Sydney Southeast Symphonic Winds – Showcase Performance

Congratulations to Lauren K (Year 8) on your performance at the Sydney Southeast Symphonic Winds Showcase. I had the privilege of attending the Showcase on Sunday 2 November at Verbrugghen Hall - Sydney Conservatorium of Music and was most impressed with the talent, energy, passion and musicianship on display.

This is Lauren's second year as a member of the Sydney Southeast Symphonic Winds convened by the Arts Unit. After a busy year of camp, rehearsals and performances, including the Cantabile Festival at the Sydney Opera House, their final performance of 2025, the Showcase, featured 112 students from 44 Public Primary and Secondary Schools.

Social Media Age Restrictions

From 10 December, age restricted social media platforms will not be allowed to let under 16-year olds create or keep an account. To assist parents in understanding these changes and supporting their under-16 children during this transition, we have prepared an information sheet (see towards the end of the newsletter). The eSafety Commissioner's website has comprehensive information about these changes. https://www.esafety.gov.au/about-us/industry-regulation/social-media-age-restrictions-hub

The aim is to help protect young users from online pressures and risks, which can include platform features which encourage excessive screen time through constant notifications and disappearing content, as well as algorithms which may expose children to negative or manipulative content. These features have been associated with negative impacts on health and well-being – including

increased stress levels, and reduced sleep and concentration. Young people can also be exposed to harmful conduct such as cyberbullying, harmful content and online predators.

Currently, the age restricted social media platforms are: Facebook, Instagram, Kick, Reddit, Snapchat, Threads, TikTok, Twitch, X (formerly Twitter) and YouTube.



Kelsie is also performing a solo song in our upcoming MADD Night from the musical, 'Dear Evan Hansen'.




MADD Night

ALUMNI CONGRATULATIONS

Rear Admiral Matthew Buckley - Deputy Chief of Navy

Our students, who recently attended the Navy Life Expo, had the pleasure of meeting a Heathcote High alumnus, RADM Matt Buckley. He took the time to speak with our students and Careers Adviser, share his journey, and reminisce fondly about his school days at HHS.

RADM Buckley joined the Royal Australian Navy in 1990 and graduated from the Australian Defence Force Academy in 1992. He spent the tactical phase of his career as a submariner serving in Oberon and Collins class submarines. He also spent two years on exchange in a Canadian Submarine based in Halifax Nova Scotia, and serving in the commissioning crew of HMAS Rankin.

Following Command training, RADM Buckley commanded the Submarine HMAS Collins and later served as the Commander of the Australian Submarine Force.

RADM Buckley has served in a number of senior staff appointments including as Director Submarine Capability, Director General Navy Operations, Director General Navy People and Head of Nuclear Submarine Capability. He is a graduate of the Australian Defence and Strategic Studies course where he received the Secretary of Defence - Chief of Defence Force prize. RADM Buckley commenced as Deputy Chief of Navy in January 2025.

RADM Buckley was awarded the Conspicuous Service Cross (CSC) in 2015 for his contribution to the Submarine Capability, and in 2024 was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for exceptional service in senior leadership roles within the Royal Australian Navy.

RADM Buckley's career is a powerful reminder to our students that great things can start right here at HHS. His dedication, leadership, and lifelong learning, earning multiple degrees, including, Bachelor of Arts and a Masters of Strategy and Policy from the University of New South Wales, and a Masters of International Relations from Deakin University, shows that with passion and perseverance, anything is possible.


Year 11 Physics

NSW Department of Education

Dear Parents/Carers/Guardians.

All public schools in New South Wales have the opportunity to take part in an exciting initiative run by the Department of Education. We are excited to share that all students in years 5 to 12 will soon be able to use NSWEduChat, a cutting-edge generative Artificial Intelligence chat tool operated by the department. Unlike ChatGPT and other tools, NSWEduChat has been designed to respond to students with guidance and by asking open-ended questions. NSWEduChat can answer questions and provide information, acting as a useful learning aid for your child. While NSWEduChat is sophisticated, it does not replace human teachers or tutors. Instead, it offers additional support, helping to reinforce understanding and encourage students to explore and share their thoughts and reasoning.

NSWEduChat may also be incorporated into lessons by your child's teachers, helping them learn how to use NSWEduChat in various subjects, about the potential implications of generative AI, and highlighting its capacity to create content that may require thoughtful and responsible use.

NSWEduChat is a powerful tool, but it can provide incorrect or incomplete responses.

What personal information will be collected?

The NSWEduChat Al tool collects data that includes the record of all interactions your child has with the tool, encompassing every question asked and the corresponding responses provided. Additionally, some basic user identifiers, such as your child's name or a unique user identifier assigned by the system, are also collected to enhance the personalisation of the learning experience. These measures help ensure that your child has a seamless, supportive and unique learning journey with NSWEduChat.

In-app surveys may appear which are optional for students to complete. The purpose of these surveys is to inform potential future activities such as monitoring, research, and evaluation.

How will the department use the information?

The information collected during the use of this tool will be used for the following purposes:

- For your child The conversation data collected may be used by NSWEduChat to create
 personalised experiences for your child, by incorporating characteristics of the conversation in
 future conversations.
- In the school Your child's teacher may be able to review conversations between NSWEduChat
 and your child for safety, quality and training purposes. The tool's content filter may trigger
 disclosures related to self-harm concerns to the school to ensure your child's safety. These staff
 will know the identity of your child.
- Within the department Both combined and de-identified data will be used by teams to improve
 the delivery of public education. Where analysis requires looking at individual questions and
 responses, those interactions will be de-identified so that anyone seeing the question or response
 will not know which student was involved. Where appropriate, information will be grouped together
 so that the staff can see overall patterns in the information, not individual student information.
 These staff will not know the identity of your child.

Within the department, staff members responsible for managing the process of de-identifying and combining the data will be the only additional persons who will know the identity of your child. These staff may combine the NSWEduChat data with other data held by the department prior to the de-identifying and combing of the data where it may assist with improving public education.

Will the information be disclosed to anyone outside the department?

The information will not be disclosed to anyone outside the department unless it is consistent with the privacy legislation or as permitted or required by any other law.

One possible exception will occur in very rare circumstances whereby the department is required to submit a mandatory report to the Department of Communities & Justice. This will occur if the tool's content filter triggers disclosures related to self-harm concerns, the school is contacted, and it is deemed that there is a significant risk to your child's safety or wellbeing.

Staff responsible for supporting your child may have access to information and know your child's identity.

Is participation voluntary?

Yes. Although your child will be provided access to NSWEduChat, it is entirely optional for them to use it. They may choose not to use it at all, or only when they wish to.

At the point of enrolment, the department provides information about the use of online services and obtained parental consent for their use. NSWEduChat is included as part of that agreement.

Where is the information held and how can it be accessed?

NSWEduChat will be delivered electronically to your child's Department of Education student portal.

When your child uses NSWEduChat the 'chat' conversation is encrypted and transmitted over the internet to a department server with a token that identifies your child.

Only when the answer arrives at the department server can it be re-combined with your child's identity.

All information collected by NSWEduChat is stored in Australia using department-owned services.

The department endeavours to ensure that the personal and health information it collects and holds is accurate, complete and up to date by encouraging families to regularly update the information if there are changes and by allowing access to and alteration of the information.

Requests to access and update personal and health information should be made directly to the school. The department's <u>privacy management plan</u> has information about how requests are handled.

SOCIAL MEDIA MINIMUM AGE Coming Monday 10th December 2025

Get Ready for the New Social Media Minimum Age

The Australian Government is taking world-leading action to reduce online harms experienced by young Australians by introducing a minimum age to access social media. From 10 December 2025, social media platforms will need to take reasonable steps to prevent Australians under 16 from having a social media account. Importantly, the responsibility will be on the social media platforms, not parents, carers or children, to follow this law. Delaying access to social media will help protect the health and wellbeing of young people and give them extra time to develop real world connections and digital literacy skills before they join global platforms.

This change will reduce access for young people to some of the harmful aspects of social media, such as algorithms that recommend content, infinite scrolling, and other features designed to keep users continuously engaged. The law is intended to capture social media platforms such as; TikTok, Instagram, Snapchat, X, Facebook and Youtube.

But it won't stop young people from staying in touch with friends online, playing games, learning new things and being entertained. In fact, they will be able to access messaging apps, online gaming, professional networking and development services, and services that are primarily for the purpose of education and health support.

This delay to social media will give young Australians more time to develop real world connections and digital literacy skills before they join global platforms. For more information, and tips on helping under 16s prepare for the change, visit the eSafety website.

SOCIAL MEDIA MINIMUM AGE

Coming Monday 10th December 2025

What Can Parents Do?

- Talk with your young person about the social media minimum age. Ask how they feel about its benefits and impacts. Use conversation guides available on the Headspace website.
 Discuss possible alternative activities together.
- Encourage connecting with friends and family through in-person meetings, online games, or messaging apps.
- Remind them they can download data, photos, and videos from their social media accounts by following instructions from major platforms or links on the eSafety website.
- Review the eSafety Social Media Age Restrictions: Get-Ready Guide for under-16s with your young person.
- Visit the eSafety page for FAQs, advice on managing conflict about the change, family support tools, and helpful resources.

No matter how old a student is, if they have a harmful experience online, they should reach out for support - even if they are under 16 and it happens on an agerestricted social media platform. eSafety's "I need help" page for young people has more detailed information and guidance on what they can do if something goes wrong online.
