#### PREMIER'S DEBATING CHALLENGE - YEARS 7 & 8

Our Year 7 Debating Team, comprising Dawson E, Lilly A, Chloe B and Felicity T, had a very successful 2025 Premier's Debating Challenge. As Zone Champions they progressed to the Sydney Region knockout rounds. They won the first round debate against Cronulla High School (details in the previous newsletter).

In Round 2 of the Regional knockout, the team debated Caringbah High School. The topic was 'that all sports leagues should invest in professional eSports versions of their game.' Heathcote took the negative side and presented clear and well thought out arguments to win the debate.

In the Sydney Region Semi Final the team debated Sydney Boys High School. The topic was 'The government should provide financial aid to lower socio-economic areas first following a natural disaster'. We were the negative team. Unfortunately the team lost in a very close debate. A 3rd adjudicator was needed to come in and rule on the debate because it was a split decision by the two adjudicators assigned to the debate.

The Sydney Boys High team are in Year 8 and will now compete in the Sydney Regional Final. The winner of this debate will go on to the State Championships tournament at the University of Sydney.

To lose so narrowly in the Semi Final is a massive effort and we are so proud of you and your coach Ms A Roberts. Being in Year 7, the team will be eligible to compete in the Year 7 & 8 challenge next year.

At Heathcote High School we are passionate about assisting students to fulfil their potential as learners and people. We recognise that learning and wellbeing are linked and conduct the following programs to support students' wellbeing:

**FLOURISH Program** - a self-growth program for Year 7 students which is designed to help students with their high school journey. The program is run weekly by our school counsellor and Student Support Officer. The program consisted of an initial introductory session and seven sessions to promote general wellbeing with a focus on:

- Increasing self-awareness and personal strengths, emotional literacy and empathy awareness, learning to build self-esteem and resilience and building healthy relationships and establishing a positive rapport with others.

**SEASONS FOR GROWTH Program** is a small group education program that supports children and young people to develop the knowledge, skills and attitudes to understand and respond well to experiences of change, loss and grief.

Seasons for Growth supports children and young people who have experienced change and loss, including, although not limited to friendship changes; family separation; loss or death of someone they care about; loss of a pet; relocation and forced migration; living away in out of home care; physical or mental illness; or impacts of war, terrorism or pandemics.

This program is run by our qualified Student Support Officer - Shanlee O'Reilly.

**FIT FOR CHANGE** Tailored to address the core principles of risk, need and responsivity. This program focuses on the 7 risk/need factors to build resilience for young people aged 13 – 16 years old. Run by our Student Support Officer and Youth Engagement Officers, selected students are chosen to undertake the course throughout the year.

**Year 7 Tutorials** – A Resilience Program for Year 7 students run during tutorials each fortnight. The Year 7 Year Advisor uses a combination of fun, interactive activities, quizzes, animations and information across nine positive psychology domains - gratitude, optimism, flow, meaning, hope, mindfulness, character strengths, healthy lifestyle, and positive relationships. My Resilience is an early-intervention training run as a personalised workshop for students.

**GEM Girls** stands for Goal-driven, Empowered and Motivated Girls. This female leadership program focuses on empowering teenage girls with information and strategies to help them tackle the unique challenges faced by their generation. The program has been specifically tailored to suit high school girls who need extra guidance and support in hopes of redirecting their goals and enabling them to be leaders. The program runs once a week and focuses on students in Year 9.

Positive Lifestyles Program is being run at Heathcote High School for selected students across all year groups. The Program runs for one hour a week where students undertake workshops run by qualified mentors from the Salvation Army. The program focuses on resilience, help seeking skills, sense of belonging and goal setting tools. It provides students with the skills and resources young people need to support their mental health, social and emotional wellbeing and engagement with school and to navigate the complexity of adolescence and the challenges life may throw at them.

**Teen Empowerment Program -** A real and relatable session that helps teen girls understand self-belief, emotional wellness, and how to handle pressures without turning to numbing behaviours. The goal is to equip them with the confidence to make decisions that align with their true selves.

**The Cyber Bullying Program** - The Cyber Bullying program has been created in close consultation with leading education experts and delivered free to secondary schools across Australia by our Police Liaison Officers.

The Cyber Bullying talk contains engaging information, to empower and inform Australia's young people. By making informed choices, the program teaches students the advantages of a positive online presence whilst arming them with the facts they need to stay safe online in a way students can understand, use and enjoy.

**Mastering Behaviour Program** teaches students about making and keeping friends, character, conflict, social media, drugs, bullying, cyber safety, care, compassion, resilience... and many more topics. This program works with selected students on a 1:1 basis where student behaviour is

positively reinforced and practised as they learn how to regulate their behaviour, develop positive social skills and deal with conflicts in a constructive and restorative manner.

Year 12 Mentoring Program and Senior Learning Centre allow for the individual senior student to have 1:1 mentoring focusing on the needs of the student.

Throughout the year students have the opportunity to be involved in many wellbeing events such as the **Stand Tall Excursion** whereby a host of speakers are together in one room to arm students with the skills of resilience, the strength to stand up to bullying, the keys to motivation, the power of perspective and the benefits of making good and wise decisions. **Share the Dignity Project and the Red Shield Appeal** to help those less privileged members of our community.

We are also actively involved in the annual Walk 4 Respectful Relationships, World's Greatest Shave and numerous First Nation Leadership Opportunities and Events.

## **Max Kypriotis**

Max completed his HSC as the School Captain and Dux of 2019, carrying an impressive 13 units while simultaneously completing a UNSW computer course. Following this, he pursued a Bachelor of Mechatronic Engineering (Honours) / Bachelor of Science (Physics) at the University of Sydney.

During his studies, he had the opportunity to write his undergraduate thesis with the Rio Tinto Centre for Mine Automation, titled Multi-Robot Cooperation for Blast Hole Inspection on Mine Sites. Max has also contributed to mitigating the global energy crisis by conducting research on building-integrated photovoltaics, co-authoring a research paper that was published in Joule, a leading research journal that addresses the need for more sustainable energy.

He now works at the University of Sydney as a Research and Development Engineer within the School of Physics, developing innovative sensors for a range of cutting-edge applications.

Blake, captain of our triumphant University Shield team in 2019, has extended his contract with Cronulla Sharks full-time NRL training squad after standout NSW Cup campaigns. Blake had a key role in helping Newtown Jets, the Sharks' feeder team, win the NSW Cup premiership in 2024 and guiding the Jets to the semi-finals in 2025 despite adversity throughout the season.





Blake, known as a hard-working and talented lock/back rower, has risen through the ranks after first representing the Sharks at the Harold Matthews Cup level in 2019 and was crowned the Jersey Flegg Player of the Year in 2022 and 2023 before graduating to the NSW Cup with Newtown Jets. Over the past two seasons, 2024 and 2025, Blake claimed the Jets' Most Consistent award.

With only 3 practicals, they managed to create some terrific scenes. Thanks for playing, Year 7. It was wonderful to see your team work and creative application skills develop.



To summarise Ayla's journey, due to a sporting injury, surgery and a long recovery her HSC result was impacted. With career advice, Ayla applied to the UOW College to study Diploma of Business Fast Track.

Ayla found that the smaller classes and supportive teachers at UOW College made it easier to ask questions and engage in the coursework. It also helped her build strong study habits, like time management, and improve her communication skills. The smaller classes were also ideal for building supportive friendships that, alongside the strong academic foundation, eased her transition to the second year of the UOW Bachelor of Business (Marketing) degree.

Through the Aunty Linda Cruse Scholarship her UOW College tuition fees were covered and Ayla also had the support of the Woolyungah Indigenous Centre. She is passionate about inspiring other First Nations students to pursue higher education.

The UOW College, and similar pathway programs at other universities, are an excellent option for students who may not meet direct entry requirements or would like to access additional learning support as they balance work,



study and sporting commitments. These diploma programs can also provide entry into the second year of a bachelor's degree, meaning there's often no additional time or cost to complete the qualification.
