

Oskar Sander Selected for the NSWCHS Under 16 Rugby Team

We are incredibly proud to announce that Oskar Sander has been selected to represent three major rugby teams in 2025: the Mudgee Wombats, the Central West Bulls Under 16s (Club Union), and the NSW Combined High Schools (NSWCHS) Under 16 Team (Schools Union).

Due to the absence of a trial pathway through our school or Western zone, Oskar had to enter directly into open selection for the NSWCHS team, competing against some of the strongest school-aged rugby players across New South Wales. In a remarkable achievement, he not only earned his place in the squad, but secured the starting number 3 tight head prop position.

In June, Oskar will represent Central West Bulls at the NSW Junior State Championships, held at Eric Tweedale Stadium, Granville. This event is part of the Club Union pathway and features top regional teams from across NSW. It will be closely watched by selectors scouting talent for the Under 16 Waratahs, a key stepping stone toward professional rugby.

This is a significant accomplishment, not just for Oskar, but for Kandos

High School and our entire community. To see a student from a small, rural school earn a starting position in a state-level team through open trial is truly outstanding. It reflects Oskar's dedication, resilience, and skill, and proves that big things can come from small schools.

ANZAC Service Of Remembrance


We sincerely thank our veterans for their continued support, and for the time they give to help our students understand the true meaning of ANZAC Day and the importance of remembrance.

Gaanha-Girri: Carrying Future

On Wednesday, 7 May, a group of our Indigenous students participated in Part 2 of the Gaanha-Girri: Carrying Future Program, continuing their cultural learning journey with an excursion to The Drip near Mudgee, a site of great cultural and environmental significance.



The Drip, also known as Dripping Rock, is a striking sandstone formation located on Wiradjuri Country along the Goulburn River. Water seeps through the rock face year-round, creating a lush, tranquil space rich with native flora. For Aboriginal people, it is a sacred site, a place for reflection, storytelling, and spiritual connection.








Year 11 Biology Field Study

On Wednesday 7 May, our Year 11 Biology students, accompanied by Mrs Karen Simpson, undertook a field study at Ganguddy Reserve in Wollemi National Park, exploring the unique dry sclerophyll ecosystem firsthand.

Throughout the day, students investigated the biotic (living) and abiotic (non-living) components of the environment. They collected data on factors such as soil moisture, light intensity, and species diversity, while also observing the complex interrelationships between organisms and their surroundings.

Big Science Competition




Biotechnology Expo

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative ' requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational
 outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. School Vaccination - Student Information



Vaccination is a simple and clever way to protect you from serious diseases now and later in your life. It also protects your friends and family by helping stop the spread of disease.

What to expect

Before vaccination day

Don't miss out on these free vaccines! Remind your parent or carer to complete the online consent form at https://engage.health.nsw.gov.au/engage, or ask your school for a paper consent form.

Your parent or carer will need to complete the form before you get vaccinated at school.

On the day

- Have a good breakfast.
- If your school allows it, wear a short sleeve shirt like your sports uniform.
- A nurse will talk to you about the vaccine. There may be other students already there.
- Make sure you let the teacher or nurse know if you are feeling nervous or unwell.
- The nurse will ask you some questions:
 - Your name, date of birth and address
 - Check that your consent form has been signed
 - Ask if you are feeling well or have any allergies
 - Other questions about your health and wellbeing.
- When getting your vaccine, you may feel a little pinch, sting or tingle.
- After you get your vaccine, you will wait for 15 minutes to make sure you're feeling well.
- It is common to get some swelling, muscle ache, redness and a small red lump at where you had the injection.
 You may also feel tired or have a headache.
- Make sure you keep moving your arm to help with muscle soreness.
- After vaccination you can play sport, have a shower and participate in after school activities.

Your vaccines and why they are important

Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine This vaccine is important as it protects you against HPV-related cancers and illnesses that can affect everyone.	Meningococcal ACWY vaccine This vaccine is important as it protects against four types of meningococcal bacteria, which cause serious disease that can quickly become life-threatening.
Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough), (dTpa) vaccine This vaccine is important as it protects you against three illnesses – diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis, also known as whooping cough. These illnesses are serious and can be life threatening.	Remember – if you're not at school on vaccination day, don't worry. You can catch up at a future school clinic, or you can get a free vaccine at your GP or local pharmacy.


