K - 1 / 2 NEWS

Our K-2 students have been busy exploring English through a variety of text. The focus text Pearl Barley and Charlie Parsley by Aaron Blabey inspired rich learning about how authors use colour, description, and contrast to create characters and show how different personalities can work together. Students also connected this learning to sustainability by investigating how we use the Earth's resources — such as wood, water, and other natural materials — and ways to care for them wisely.

In phonics, our Kinder and Year 1 group are progressing well. They are now learning about digraphs (two letters making one sound) and Kindergarten students are beginning to write their own sentences, applying their skills in letter formation, sounding out words, and spacing their writing.





Across the grades, our STEM lessons (Mr Boomsma) have been a big highlight. Students explored what floats through hands-on experiments, tested different materials, and considered design solutions. They also engaged in exciting challenges around harnessing the wind, creating simple models to see how energy can be captured and used.

We are getting ready for our Bahzooley whole school entertainment night. You may start to hear and see some pirate singing and dancing!

How NR PSSA Zone Carnival Selection Works


CHECK IN ASSESSMENT FOR YEAR 3 - 9

Dear parents and carers,

During Term 3 students will participate in the Check-in assessment. The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online literacy and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs. Students with disability may receive the same level of support during the assessment they would normally receive in the classroom.

- The assessment will be scheduled for our students during Weeks 3 8
- All students complete a reading assessment and a numeracy assessment.
- Year 6 students will also complete a writing assessment.





This year's Science Week was a huge success, filled with curiosity, creativity and community spirit. Across the week, students and staff explored the theme, "Decoding the Universe," through hands-on activities, excursions, competitions and cultural learning experiences. Lunchtimes in the library featured Scinema screenings, while secondary students explored First Nations applications of mathematics to locate the 'Emu in the Sky' constellation formed from the dark patches of the Milky Way. Students learnt that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have used the stars for tens of thousands of years to understand time, place, and environmental change. Students were also encouraged to enter the Mission Patch Art Competition, with entries due later in August.

Damper Morning

Mr Neenan and Mr Buckley kicked off Science Week by baking traditional damper in the OLA/Ag Plot. Students enjoyed cooking damper together (topped with the school honey and some butter), reflecting on the connection between food, community and science while relaxing in the beautiful NCS grounds.











Rainbow Power Company Excursion

Both primary and secondary students visited our local Rainbow Power Company whose aim is to inspire a people-led clean energy future to reduce global emissions. Students gained a first hand insight into how renewable technologies are shaping our future. Just like their solar panels capturing sunlight to create clean energy, students left Rainbow Power Company with their own piece of a rainbow with a prism that creates a rainbow by refracting and dispersing white light. Lucky Door Prize



Dear parents, guardians and carers,

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the NCCD guidelines (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- Year of schooling
- Category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- · Level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- Formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- Consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- Develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. School Drop Off

Important reminder to all Parents, Carers and Families when dropping off and collecting students from school. **Students must not be dropped off or collected from the 'Staff' Carpark.**Parents/Carers should use the top visitor carpark, or the Cullen Street carpark.

Please reduce speed when entering Thorburn Street, Cullen Street and the school carpark. Despite presenting road safety education in the classroom, when children get out of school they are not thinking about cars. They want to have fun and their eagerness can often override their caution in traffic. The peripheral vision of a young child is a third narrower than the peripheral vision of an adult. Children are also physically smaller, so they have difficulty seeing vehicles and being seen by drivers, and are therefore more vulnerable to serious injury. Because of their size, and with the highly unpredictable nature of children, always slow down when driving around schools or risk a fine, demerit points, or worse — losing a child's life.



WATCH OUT KIDS ABOUT

Other tips to remember when driving around schools:

- Be alert when driving past a stationary bus as children often dash out in front of and from behind buses to cross the road.
- Never double park or park in 'no stopping' zones.
- When you see a School Crossing Supervisor, obey their instructions. The supervisor will step onto the road and display the STOP sign. You must STOP and wait until the pedestrians have crossed the road and the supervisor has returned to the kerb before proceeding.
- Don't park on pedestrian (zebra) crossings it is also illegal to stop or park 20 metres before, or 10 metres after a pedestrian crossing. It makes it difficult for children to cross, and for other motorists to see children.
- Don't park in no-stopping zones or use them as drop off areas. No Stopping means DO NOT STOP HERE for any reason unless obeying an official direction.
- You can drop off or pick up passengers in a 'No Parking' or a 'Stop, Drop and Go' zone as long
 as the vehicle is not left unattended and you exit the zone within two minutes. If the school
 has a passenger set down area, use it. If not, park your car on the same side of the road as the
 school so your child doesn't have to cross the road. If you have to park on the other side of the
 road, escort your child across the road. Never call the to cross the road.




