PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Term 3 has had an outstanding start, with students excelling in a number of areas across the school. From academic achievement to creative and sporting pursuits, the enthusiasm and commitment shown by our students has been exceptional. It has been wonderful to see students embracing every opportunity to learn, participate, and represent our school with pride. This strong beginning is a credit to the efforts of both staff and students, and it is pleasing to see such positive momentum as we move into the middle of the term.

Congratulations to our Year 12 students who have been completing their major projects in subjects as diverse as Society and Culture, Industrial Technology, and Visual Arts. These projects represent the culmination of many months of hard work, creativity, and perseverance. With HSC Trial Examinations beginning soon, we encourage all students to study hard, prepare thoroughly, and strive to achieve their personal best. Dates have also been set for the external markers in Dance, Industrial Technology, and Music, who will be visiting the school in the coming weeks to assess practical performances and projects. We are incredibly proud of the effort and commitment shown by our Year 12 students and wish them every success as they take these important steps towards their final examinations.

















Congratulations to our outstanding sportspeople, whose achievements continue to make our school community proud. We are especially delighted to recognise alumni student Kirra D, who has been selected in the 2025 Public Schools All Star Team. Kirra, now a star in the NRLW with the North Queensland Cowboys, is a former student of both Kincumber High School and Copacabana Public School. Graduating in 2015, she remains a wonderful role model, inspiring current students with her dedication, resilience, and passion for sport. Her success is a reminder to our students of what can be achieved through persistence, discipline, and a love for the game.

Our current students are also excelling on the sporting stage. Beau H of Year 8 and Will G of Year 10 have both been selected in the NSW Waratahs Under 14s and Under 16s squads, with Beau also proudly captaining the NSW Country team in the recent City v Country clash. Both boys are outstanding talents of the future, showcasing the skill, leadership, and determination nurtured within our school. Adding to this, Darcy S was earlier this term selected in the prestigious Australian Schoolboys Rugby League team, while Kaiden M achieved selection in Reserve Grade for the Sydney Swans. These remarkable achievements across such a wide range of sports are a testament to the incredible talent of our students and the outstanding opportunities provided within our public education system.

The school has also achieved incredibly well in the NSW Public School Survey (NPSS), which gathers feedback from students about their thoughts and feelings on life at Kincumber High School. The results are then compared to both the state average and our Statistically Similar Schools Group (SSSG). A school's ICSEA value determines this group, which is made up of up to 60 schools serving students with similar levels of socio-educational advantage.

These comparisons provide valuable insights into how our students experience school life and the extent to which we are meeting their academic, social, and wellbeing needs.

The survey results show that Kincumber High School is performing exceptionally well in key areas. An impressive 63% of students strongly agreed that the school cares about their opinions, which is 20% higher than both the state and SSSG averages. 72% of students strongly agreed that the school has a very positive culture, placing us 17% above the SSSG. Students also felt that the school's facilities were superior to both state and SSSG averages, reflecting the significant investment in our learning environment. Importantly, issues of bullying and discrimination, always a cause for concern, were reported at 12% below the state average, and students indicated that the school addresses these issues 16% more effectively than both the state and SSSG benchmarks. These results affirm that Kincumber High School is not only a place of learning, but also a safe, supportive, and welcoming environment.

These outstanding results are a testament to the work of Phil Goucher, Head Teacher Welfare, and our outstanding Year Advisors, who provide constant support and guidance to students. They also reflect the great relationships and trust that exist between staff, students, and parents and carers. In addition, they highlight the strong focus on Student Voice, led by Heidi Nader, and the student leadership directions she has so successfully overseen. The emphasis on student voice ensures that young people at Kincumber High School are genuinely heard, valued, and empowered to influence the culture of their school in meaningful ways.



From here, these results will be carefully discussed at both an Executive and whole staff level to ensure that we continue building on these positive outcomes. Importantly, feedback and advice will also be taken from our Student Leadership Group, who play a key role in representing the voice of their peers and shaping school culture. In addition, the results will be shared with the P&C, whose input and perspective remain invaluable in strengthening our partnerships between school and home. Together, these discussions will focus on one central question: How do we make further improvements to ensure that every student's experience at school is as happy, safe, and rewarding as it can possibly be?

Amongst these outstanding results, we are saddened to share that Mr Jake Page has been accepted into Fire and Rescue NSW—an incredible honour, with only the very best selected, and achieved on his first attempt. Jake is an outstanding teacher, incredibly well respected by his peers, students, and the wider community, and his departure will certainly be felt across the school. He will be leaving us on Friday of Week 8, with plans to return in a casual capacity in 2026. To ensure continuity for our students, the Year Advisor position for Year 11 will be taken up by Mr Blackwood, who was this cohort's Year Advisor at the very start of their schooling. We congratulate Jake on this remarkable achievement, thank him for his exceptional contribution to our school, and wish him every success in his new service.

As always, we thank our parents, carers, and the wider community for their continued support of Kincumber High School. Your encouragement and pride in our students make a real difference. Looking ahead, I hope to share in our next newsletter an update on a major sound upgrade in the hall and the purchase of bird-proof bins to improve waste management across the school. These projects will further enhance the learning environment and daily life at Kincumber High.


Year 12 Major Works:

Trial HSC Examinations, 18-29 August:



Year 10 TAFE Tasters:







ENGLISH REPORT

The English Language Faculty has commenced Term 3 with high expectations for creative and critical writing across all year levels.


In Year 7, students are immersing themselves in the magical world of Harry Potter. They are exploring significant themes such as friendship, bravery, and the conflict between good and evil, while simultaneously developing their reading comprehension and analytical skills. It is commendable to observe their enthusiasm as they connect with the characters and the intricate narrative crafted by J.K. Rowling, in addition to improving their TEEL writing skills in preparation for their forthcoming essay assessment task.













In Year 8, students are engaging with the challenges and beauty of poetry. They are examining a variety of poetic forms and styles, learning to interpret and appreciate the emotions and techniques employed by poets to convey their messages. This exploration not only enhances their writing abilities but also encourages them to express their thoughts and feelings in a creative manner.

The focus for Year 9 shifts to the timeless tragedy of *Romeo and Juliet* by William Shakespeare. Students are delving into the complexities of love, fate, and conflict. Through discussions and performances, they are gaining a deeper understanding of the characters' motivations and the societal issues presented in the play, which continue to hold relevance today.

In Year 10, students are studying *Macbeth*, another of Shakespeare's greatest tragedies. The themes of ambition, guilt, and the supernatural are central to their discussions. Students are analysing the text's language and structure, exploring how Shakespeare crafts a timeless story filled with moral dilemmas and consequences.

Year 11 students are currently engaged in Module B, focusing on the enduring war poetry of Wilfred Owen and W.B. Yeats. The Year 11 Advanced English class is being encouraged to extend their critical thinking through advanced poetry analysis. Under the guidance of Mrs. Jones and Mr. Blackwood, they are participating in combined classes that emulate a university lecture environment. This approach allows them to deeply explore the works of W.B. Yeats, thereby enhancing their critical thinking and analytical skills as they investigate the poet's themes and styles, preparing them for the challenges and rewards of Year 12.

Finally, our Year 12 students have been diligently preparing for their HSC Trials in Week 5 and 6. They have been revising their texts and refining their exam techniques, demonstrating a strong commitment to achieving their best. We extend our best wishes to them in their preparations, confident that their hard work will yield positive results. Mr. Blackwood's Extension 2 class recently concluded their final lesson, completing their Major Works reflecting extensive consideration, critical and creative thinking and editing from their wonderful teacher. These works will be submitted to the HSC marking centre on Friday 22nd August.
















SCIENCE REPORT

The Year 10 cohort "reacted" positively to their new unit on Chemistry, investigating different types of compounds and their properties. Meanwhile Year 9 are in their "element" determining the structure of atoms and making connections with the Periodic Table. The amicable astronauts in Year 7 had a blast learning about the structures in the Solar System and how they relate to Earth's seasons, and the Year 8 classes have learned about a range of Earth's natural resources and their uses by Western culture and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Our faculty would also like to thank Yabby Dabba Doo who kindly donated over 15 yabbies to support our Year 9 Marine Studies program. They are enjoying their new accommodation and the special care they are given by the students.

We would also like to make a special mention of our Year 12 Chemistry class who competed in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute Titration Competition hosted by University of Newcastle, Ourimbah Campus. They used their analytical skills to determine the concentration of unknown solutions, battling it out against Gosford High School, Tuggerah Lakes Secondary College The Entrance Campus and Mackillop College. We're looking forward to the rest of the term.




























HSIE REPORT










FRESH TERM = FRESH BOOKS & EQUIPMENT

YEAR 12 LEGAL STUDIES - SUPREME COURT EXCURSION

In Week 3 of Term 3, Year 12 Legal Studies students had the opportunity to visit the NSW Supreme Court. Our guide from Journey Walks, Max was fantastic in showing us around the Law Courts Building on Macquarie Street, and the original NSW Supreme Court Building which is still in use and celebrates its 201st year of operation in 2025. It was an incredibly busy day at the courts with the Downing Centre Court still out of action due to flooding and matters, and school groups spilling over into Macquarie Street instead. Max regaled the group with a lot of NSW's criminal legal history and touched on many influential legal matters and interesting cases of the past, including the Sydney Shark Arm Murder Case from the 1930s. The day of our visit was very interesting with the full bench of the Supreme Court handing down it's ruling on the legality of the expulsion of the Member for Kiama in the wake of his criminal convictions. We were also fortunate to witness an SC engage in a heated cross-examination of a witness in a mortgage fraud case in which over \$22 million in real estate was allegedly fraudulently offered as securities against the purchase of properties worth considerably more. A great day out for our Year 12 Legal Studies students to brush up on court operations in preparation for their upcoming examinations.







YEAR 12 SOCIETY AND CULTURE - PERSONAL INTEREST PROJECT (PIP)
























YEAR 10 COMMERCE & YEAR 11 LEGAL STUDIES - CANBERRA EXCURSION

YEAR 7 TOWN PLANNING SHOWCASE - 2025 WINNER ANNOUNCED







GENERATION TOMORROW REPORT

This term in Generation Tomorrow, our focus is on building Critical Thinking skills, an essential ability for navigating the modern world with confidence and curiosity.

Students began by exploring what critical thinking is, why it matters, and how we can apply it in our everyday lives. Students reflected on how questioning, analysing, and evaluating information helps them make better decisions both in and out of school. To put these ideas into practice, our first activity was a lively game where students tested their observation skills, trying to determine whether images were genuine human-taken photographs or Al-generated creations. This sparked rich discussions about detail, authenticity, and the challenges of detecting digital manipulation.

In our second lesson, the spotlight shifted to logical reasoning through

a paired problem-solving competition. Students tackled a set of six

challenging reasoning problems, worth different points, requiring them to use:

Pattern recognition – spotting hidden sequences or trends

Process of elimination – narrowing down possible answers by ruling out impossibilities

Understanding double negatives - interpreting tricky language to get to the truth

Working in pairs encouraged collaboration, clear communication, and strategic thinking, all key elements of critical problem-solving. The competitive twist kept engagement high, with teams striving to collect the most points while still enjoying the challenge.

We're excited to see students growing more confident in asking questions, thinking logically, and approaching problems from multiple angles. These skills will not only support their learning but also prepare them to be thoughtful, discerning members of the community.

Can you solve this problem?

Problem 1: Who Brought What?

(Worth 10 points)

Four students, Alice, Ben, Charlie, and Dana, each brought a different lunch to school: sandwich, pasta, salad, and sushi. They also drank a different juice: apple, orange, mango, and grape.

Clues:

Ben did not bring salad or drink grape juice.

The student who brought sushi drank mango juice.

Dana brought pasta.

Alice drank apple juice.

The student who drank orange juice brought sandwiches.

Charlie did not drink orange or grape juice.

Task: Figure out which lunch and which drink each student has. (Hint- using a table may help)





ABORIGINAL EDUCATION

This term has already been full of culture, connection and activity for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

We began the term by marking National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day on 4 August, a day to celebrate our children, their strengths and the role culture and community play in their lives. In Stage 5 we have launched two hands-on cultural groups that meet every Friday during P6. Our new Didge Group has been working with blank didgeridoos, students have been carefully stripping them back and preparing them for decoration. The boys will use wood-burning tools to personalise their didges with meaningful symbols and family totems, guided by staff and community knowledge. At the same time our Weaving Group is making coolamons, learning traditional weaving techniques and yarning while they work. These sessions are a calm, creative space for students to learn, practise cultural skills and strengthen their connections to Country and community.

Sporting and community experiences have also been a highlight. Year 10 students joined the Walanga Muru Oztag Gala Day at Macquarie University, a terrific chance to build teamwork, explore the campus and connect with university staff and programs that support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students.

Our students also travelled to the Buridja Cup at Erina High School, where they played multiple games, including football and basketball, and enjoyed a sausage sizzle together, a wonderful community day that brought schools together for sport and celebration.

We are proud to announce some exciting performance and recognition news: Shanti M, Zayli B, Tia S and Kenzie G will be performing at the Central Coast Showcase (Wednesday 20 August and Thursday 21 August) as part of Neville Boney and Aba Ero's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander dance ensembles. This is a terrific opportunity for our students to share culture on a larger stage, we wish them the very best and look forward to seeing them represent our school.

Finally, please join us in congratulating Valli S and Duke S for being selected to record voiceovers for the prestigious Nanga Mai Awards later this year. The Nanga Mai Awards celebrate outstanding achievement in Aboriginal education across NSW public schools and this is a lovely acknowledgement of Valli and Duke's contributions.








Wellbeing Report:

Youth Health

We have Youth Health working with Kincumber High School throughout Terms 3 and 4, allowing our students to gain extra supports within the school every fortnight.

The Youth Health team involves social workers, nursing staff and Aboriginal health staff who will work closely with the Wellbeing Team.

A few things that Youth Health can assist with:

- Sexual health: contraception and demystifying STI checks
- General health: how to access a GP or specialist healthcare
- Drugs and alcohol knowledge
- Taking care of your health: sleep, diet and exercise
- Relationships: consent


