Agriculture Students Learn about Livestock Care

Last week, our Agriculture students rolled up their sleeves and got involved in a range of practical farm management activities as part of their ongoing livestock care studies.

Students were busy maintaining and improving animal facilities, from tending to the chicken coop and checking nesting boxes to improving stock water access by digging trenches for new plumbing lines and caring for the sheep. The group demonstrated excellent teamwork and problem-solving skills as they mustered sheep, yarded them, cleaned enclosures, collected eggs and ensured the animals' wellbeing.

One highlight of the session was a hands-on demonstration of sheep shearing, giving students valuable experience in animal handling and care. Others took charge of inspecting the poultry area, ensuring clean nesting spaces and collecting our delicious free-range eggs from the hens. These practical lessons give students a real taste of agricultural life, helping them develop essential skills in animal husbandry, responsibility, and sustainable farming practices.

Our Agriculture team continues to be impressed by the enthusiasm and dedication shown by students in keeping our school farm running smoothly.

Students Build and Sell Flat-Pack Chicken Coop

Over the past six months, students from the Construction course have been hard at work building a flat pack chicken coop. The project combined practical construction skills with teamwork, and problem-solving. All aimed at producing a functional, high-quality structure suitable for a local family.

Working collaboratively, the students planned, fabricated, and assembled the coop, ensuring that every detail met both durability and safety standards for the hens that will soon call it home. The coop features a fully enclosed run, corrugated metal cladding, and easy to assemble modular panels that allow for simple transport and setup, true to the flatpack concept.

Once complete, the structure was loaded onto a trailer and delivered to its new owners, who were delighted with the craftsmanship and attention to detail.

The sale marks a rewarding end to months of learning and hands on effort, giving students valuable experience in taking a project from concept to completion and sale.

Projects like this one provide authentic learning opportunities that link classroom theory with real-world application and demonstrate the impressive skill, teamwork, and pride our students bring to their work.

We cooled off with some delicious lemonades, packed boxes of fresh produce for our community, fed the sheep with leftover veggie scraps, and finished by making some cashew cream cheese, a blend of cashews,

nutritional yeast, ACV, garlic powder, and salt and pepper. Delish!



keep representing our student voice within our local government. You can find more info on their Facebook and website.






