Scholarships

Congratulations to Melanie Omondi who has been awarded a prestigious Acacia Program Scholarship. There were many high-quality applications for scholarships and winning this is a significant achievement. The scholarship will last for 2 years with a total value of \$2000 to be used on educational expenses.

Ava Schlink recently received a highly commended for her application for a 2025 Harding Miller Education Foundation Scholarship. Although not successful we are very proud of Ava and wait in anticipation for what may come. The selection process this year was incredibly competitive with 933 applications received from 371 schools - representing every state and territory. Only 230 scholarships were awarded.

Highly Commended: The application was highly commended by our judges, and the student has been placed on our Highly Commended List. The application was very strong and met all of our criteria, but we, unfortunately, do not have the funds available to offer a scholarship at this time. We are running a fundraising campaign over the Christmas period in the hope of securing donations to support additional scholarships. Should we receive adequate additional donations, new scholarships will be offered to these applicants who have been placed on our Highly Commended List.

2024 HSC results

Congratulations to the class of 2024 who achieved outstanding HSC results. The results were fantastic and I am proud of each and every student who sat the HSC in 2024. Everyone had a different story, and the majority of the students achieved the result they were after to pursue their career of choice.

The students who achieved the highest results included: Sarah Bauer, Alison Kleinschmidt, Jasmine Burke, Cutta Dundon, Daisy Daniel, Erica Nicholls, Mikayla McDonnell and Sienna Burke. Both Sarah Bauer and Alison Kleinschmidt achieved ATARs in the 90's with Sarah just edging out Alison for the Dux of the year.

The subjects that achieved the highest results included: Economics, English Advanced, Geography, Modern History, Hospitality, Primary Industries, Agriculture, CAFS, Music and PDHPE.

Naplan is held from the 12th March 2025 until 24th March 2025 for Year 7 and Year 9. Students will complete online exams in Reading, Writing, Language conventions and Numeracy.

Applications for any disability provision is now available. Some provisions require approval from NESA. These include colour contrast modification, double extra time or a scribe. If your child has a diagnosed condition, and would benefit from these provisions, please collect a disability adjustment form and provide documented evidence of the learning condition. As some of these provisions close early, it is important to complete these actions early. These provisions are marked with an * in the part of the form below.

Colour contrast modification, double extra time and a scribe applications close on 21st February 2025. These provisions generally assist students with specific learning disorders. These provisions usually require some form of medical evidence to support the application to NESA.

All other provisions requested must be completed by the 28th February. Parent withdrawal and exemption forms are available from the front office. 
LITERACY ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

Finley High School's 'Literacy Enrichment Program': supporting student success

At Finley High School, fostering strong literacy skills remains a key priority. Our Literacy Enrichment Program, which focused on vocabulary development, achieved positive outcomes in 2024 and has been thoughtfully updated for 2025 to build on these successes. Vocabulary consistently emerges as an area requiring growth, according to NAPLAN and Check-In Assessment data, and is crucial for literacy development. Research shows that students need to understand 95% of words in a text for full comprehension, making vocabulary one of most significant factors that impacts student outcomes.

What we achieved in 2024

Last year, Year 7 and 8 students participated in weekly vocabulary exercises during Monday morning roll-call. They worked through activities designed to improve their vocabulary knowledge, with advanced booklets available for select students. Teachers provided support by explaining word meanings in context and offering timely feedback. Post-testing each term demonstrated consistent growth, with an average of 75% of students showing vocabulary improvement across the year. However, staff and student feedback highlighted areas for improvement, such as the need for deeper understanding of words in context and building on a broader range of skills.




Exciting changes for 2025

Based on feedback and assessment data, this year's program has expanded its focus to include a wider range of literacy skills, and will be completed by students in Years 7, 8 and 9. Key updates include:


- **Enhanced vocabulary skills:** Greater emphasis on using context clues to interpret word meanings.
- **Reading comprehension:** Analysis of literary passages to assess how word choices shape meaning.
- **Critical thinking:** Activities like 'word clines' to explore subtle differences between synonyms.
- **Spelling and grammar awareness:** Morphological tasks and sentence construction activities.

- Creative and collaborative tasks: Encouraging students to brainstorm, problem-solve, and seek peer assistance.
- Metalanguage and visual Literacy: Helping students develop a deeper understanding of how language functions.


To keep students motivated, each week's activities vary to maintain engagement and challenge their thinking.



















Measuring success

Improved pre- and post-testing will help capture not just vocabulary retention but students' ability to apply their knowledge in new contexts. This shift supports a more authentic assessment of their growth in literacy.

We look forward to seeing how our students benefit from this enriched program throughout 2025. Thank you to our dedicated roll-call teachers for their ongoing support in guiding students through these valuable literacy exercises, and to the passionate English team who conduct the pre- and post-testing and reinforce students' knowledge and skills in the classroom.

Dear Parent/Caregiver.

Finley High School runs a program called "IXL" (I excel).

How does IXL Run?

- IXL operates for Years 11 and 12 and will run as a 3-period block once per week.
- Teachers of years 11 and 12 will provide work for students in their classes to complete during IXL.
 These tasks are compulsory. Teachers set, check and monitor that these tasks have been completed.
 In some circumstances, the tasks form the foundation of future learning in the classroom.
- Students will be provided with a booklet that they will complete each week. In the IXL booklet, students will plan their IXL time to ensure that all their allocated tasks are completed. This booklet will be kept and monitored on a weekly basis by the IXL coordinator.
- ATTENDANCE AT IXL SESSIONS IS COMPULSORY. Parents of absent students will be contacted each
 week.

What are the goals of IXL?

- We want all students who leave Finley High school to have skills for life. IXL is to encourage senior students to become lifelong independent learners and develop organisational and planning skills. Students will develop responsibility and accountability for more of their learning.
- Reducing face-to-face teaching in the HSC course by 1 period per subject per cycle has enabled 1 extra subject to be offered on each line.
- This has broadened the curriculum in the senior school.

Where does IXL occur?

• IXL sessions occur in the VTR and library which have been refurbished for this program. The library is be closed to all other classes during these times and will be for the exclusive use of Year 11 or Year 12.

Who will supervise IXL sessions?

• IXL sessions will be supervised by the IXL coordinator and the teacher librarian.

Continued.

Year 11 and 12 Teacher Responsibilities

- Each week teachers will set meaningful and compulsory learning activities for students to complete during IXL sessions (preferably with written instructions).
- Appropriate tasks could include: Reading and note taking from texts, answering exercises and
 questions from texts, answering exam style and past HSC questions, working on assessment tasks,
 preparing topic summaries, watching videos or movies that are directly related to course work
 (students must supply own earphones/buds), completing interactive tutorials and animations.
- Check and mark any set work and follow up with appropriate communication with the student and home. Record this in the HSC Monitoring folder.

Year 11 and 12 Student Responsibilities

- **BE RESPECTFUL:** to each other, to staff and to the library, following all rules on behaviour and attendance during IXL.
- **BE RESPONSIBLE:** be punctual and bring everything you require for 3 periods of independent learning during IXL each week.
- **BE LEARNING:** make wise use of your time; do your best to work hard and maintain your focus; develop some self-discipline and academic rigour. Your teachers will have supplied learning activities for you to do!

Travel Information for Excursions

When travel via bus for an excursion is offered this is the preferred method for students. If you are travelling in your private vehicle with students to any excursion then a Working with children's check is required. You can obtain a volunteer working with children's check through Service NSW.

From Service NSW Website:

The Working with Children Check (WWCC) is a requirement for anyone who works or volunteers in child-related work in NSW. It involves a National Police Check (criminal history record check) and a review of reportable workplace misconduct.

Results of a National Police Check can take up to 4 weeks to be received.

The outcome of a check is either a clearance to work with children or a bar against working with children. If cleared, the check will be valid for 5 years, however applicants are continuously monitored.

The application is free for volunteers.
