closely with teachers for targeted support. This variety of reading experiences keeps learning fun and helps students build confidence each day. Kindergarten students also read daily with their Year 2 buddies to practise tricky words and strengthen independence. These peer-support sessions create wonderful opportunities for leadership, encouragement, and shared success.

Listening to their own recorded reading allows students to celebrate improvements in fluency and expression while identifying areas for further growth. Alongside this, students participate in explicit reading sessions with a teacher, receiving personalised feedback to guide their next steps. The Kukuparra classroom has been buzzing with enthusiasm as everyone works hard to become strong, joyful readers!

In Maths, students have been strengthening their understanding of place value and mastering their 'Friends of Ten' and 'Friends of Twenty' number facts. Quick-recall activities and daily practice help reinforce these important foundations. Skip counting by 2s, 5s, and 10s is also supporting their developing multiplication knowledge. Engaging games and interactive digital tools keep maths learning fun and meaningful. The students are building excellent number skills that will set them up for success as they continue to take on new challenges throughout the term.



Students from Kindergarten to Year 6 recently took part in a STEM Teabag Jiggler Challenge, an exciting hands-on project that inspired creativity, teamwork and problem-solving across all year levels. The challenge was simple in theory but complex in execution: to design and build a device that could make a teabag move up and down without a person touching it.

Students began by investigating how movement can be created through mechanical systems. They explored real-world examples of levers, pulleys and counterweights and discussed how these could be adapted to achieve the challenge's goal. Working in small groups, students then sketched their initial designs before collecting materials such as cardboard and LEGO to construct their prototypes.

Throughout the activity, students demonstrated perseverance and adaptability, making improvements to their devices after testing and observing what worked and what did not. Some groups experimented with pendulums and gears, while others discovered that using elastic bands created the perfect combination of tension and

In the end, each group produced a creative solution that successfully met the challenge. The project highlighted the importance of trial and error in STEM learning and encouraged students to think critically about how everyday materials can be used to solve practical problems. It was a fantastic display of curiosity, imagination and teamwork from all our budding young engineers.

Social Media Age Restrictions are Coming

The Australian Government has announced worldfirst laws to protect young Australians at a critical stage of their development, by introducing minimum age restrictions for social media use.

From 10 December 2025, it will become illegal for social media platforms to allow children under the age of 16 to create or maintain an account. This means popular apps and websites such as

Facebook, Instagram, TikTok, Snapchat,

YouTube and others will be required by law to take reasonable steps to stop under-16s from using their platforms. Companies that fail to do so may face significant financial penalties, with fines of up to \$49.5 million.

These restrictions are designed to **protect children** from the pressures, risks and harms that can come with early exposure to social media. The aim is to help young people avoid unhealthy comparisons, online bullying, exposure to adult content, and the addictive design features that encourage long screen time and constant engagement.

Penalties will apply to social media companies and they will be held responsible for preventing underage accounts. This change will have a major impact on how children and families use technology, and it's essential that parents begin preparing now.

Families are encouraged to start having open and age-appropriate conversations with their children about what this new law means and why it is being introduced. Discussing online behaviour, privacy, and the difference between healthy and unhealthy screen time will help children understand that this change is about protection, not punishment.

The legislation defines social media platforms as services designed for online social interaction where users can link to or communicate with others and post material. Messaging apps or games without these features are not affected, but if a messaging service includes social media-style functions (such as stories or public sharing), it may still fall under the new restrictions.

The eSafety Commissioner is currently consulting with educators, parents, and technology experts to determine what will count as a "reasonable step" for platforms to verify user ages. This may include improved age-assurance technology, which can confirm a person's age without collecting unnecessary personal information. An independent review will take place within two years of the laws coming into effect to assess their success.

The upcoming age restriction is part of the government's broader Online Safety Strategy, which also includes stronger protections against harmful online content, cyberbullying, and age-inappropriate material. Together, these measures aim to make the digital world safer and more transparent for all Australians — especially children.

As a school, we encourage all families to begin preparing for this significant change by talking with their children about healthy online habits, screen time, and responsible use of technology. It's important that children understand that from December next year, accessing social media under the age of 16 will no longer be permitted. Together, we can help our students develop a positive, balanced relationship with technology and keep them safe as they grow up in an increasingly digital world.

Students connect with their teachers and peers in timetabled online lessons through a cutting-edge virtual learning environment that includes web conferencing, collaboration tools, and a fully digital library.

Aurora offers Opportunity Class lessons in Mathematics, Science and Technology for Years 5 and 6, and Selective School classes in English, Mathematics and Science for Years 7 to 10. Senior students can also access a range of Higher School Certificate subjects that may not be available locally.

The In-Residence Program is a highlight of the Aurora experience, bringing students together for a week of lessons, tutorials, master classes, and mentoring sessions with leading academics, professionals, and partner organisations. Students also enjoy excursions and cultural activities that allow them to explore the host city while strengthening friendships formed through online learning.

We are incredibly proud of Sade's selection for this prestigious program. Her participation demonstrates her academic dedication, curiosity, and commitment to learning. We look forward to hearing all about her experiences when she returns and to seeing how her time in Sydney enriches her learning back at Euabalong West.
