Victor Chang School Science Award





Staff Vs Year 12 Soccer

Today marked the 97th annual staff vs Yr. 12 soccer match held on the 'Tooke Oval' In front of a capacity crowd.

The sunny and dry conditions made for a fast game and although there were only 3 teachers take the field initially, it would be the teachers with the first forward play of the day which saw Dane Maxwell run into an open, unguarded goal only to miss from mere metres out. That wouldn't be his defining moment however as the disappointing result seemed to have ignited a fire within to bounce back and play a pivotal role throughout the match.

As the crowd filtered through the turnstiles, they would erupt as Tooke, Webb - the 2 time 'Whitty' medalist and Michelle Archinal - Defensive player of the year entered the arena. It didn't take long for all three to have an immediate impact as Webb showed why he is the best goalie this century with a diving save as soon as he stepped into the box. The steel capped blundstones copped an absolute beating with multiple long balls, giving the teachers the ascendency forward of the pitch. Tooke rock solid behind the ball demonstrating class and wisdom unflustered in the heat of the contest, cool, calm and collected as his feathered salt and peppered mane would suggest.

The Archinal and Tucker match up fascinated onlookers with Michelle's footwork bamboozling those around her and multiple plays through the middle of the ground to counteract the wayward attacking efforts of Tucker, Sneddon and Rosie Steel. The history faculty came through clutch in the second half of proceedings and it would be the Baxter-Jackson package deal was well worth their lucrative and highly speculated contract, not so much for their ability to move the ball but more so their relentless trash talking which clearly played havoc on the mindset of their Yr. 12 opponents. The Math Faculty was notably represented with quality on the ball through Johnson and Bower who calculated every possibility, managed to work every angle and showed the students that trigonometry does come in handy if your're looking to dismantle your opposition on a Soccer pitch.

Livewire centre-forward Jye McGuire had everyone in attendance spellbound with his remarkable speed over 5 metres separating himself from the Yr. 12 defence and control that Messi himself would envy. It would be McGuire that landed the first blow into the bottom right corner that not even Mark Viduka would get a hand on. From here on the Yr 12's found some spark through Dan Eldridge who for the first time in history was sighted without Westcoast Eagles paraphernalia and Harvey Sneddon who although way active around the ground, was wayward with his endeavour to say the least. Olivia Campbell and Chelsea Singleton both fought hard to gain some momentum and their efforts paid off as a group of Yr.12 channelled their inner mighty ducks with a perfectly choreographed 'flying V' to surge the ball forward resulting in a goal to level the scores.

Keen to capitalise on their momentum, Yr. 12 pushed hard to double down but would only be denied by Di Sexton who has found a new lease on life after her recent ankle reconstruction, finding space where there was none and denying any chance of a pile on. From that point, it would be Price and Sharp on the wings combining dangerously, slicing through their opposition giving James McNamara nightmares in goals, who, to be fair, stood tall under pressure. It was the repeat saves that would be his undoing in the end after a clean gather and attempted launch that saw his shoe fly from his foot further than the ball and in the moments following, D-MAX saw his opportunity to rectify his earlier miss and made no mistake ruthlessly finding the back of the net as McNamara retrieved his shoe.

The final stages of the match played out as an arm wrestle with both teams' defence efforts putting the stamp on what was a great game seeing the staff eventual winners 2-1. The "Matt Whitty" Best on Ground award went to Jye 'Golden Boot' McGuire for his heroics and showmanship early in the game, controversially to the disgust of Gary "the brick wall" Webb who was looking to pocket his 3rd consecutive medal. Webb was contacted to comment but denied the request.

Staff coach Dan Noonan said "It was tight at different stages but we knew that we would come away with the victory. Even though it's a 1 off annual charity match, we decided to rest a number of our stars and that's why we only started with 3 on the pitch. Although Baxter and Jackson cost us over 8 million for the 1 off transfer I think it paid off dividends, and McGuire was huge. I just hope Gary recovers from not being named best on pitch, that's tough. Not to mention I'm a fantastic coach."

After 97 encounters, remarkably the ledger settled at 96 and 1 draw in favor of the staff.

Annual FHS Staff vs Year 12 Soccer Match Report:

The Battle of Stamina, Strategy... and Substitutes

The much-anticipated annual Staff vs Year 12 soccer match kicked off in spectacular fashion - well, almost. Year 12 turned up in sharp kits, and game faces on, looking like they'd just walked off the A-League pitch. The staff, meanwhile, were conspicuously absent, still "warming up" (or perhaps hiding) somewhere in their staffrooms.

With only a handful of teachers on hand, desperate measures were taken. As the game progressed, staff reinforcements eventually began to arrive. One by one, more teachers trickled onto the field, lured either by the smell of competition or the promise of a post-game free period. Suddenly, Year 12 found themselves not only outnumbered, but facing fresh-legged teachers who had cunningly avoided the heat of the opening onslaught.

Sexton and Archinal worked tirelessly in the midfield for the staff, trying to contain the sure-footed Carter, who dodged and weaved with ease. Tooke and Johnson made some headway for the staff, occasionally sending the ball wide to Baxter or Sharp on the wings. These rare breakthroughs usually ended up at the feet of Bower or Maxwell, who both tried to valiantly deliver the ball further to the forward threats of Hay and McGuire. But time after time, the determination of Rorato, Steel, Mitchell, Campbell, and McNamara stood tall, repelling the advances of the tiring staff team. Thankfully for the teachers, Price and Jackson brought youthful energy and a much-needed injection of young legs to try and match the superior fitness of the Year 12 youngsters.

As the staff finally settled, at least a handful remembered they were there to play. Maxwell, however, should have gone to Specsavers, as his first shot, from directly in front of an open goal went spectacularly wayward.

Year 12 continued to move the ball around with style, with Eldridge and Carter regularly outpacing their staff opponents with quick feet and superior fitness. Unfortunately though for Year 12, McGuire snuck in a goal after a lapse in concentration from the back line. This, however, may have been less about staff skill and more about young McNamara showing respect for his elders, and in an attempt to ensure family Christmas went smoothly this year, kindly allowed McGuire to take an easy shot.

After the first score board addition, play resumed at pace. Year 12 team leader White and young gun Eldridge linked up smartly from the middle, while the ball ricocheted across the pitch like a pinball. Baxter, Archinal, Bower, Sharp and Price showed their class for the staff constantly pushing forward but they were continually met with fierce defence from Winn, Rorato, Campbell, Mitchell, Bonic and Steel. The young Year 12 lasses attacked the ball with less kicks and more cannon blasts which were powerful even if they were often slightly misguided. Like a rogue missiles they sent the ball bouncing unpredictably from foot to foot, keeping the staff scrambling in panic to try and maintain their upper hand.

Sneddon showed strong leadership, using his sheer strength on many occasions to clear the ball with booming kicks that sometimes cleared not just the goals but the field and the spectators as well. The staff held their breathe every time Sneddon loaded up. Gray also got in on the long kick action, unleashing a long bomb straight down the middle - much to her own surprise, and that of the staff around her. Tucker and Singleton worked extremely hard up forward, constantly feeding Eldridge and Carter, who peppered the staff goal. Yet Webb proved an impenetrable force between the posts, bravely throwing himself at the ball on every occasion and possibly scaring Year 12 strikers away with the threat of wearing one of his steel-capped boots and a subsequent disfiguring bruise for their Grad Ball next week. Persistence paid off however, as the youngsters eventually wore Webb down to find the back of the net and even the scores.

By this point, even Tooke recognised the staff's unfair advantage in stacking their team and in the spirit of sportsmanship, the Year 11 "ring-ins" were sent packing back to the sheds, while Hall and Belling also rotated onto the bench for Year 12.

Steel proved her toughness time and again throughout the game, withstanding some rather underhanded staff tactics, including being pushed to the ground on multiple occasions. Still, she bounced back and Year 12 pressed on.

The staff, meanwhile, maintained their determination to win at all costs. They pushed forward relentlessly, though with age against them fatigue was clearly setting in. Ultimately, a miskick though from Year 12's goalie McNamara, who lost his shoe mid-clearance allowed Maxwell to redeem himself with an easy goal.
