YEAR 7 2025 TRANSITION - IN FULL SWING

Orientation Day, held Tuesday this week, was a great success. *It is an absolute pleasure to welcome new students and families to our great school* and we look forward to working together over the coming years.





KMHS is a proud member of the Kariong Mountains Learning Community and the transition program implemented is designed to have students known, valued and cared for even before they step into the KMHS uniform.

The Student Services and Support Unit teams have worked tirelessly with our partner schools throughout the year, to build student profiles for all students, provide opportunities for students to attend KMHS and familiarise themselves with the high school setting and meeting with staff and students at length to gather the information required for a successful transition. Thankyou, to our partner schools Kariong, Somersby, Peats Ridge, Kulnura and Central Mangrove Public Schools for their ongoing support and partnerships in the education of our students.

STAGE 6 TRANSITION PROGRAM

It is well documented that students transitioning from Year 10 (Stage 5) to Year 11 (Stage 6) require supports and development of skills that prepare them for this next stage.

This year, the school is facilitating an alternate curriculum for three weeks, encompassing skill building, welfare and social skills programs to support Year 10 as they transition to Year 11 2025. As I write this, Year 10 are currently participating in external work experience as a part of their career development.

Next week, students will be visiting Macquarie University and also completing **Taster** lessons in their subject pattern for 2025. This time will also give the school the opportunity for students to refine their subject patterns in readiness for a seamless transition to Stage 6 in 2025. Disability Provisions for the **Higher School Certificate** Examinations 2025 are now open!

Disability provisions in the HSC are practical arrangements, designed to help students, who couldn't otherwise make a fair attempt to show what they know in an exam room.


Students are eligible to access disability provisions under the following categories:

- ► Learning difficulties
- Medical disabilities
- Hearing and Vision disabilities

The provisions granted, are solely determined by how the student's exam performance is affected. Eligible students must apply to the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) through the school.

Students who wish to apply for disability provisions should see Mr Treece.

Visual Arts in the Classroom

Our Visual Arts and Photography Video and Digital Imagery students have been very productive this semester. What a way to finish off the 2024 school year at KMHS!

Art and Soul Exhibition

The Yearly Visual Arts 7-12 exhibition showcases the magic and wonder of all things creative. An impressive array of works across all 2D and 3D expressive forms was apparent, with heightened levels of creativity displayed at every corner of the exhibition. Congratulations must go to the Visual Arts staff for their dedication in setting up the works and spaces.









Senior Art and Photography

Year 12 Visual Arts and Photography students have submitted their Major Projects. Several of the works produced are conceptual and have a degree of technical skill that bodes well for some good results. Year 11 VA has transitioned into their HSC studies and have been experimenting with mediums and working towards developing their concepts and skills for the Body Of Work for 2025.



Year 11 PVDI played with light and long exposure to create ghost photography with excellent results. Year 11 has transitioned into Year 12 and is working through the architecture street photography unit.



The students created and photographed their 'staple' cities, focusing on composition techniques, shutter speed, and depth of field. The students are currently exploring darkroom practices.

Stage 5 - ART and **Photographic and Digital Media**

Year 9 and 10 Visual Arts students have been learning printmaking skills. They were given a specific theme to interpret using objects or people. This term, the students have been working on projects that interest them.

Year 9 and 10 Photography students have learnt about forced perspective and trick photography. This term, they have focused on camera craft and experimenting with slow shutter speeds, exposure, lighting, and colour to create beautiful images of light painting.



Stage 4

The talented Year 7 students have worked in a range of expressive forms. Students commenced the semester focusing on insects to create a variety of two-dimensional artworks, ranging from collage, pen drawings and watercolour paintings. Each task focused on composition and anatomical details of an array of insects. Year 7 students were introduced to the storytelling of Shaun Tan and his work 'The Lost Thing'. Students successfully produced vibrant and colourful drawings portraying the main character of this novel. This task introduced to students how contrast and tone can be utilised to create depth and a three dimensional quality to their drawings.









Repurposing and recycling was the focus of an artmaking task which required students to turn scrap cardboard into tribal looking masks. Students used acrylic paint and the dry painting technique to enhance their masks.

Students then moved on to working in the SteamPunk genre. This unit introduced students to this style based on the Industrial Revolution meets Futurism. Detailed drawings of cogs, wheels, pipes and clocks provided the perfect preliminary task before students embarked on three-dimensional artmaking. Students had a choice of making a SteamPunk hat or creature using a vast array of materials ranging from wood, screws, bolts, washers, nails, wire, lightbulbs, beads, feathers and textured material. The results are outstanding!
