#### **Year 12 Geography Excursion to Sydney**

On the night of September 1st, our Year 12 Geography students, accompanied by Miss Watts, embarked on a memorable journey from Grafton train station at 9pm, arriving in Sydney early the next day for a fieldwork day at the Observatory Hill Environmental Education Centre (EEC).

Despite the 20+ hours of travelling for 5 hours of fieldwork, the students demonstrated resilience and dedication. They applied a variety of geographic skills to investigate the changes in Darling Harbour and evaluated the responses and strategies to these changes. Their behaviour throughout the excursion was exemplary, and they confidently answered all questions posed by Lauren, the EEC teacher.

The train journey itself was an unexpected lesson in the human experience, featuring a range of unusual events, including a police stop searching for a missing person, a medical emergency, another police stop to escort some stowaways and even a humorously questionable moment when the group had to be relocated due to an unfortunate, odorous foot issue. Many of these 'experiences' occurring within the first three hours of departing Sydney.

The day was not only educational but also enjoyable, providing valuable insights into the topic of Rural and Urban Places. This experience has undoubtedly enriched the students' understanding and appreciation of geography beyond the classroom.



# **Year 12 Senior Study Hub**











The Senior Study Hub at Maclean High School is now open! This quiet, supervised space provides personalised academic support for senior students, focusing on assessment tasks, workload management, and HSC preparation with resources like past papers, revision guides, and practice exams. A tutoring program will start next term.

Students are encouraged to engage actively, sign in during available lessons, and follow the Study Hub guidelines to ensure a respectful and productive environment. The Hub is open from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm, with extended hours during key assessment periods. The space is exclusively for Year 12 students—welcome to the 2026 Year 12s for Term 4! The 2025 Year 12s may also use it during Term 4 if they need a quiet place to study and prepare for their HSC exams.

During Term 3 Maclean High School was lucky enough to host the Macquarie University Roadshow for Year 10. Macquarie University has launched this initiative to extend the opportunities enjoyed by city students to rural schools, enabling our students to explore and envision the diverse university career pathways available to them. There were representatives from genetics, ecology, business, aged care and sport science, a weave and yarn session, and a representative from The Incubator, which is a start-up support initiative. Each station had post-grad students and lecturers running hands-on activities and information sessions that encouraged our students to experience an aspect of the area of study and ask questions about it.

The feedback from Macquarie about our Year 10 students was overwhelmingly positive, they have sent the school a message saying "the enthusiasm, curiosity, and thoughtful engagement demonstrated by your students were truly inspiring. Their willingness to explore future study and career pathways through our interactive rotations made a lasting impression on our team."

# **Year 11 Timber Projects**



# This term, our Year 11 Industrial Technology Timber students successfully completed their Preliminary HSC major assessment task – the design and construction of a fully functioning bedside table. This project challenged students to demonstrate their practical skills, creativity, and understanding of design principles while working with a range of solid timbers and manufactured boards.

Each student began the project by developing design ideas, considering both aesthetics and functionality. From there, they refined their plans, selected appropriate materials, and applied a variety of construction techniques to bring their designs to life. The finished products displayed a wide range of personal styles, from classic and traditional forms to modern and minimalist designs.

Throughout the process, students gained valuable experience in using both hand and power tools, improving their accuracy, joinery skills, and finishing techniques. Many incorporated additional features such as drawers, decorative edges, or contrasting timber types, highlighting their growing confidence and creativity in the workshop.

The completed bedside tables are a testament to the hard work and dedication of Year 11 Timber. They should be proud of the quality and individuality of their projects, which provide an excellent foundation as they prepare to begin their HSC year.

These major works are the culmination of months of planning, design development, and dedicated workshop time. Each student is to be commended not only for the quality of their finished piece, but also for the persistence and problem-solving they demonstrated along the way.

This year's projects showcased an impressive variety of skills, creativity, and craftsmanship.

- Elora produced a striking zig-zag inlay coffee table, demonstrating precision joinery and attention to fine detail.
- Chelsea constructed a stylish and functional entertainment unit, combining modern design with practical storage solutions.
- Tully took on the challenge of crafting a hardwood serving bar, made out of paddock timber he milled himself. A large-scale piece requiring high level planning and perseverance.
- Malaki created a refined hall table, highlighting his ability to balance form and function in a sophisticated design.
- Abi Moran built a beautifully finished blanket box, showcasing both traditional woodworking skills and utilising the school laser cutter to add a personalised aesthetic design.
- Lara produced a standout whitewash serving bar, with a contemporary finish that adds character and flair.

Despite facing challenges with time, resources, and the natural hurdles that come with working in timber, all six students completed their projects ahead of the submission deadline. This is a testament to their determination, resilience, and the strong support provided within the TAS faculty.

As these students move beyond school and into the next stages of their lives, we congratulate them on their accomplishments and wish them every success for the future. Their efforts set an excellent example for younger students and highlight the high standard of practical learning at Maclean High School.



### **Year 11 Textiles**

This term, our Year 11 Textiles students have been hard at work on their Preliminary HSC assessment task, designing and constructing their own hoodie and pants. The project provided students with the opportunity to explore garment design, pattern adaptation, and advanced sewing techniques while also allowing for creativity and individuality in their finished products.

From the early stages of planning and fabric selection, through to construction and final fitting, students demonstrated strong organisation and perseverance. Many experimented with features such as pockets, embroidery, lining, and decorative finishes, tailoring their garments to reflect both personal style and functionality.

The completion of this task is a significant milestone in the Preliminary course, as it not only showcases students' practical ability but also their understanding of the design process and safe, accurate use of industrial sewing equipment. The finished hoodies and pants highlight the impressive growth in their technical skills and confidence.

## **Connecting Minds**

Last year 20 students at Maclean High were given the opportunity to participate in the Connecting Minds project run by One Giant Leap Australia. This project involves Australian schools connecting with a Japanese school to perform a research project to solve a particular problem involving humans living in space. Students needed to propose their own research question, and, with the help of experts in the field, find a solution to the problem. At the end of the project students got to present their findings at the World Expo in Osaka.

There are only ten Australian schools participating in this project, and only two of those schools are public schools. Out of all the schools we had the most teams, and our research was consistently praised by One Giant Leap Australia for being innovative and thorough. The students involved gave up a huge amount of time, working and collaborating with their partner school on weekends, holidays, lunch, recess, before school and after school. Here are our teams:

Team 1: Takoyaki Demo Quokka (Emilie, Tayla, James and Aila). Mission focus: How to maintain health in space, specifically the retention of muscular integrity.

Team 2: Space Invaders (Lucy, Lachlan, Savanah, Alice and Olivia). Mission focus: How to provide energy for sustainable housing on Mars.

Team 3: JASIT (Japanese Australian Space Initiative Team) (Bodhi, Isabella, Patsy and Alyssa). Mission focus: Methods for collecting and recycling space debris.

Team 4: Galactic Entrepreneurs (Maliyah, Evie, Makenna, Sophia and Rayson). Mission focus: How to grow plants on the Moon to create fuel for backup generators.

On Sunday 21/09/25 our students got to present the findings from their year-long research project at the Australian Pavilion at the World Expo in Osaka. Eve, our student mentor who has run the project with great skill and enthusiasm, joined two of our team members, Emilie and Alice, in Japan to represent our school in person. This was an incredibly exciting opportunity for our students, and was made possible in part due to the Iluka, Maclean and Yamba Rotaries who donated money to assist our students to get overseas. We are also extremely grateful to the Maclean High School P&C who managed the funds for us.

This was a literal once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for our students, it involved an enormous amount of time, effort and dedication. The presentations were flawless, our students spoke in front of hundreds of people both in person and online, including representatives from the Australian Space Agency. The presentations also had to be coordinated with their Japanese teammates, which was not an easy feat. Everyone talked about how fantastic our students were, and how our students overseas presented with maturity and professionalism. The importance of this achievement cannot be overstated, these students have done something that most adults would struggle to achieve. We could not be more proud of their efforts and I'm sure every one of these students will go on the achieve great things in the future!
