SCHOOL EMBLEM

Aboriginal legend tells a story of how the black swan got its black feathers and red beak. The legend represents resilience, overcoming adversity, and supporting each other to do so.

We have the black swan floating on the river. The swirling lines and circles that cross behind the swan are meeting up places and journey lines. These represent a couple of things.

There are seven meeting places that represent each year of school from kindergarten to year 6.

The shape of the journey also represents the shape of mountains to represent the Blue Mountains and the hills within Glenmore Park and Mulgoa areas.

The symbols also represent water holes, rivers and creeks that connect together as the school has many creeks nearby and the Nepean River.

Above the journey lines are a number of various sized white dots, these represent stars – students having aspirational dreams and reaching for personal excellence and learning goals.

The symbol for people surrounds the main circle in the middle. These U-shaped symbols represent all the people in our school community.
