Swimming Records Broken!

On Wednesday, February 19, the swimming carnival showcased outstanding performances from Penny Hughes, Dylan Forde, and the McCabe Under 16 relay team, which included Natalie Sheehan, Sienna Yerbury, Penny Hughes and Lisbeth Toole. Penny set an impressive five new records in the Under 14 Female category, while Dylan broke the 50-metre Backstroke record in the Under 15 category. In addition, the McCabe House relay team broke the record previously set in 2020.

In the final tally, McCabe claimed victory with an impressive total of 748 points. However, the true highlight was the spirit of competition, as participants from all houses displayed remarkable talent and determination in the pool.

Year 12 Legal Studies Canberra

On Friday the 21 February, Year 12 Legal Studies travelled to Canberra as part of the Crime unit of the HSC curriculum. Students visited three different levels of court on the day, The ACT Magistrates Court, The ACT Supreme Court and the High Court of Australia.

Students were able to observe trial procedures for a number of different offences (some very serious) including closing arguments in a jury trial, a sentencing hearing, and a bail application.

They were also able to see the roles of different people inside a working court room such as judges, solicitors, barristers and court officers. In one courtroom the judge sensed that we were watching a fairly dry proceeding, so she stopped the hearing to find a court with something more exciting for the students. Needless to say we were quite appreciative.

Students were also given a guided tour of the High Court of Australia, where they discussed important decisions made by the court such as the Mabo decision.

Courtrooms can be very intimidating and overwhelming places and the students handled themselves respectfully, showing themselves to be great representatives of the Henry Lawson High School.

Raise Your Voice





NAPLAN 2025 parent and carer information Suggested school newsletter or email content

Each year the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is sat by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Students will participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

NAPLAN 2025 will take place from Wednesday 12 March to Monday 24 March.

NAPLAN is just one part of our school's learning assessment program. The tests assess literacy and numeracy skills your child is already learning at school, so the best preparation is their everyday classroom learning. Our school will also undertake activities to help students become familiar with the types of questions and tools available in the online tests.

I graduated from The Henry Lawson High School in 2013, where I was actively involved in the School Band, Choir, and various sporting teams and competitions. These extracurricular activities helped me develop new skills and taught me how to balance my time between schoolwork and other commitments. PDHPE was definitely my favourite subject. I've always enjoyed playing sports, but I also found learning about how the body works fascinating. I enjoyed Physics in Years 11 and 12 as well; despite the challenges, I appreciated learning how things function and interact with one another.

I am currently working at a global nutrition company, Herbalife Australia & New Zealand, as an Events Manager. 
