NAIDOC 2025

Week 10, the last week of Term 2, was a busy week for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. As a tradition, we always celebrate NAIDOC Week before the official start of NAIDOC as a positive way to end the term before the official celebrations that occurred this year from 6th-13th July.

On Monday, June 30th, our Aboriginal Boys Dance Group visited Yamba Public School, where they showcased two traditional dances during the NAIDOC assembly: the Cleansing Dance and the Hunting Dance. Following the performances, our dancers hosted a workshop on creating beeswax wraps for the Stage 1 students. Beeswax wraps serve as an excellent alternative to plastic in lunchboxes and are a fitting example of a sustainable and reusable product.

The Stage 1 students chose their fabric for the wraps, and the Maclean High School students assisted by dipping the material into a hot mixture of beeswax and jojoba oil. Once cooled, they demonstrated to the Stage 1 students how to smooth out the wraps for practical use in their lunchboxes. Our dedicated Maclean High students worked diligently throughout the day, producing over 120 wraps for the Stage 1 students to take home.









NAIDOC 2025





On Tuesday, 1st July, Maclean High School had its annual NAIDOC Celebration Assembly. This was a whole school assembly with invited guests from the community. After the principal's address and the Welcome to Country, the students were treated to two dances. Several Aboriginal students were then acknowledged by the school for their ongoing contribution to the school in terms of culture and leadership in line with the NAIDOC theme, The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy.

The music group performed two songs, My Future by Billy Eilish and a cover version of Troy Cassar-Daley's River Boy sung by Antwone Quinlin Randall.

The school was then asked to participate in a quiz, testing everyone's knowledge of Aboriginal Histories and Culture on a national, state and local perspective. It was an elimination quiz; for each question, you had to put your hands on your head or your hips. Twenty questions later, the group of 700 was down to 16 competitors. It was a huge amount of fun, and congratulations to those students who won canteen vouchers. After recess, Year 7 students participated in some workshops organised by the Year 12 Aboriginal Studies class, where students were shown Aboriginal artefacts, participated in another quiz and did some art activities.



The 2025 Maclean High School EKKA Show team arrived in Brisbane on Saturday, 2nd August, for a week's competition amongst the nation's top breeders and cattle producers. The team consisted of 19 head of cattle, the youngest only seven days old, 12 students, three staff, three parents and volunteers.

The first day of competition was on Monday, 4th, with Maclean High School being one of 102 competitors competing in the School Paraders division 16-18 group. Each student was given an animal to parade in specific heats. Six students and their cattle qualified for this final. Maclean High School is coming in 6th against 25 finalists.









On Tuesday, after a very early start in the ring, our team was kitted out for team and individual judging of cattle in the School Division. Our students were required to appraise a 17-month-old Speckle Park heifer. Olivia, Lilly, and Lara formed the MHS team, with Lily serving as the spokesperson. She did an excellent job providing feedback to the crowd about the qualities and attributes they assessed in that particular heifer for its age group. The girls were awarded a highly commended for this team event.

On Wednesday, our team entered the Led Steer and Open Steer competition against some of Australia's best exhibitors. As soon as the competition finished, the steers were transported to the market. Their carcass results and data feedback provide the school with in-depth information on how to continue producing prime carcasses. The data already suggests that MHS did very well to produce the quality of carcass that we did in all weight divisions, considering all the challenges we have faced this year with higher-than-average rainfall and feeding.

On Thursday, the students were given some downtime, and Mr Kirkland led them from the showground to the Queen Street Mall via the Story Bridge boardwalk. Everyone enjoyed looking at all the shops in the Queen Street Mall, including a few Year 12 students who headed off to David Jones to try on some formal dresses.











On Friday, after an early morning downpour, the team had to look spick and span for Stud Day, which is when each stud or producer will present their cattle within the specific breed. The featured breed this year was Speckle Park, which meant that they were given the most prominent ring to parade. It also means that the students, when parading these cattle, must wear the breed uniform. MHS had some terrific results, coming second in the bull heat with Might and Power. In the class, a pair of females, MHS was awarded fourth place with Sara Lee and Lightning Lass.

In the Brahman competition, a Heifer 12 months and under 14 months, Jade was placed third, and Joelene, our heifer 16 months and under 18 months, came second.

In the Braford competition, Allure, who shot to fame last year as the reserve Champion as a calf, came second in the Heifer 12 months and under 14 months. It was also Elora's last time parading this animal, which she had led over a long period of time and had formed a very special bond with it and its mother.

A fantastic result for a team that worked very hard under trying conditions, which included unpredictable weather, logistical challenges in supplying feed and equipment between all the stalls that were in different venues in the showground, early starts and late finishes to ensure that the animals were clean and well presented as well as their stalls at all times. Congratulations to Elora, Neve, Lara, Bryson, Maya, Grace, Olivia, Ronann, Lilly, Ashley, Adelaide and Leya. Your teamwork and public relations skills with the public and in each event with other competitors and the stewards were exceptional.

A big thank you to our parent helpers and volunteers, Leigh-Ann, Shaun, Carly, Tim, Scott and Nash, for all your hard work and preparation behind the scenes to keep everyone fed and organised, including the washing and transport. A big thank you and recognition must go to Kirko and Peter Berger, who were always on hand to keep everything running smoothly and to keep encouraging the team, even when it was wet and muddy and chaotic in leading animals to and from their stalls. Thank you for all your efforts to make EKKA 2025 an unforgettable experience for our students.



Opens boys Rugby 7's team



English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D) at Maclean High School

This year marks an important and exciting step for Maclean High School. We have the greatest number of students we have ever had from overseas who have begun their journey of learning English with us. And we are delighted to have them here!

This year we have been privileged to have students from India, Thailand, Vietnam and Brazil enrolled. All these students have been actively involved in the New Arrivals Program as part of the English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EALD) subject area.

EAL/D students are given 12 months of intensive English classes, in addition to studying mainstream subjects in their regular classes. As you can imagine, they are working incredibly hard to not only learn a new language, but to try to keep up with learning in the different subject areas in their year level. By the end of their first 12 months at the school, the students 'graduate' from the New Arrivals Program and enter mainstream classes full time.

Our EAL/D students have been doing an excellent job of not only learning English as a new language, but learning much about Australia, it's culture and social etiquette. We also have fun learning about Australia's flora, fauna and foods, while having the students share much of this information about their own country of origin and culture. This proves to be a rich, multicultural exchange for the students in the EAL/D community, as well as for the entire school community.

All of our EAL/D students are to be commended for their bravery, tenacity, good humour and determination to learn English as a new language. This is especially commendable as English is the third language for some of our students! We would like to extend congratulations, especially to Anh of Year 8, who has now graduated from the New Arrivals Program. 




Maths is used in numerous aspects of daily life and various professions. Thinking mathematically is essential with problem-solving, logical reasoning, and understanding the world around us

Algebra provides a powerful tool for representing relationships between unknown quantities and solving for those unknowns.

In sports like basketball or football, understanding the trajectory of a ball is crucial. You can use algebra to figure out the necessary angle and force to make a shot or hit. In other sports, you might use algebra to calculate probabilities or optimize player positions.





In chess, you can use algebraic notation to record moves and analyse strategies.

For example, Be5 (bishop moves to e5), Nf3 (knight moves to f3).





You can use algebra to figure out the final price of an item after a discount or sale, or the amount your money will grow to when saving it in a financial institution. A=P(1+r)n



Learning algebra can improve brain function, memory, and cognitive abilities. It can encourage critical thinking and the ability to analyse information and make informed decisions. Algebra may enhance logical reasoning and problem-solving skills, which are valuable in all aspects of life.





Each week, a group of our motivated Year 9 and 10 students are taking a break from the regular classroom to pick up clippers and combs as part of the Start Your Future Barbering program. This exciting initiative is a collaboration between Maclean High, the Education Pathways Program, and TAFE North. Designed to give students a real taste of the trade, the program offers hands-on experience in barbering one day a week. From learning the basics of fading and trimming, to understanding hygiene, tool handling, and customer service, these students are getting a head start on a potential career in the hair industry. It's more than just cutting hair, it's about building confidence, gaining practical skills, and exploring career pathways in a real-world setting. For many students, it's their first opportunity to experience what working in a trade environment is really like.







Many of the students involved are now hoping to transition their new skills into our very own school barber shop program. This gives them the chance to keep building on what they've learned, offer haircuts to fellow students (and possibly staff), and continue developing their confidence and customer service abilities.

The EPP Start Your Future Barbering course is proving to be a valuable and engaging experience for students who thrive in hands-on learning. It's opening doors, sparking new interests, and showing students that there are exciting options outside of the traditional classroom.

Uni ATAR Alternate Entry

Many Year 12 students are now exploring early university entry programs—a fantastic opportunity to secure a place at university before final exams are even completed. These programs allow students to receive conditional offers based on more than just their ATAR, helping reduce pressure and provide clarity about what lies ahead.

What Do Universities Look For?

While each university has its own application process, most early entry programs consider a range of factors, including:

Year 11 academic results

School recommendation or endorsement

Personal statements that explain your interests, goals, and motivation Involvement in extracurricular activities, leadership, or community service Commitment to study and learning

These programs are a great option for students who have shown consistent effort and engagement throughout high school, even if they are not aiming for a high ATAR.

Why Apply for Early Entry?

Reduces stress – Knowing you have a place at university can ease pressure during HSC exams.

Rewards consistency – Recognises your hard work in Year 11 and across your senior studies.

Supports planning – Helps students and families make informed decisions about post-school options earlier in the year.

What Should You Do Now?

Check Sentral – A list of currently open early entry programs is available. Stay up to date with deadlines and application requirements.

Book an appointment with the Careers Adviser – They can help you identify suitable programs, guide you through the application process, and review your personal statement.

Be prepared Gather your Year 11 reports, think about what makes you a strong candidate, and start your application early.

Early entry is not just for top academic performers, it's for motivated students with clear goals and a commitment to learning. If you're in Year 12 and considering university, explore early entry options now. It could be the first step toward a smoother, more confident transition into life beyond school.



Recently, a select group of Stage 6 students from Maclean High School had the exciting opportunity to attend a special Masterclass event hosted by Southern Cross University (SCU). MHS was proud to be one of only three schools invited to take part in this exclusive program.

Throughout the day, students participated in a range of engaging, hands-on workshops across several key study areas, including Occupational Therapy, Exercise Physiology, Psychology, Midwifery, and Education. These sessions offered students a valuable insight into real-world university learning environments and career pathways.

Students also explored the SCU study model, which has been credited with improving learning outcomes for current students by offering a more flexible and supportive approach to tertiary education.

In addition to the academic workshops, students learned about various entry pathways into SCU, including Early Entry, diploma options, and the highly regarded Preparing for Success Program. These pathways are designed to make university more accessible and to support students in achieving their higher education goals.

To top it off, students were excited to discover a range of scholarship opportunities—some valued at over \$20,000—that could help them fund their studies and ease the transition into university life.

The SCU Masterclass was an inspiring and informative experience, and we thank Southern Cross University for providing our students with a glimpse into their future possibilities.


