This year our NAIDOC week celebrations were an outstanding success. A whole day was devoted to an awareness and celebration of Aboriginal culture. The day included traditional dance, art, Bush Tucker, artefacts and a didgeridoo demonstration.

A great deal of gratitude must go to our Aboriginal Education Officer, Ms Karlene Rex, Ms Tess Devine, Head Teacher and coordinator of the Plumpton Aboriginal committee and its members for their organisation of the day. All events were of a very high standard and the comments from participating students were extremely positive especially with the experiences that our special guests provided.

The AFL Indigenous Academy also ran a separate day of celebration at the Blacktown GWS AFL ground for all members of the academy. This day also focused on Aboriginal culture and culminated in friendly games of AFL. This is just another example of the outstanding support that the AFL Indigenous Academy has provided for our Aboriginal students since the inception of our partnership in 2007. They currently run a number of programs within the school, including a boy's program which involves making, designing and learning to play the didgeridoo. Aboriginal students who are graduating year 12 this year have been measured up for business attire and are invited to the Deadly Awards at the Sydney Opera House.



Science and Maths Exposed

Approximately fifty students from Plumpton High School attended the Parramatta campus of the University of Western Sydney to enjoy a day organised by the Lachlan Macquarie College which focused on mathematics and science. We were very fortunate to secure a place amongst the 800 other students from all schools in the Western and South Western Regions. I was told there was a waiting list of over 400 students.

The program was opened by the NSW chief Scientist, Professor Mary O'Kane, followed by a multimedia presentation by Lachlan Macquarie College, an interactive session by the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO), various displays, and a chance to experience the campus of the university and network with other students.

INFORMATION FOR SCHOOL COMMUNITIES ABOUT MEASLES

Sydney is currently experiencing an outbreak of measles which began in April 2012 and is centred in the South Western Sydney and Western Sydney regions. Many of the cases have been high school students, with a smaller number in primary school. There is potential for the measles outbreak to spread further given young people have large social networks both within and outside of school.

NSW Health advises that measles is a serious viral illness that mainly affects unvaccinated children, teenagers, young adults, and babies too young to be vaccinated. Measles is highly infectious and can easily spread through the air.

Immunisation is effective in preventing the disease. In Australia, infants and young children are vaccinated with measles-mumps-rubella vaccine at 12 months and 4 years of age.

People who are at risk of measles include:

- ◇ Infants <12 months who are too young to have been routinely vaccinated
- ◇ Older children who have not received 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine
- ◇ Adults born during or after 1966 who have not received 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine and haven't had measles infection in the past.

Immunising older siblings and non-immune adults will help prevent the spread of infection to infants who are too young to be vaccinated and who are at risk of severe disease.

The first sign of measles is a high fever which usually begins about 10 to 12 days after exposure to a person with measles (range 7-18 days). A runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and small white spots inside the cheeks can develop in the initial stage. The rash appears around 14 days after exposure, usually starting on the face and upper neck and spreading over the body, hands and feet. The rash lasts for 4-7 days.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

People with measles are usually infectious from just before the symptoms begin until four days after the rash appears. If you have had contact with someone who has had measles and develop **a fever, runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes**, it may be measles and seek medical advice.

If you suspect measles, see your doctor, clinic or hospital. It is important to **ring before your consultation** so you can be seen as soon as possible and arrangements can be made to avoid contact with other patients in the waiting room who may be susceptible to measles.

A person with measles should remain at home until four days after the rash appears to reduce the possibility of spreading it to other people.

Student Assistance & "The Schoolkids Bonus"

The Student Assistance Scheme is a fund which has been made available to schools in NSW in varying amounts by the Department of Education to assist students whose families are legitimately expressing financial hardship with various costs of schooling.

However, **FUNDS ARE LIMITED** and each application is considered on merit. It also must be noted that General School Fees are NOT covered by the Student Assistance Scheme.

With this in mind, it is an opportune time to recognise the recent Federal Government announcement that Australian families with children at school will get a new cash payment to help with educational costs. It was announced that this payment will start to roll out in June.

Each year, families will receive a new Schoolkids Bonus worth:

- ◇ \$410 for each child in primary school
- ◇ \$820 for each child in high school.

This new guaranteed payment will help the families pay for uniforms, books, school excursions and stationery.

Because the payment is automatic and upfront, it means:

- ◇ Parents don't need to keep receipts for months and months – it's a guaranteed payment.
- ◇ Parents will receive the full amount every time, so families won't miss out if they lose receipts.
- ◇ Parents don't have to pay out of their own pocket, and then wait months to get paid back - the payment will be paid up front, twice a year, before the start of Term 1 and Term 3.

No paperwork is required.

May I also remind you that participation in elective practical lessons is limited to those that have paid relevant fees as these fees cover the cost of materials and resources required. Furthermore, wearing incorrect footwear to practical lessons in workshops and Science labs is against Occupational Health & Safety regulations, meaning that those students are also excluded from important practical lessons.

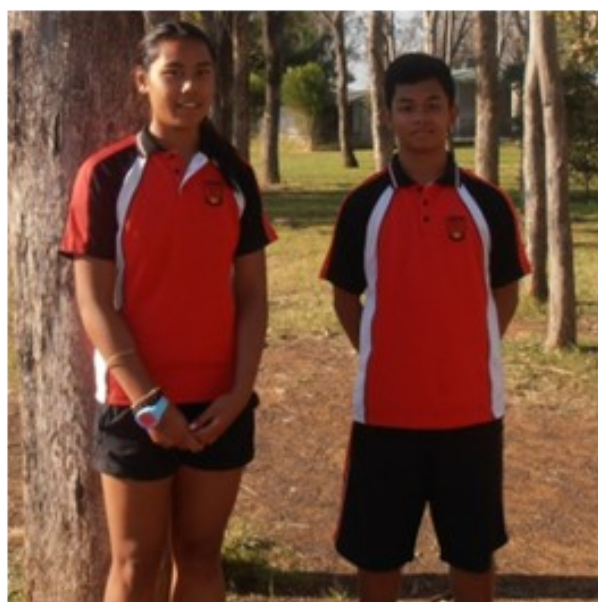

PLUMPTON HIGH SCHOOL GUIDING PRINCIPLES FOR THE USE OF MOBILE PHONES AND MP3 PLAYERS

General principles

At Plumpton High School, while the increasing use and importance of mobile phones in our lives is recognised, processes have been well established over a long period of time to assist parents and caregivers to deliver messages to their children, which are of an urgent or important nature, without the need for students to have a mobile phone. **For parents who need to contact their child during class time, a call to the office is appropriate and always welcomed. Messages are delivered to students in a prompt manner.** A pay phone is available in the office foyer for use during lunch breaks if required. Students are also able to use office phones in the event of an emergency.

In general, mobile phones are not necessary for communication to and from students during school hours and we ask that this is respected by all. At times before and after school, however, mobile phones offer students and their parents many advantages in terms of ease of communication and a sense of personal safety. For this reason, the school respects the need for students to carry mobile phones, provided students observe the following conditions and courtesies.

Mobile phones and MP3s should not be used during class time for making or receiving calls, sending or receiving text messages, taking photographs or videos, recording conversations, to listen to music or any other unauthorised purpose. Mobile phones and MP3s may be used at lunchtimes, provided such use is appropriate.

At times, teachers may instruct or allow students to use mobile phones or MP3s for specific educational purposes, such as recording an experiment, using music in a dance composition or using an app specific to a subject. At these times students may use their phones but **only when instructed to by their teacher.**

As with all valuable items, students are strongly discouraged from bringing mobile phones and MP3 players to school due to the potential for loss, theft or damage of the item. Plumpton High School accepts no responsibility for the loss, theft or damage to such items including mobile phones.

Should a student have a mobile phone or MP3 at school it must be turned off or placed on silent during lessons and other school activities. It also must be kept securely in the student's bag and not taken out during lessons or other school activities. This will ensure that there is no disruption to the school's learning environment.

Students must not have any material stored on their mobile phones or MP3s which is offensive, harmful or illegal. It is an offence to have images of illegal acts, such as fights, to have pornographic images, to bully or intimidate others through the use of mobile phones or to record people without their consent, on these devices. In such cases the school is required to confiscate mobile phones and refer the matter to police.

Any student who brings a mobile phone or MP3 to school will be responsible for ensuring the above conditions and courtesies are observed. Incidents involving students failing to respect these conditions will be treated in accordance with the Plumpton High School Discipline Policy. The consequences for such cases are shown on page 2 of this policy. Students should remember the school's important expectations which apply to all school members:

Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be A Learner

Consequences for Unacceptable Use of Mobile Phones and MP3 players

Following are the consequences which apply to the inappropriate use of mobile phones and MP3s, as is consistent with the school's discipline policy.

Unacceptable Use	Consequence
A student who has a mobile phone or MP3 out during a lesson or other school activity.	The student will be reminded to put the phone in their bag immediately.
A student who has a phone in their bag which rings or beeps during a lesson or other school activity.	The student will be reminded to turn the phone off or to silent immediately.
A student who uses a mobile phone or MP3 without specific permission or for an unauthorised purpose during a lesson or other school activities.	The device will be confiscated immediately by a teacher. This will be recorded in the school's mobile phone register. The device will be returned to the student at the end of the school day.
A student who repeatedly has their phone or MP3 out during lessons or other school activities, or fails to have their phone turned off or on silent.	The student will be placed on after-school detention or will be required to complete after-school community service .
A student who does not follow the direction or instruction of a teacher in relation to the inappropriate use of a mobile phone or MP3.	This is a serious offence. The student will be referred to the head teacher who will record the incident on the school's behaviour referral system. The student will be placed on after-school detention in the first instance . This will be much more severe in the case of repeat offenders.
A student who repeatedly uses a mobile phone or MP3 during lessons or other school activity. This will be apparent in the school's mobile phone register.	The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone or MP3 to school. The student will be required to complete after-school community service.
A student who uses a mobile phone or other device to record an illegal act, to bully or harass another school member, or to record people without their consent.	The device will be confiscated immediately and may be referred to police. The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone to school. The student will be suspended.
A student who has a device containing material which is offensive, illegal or pornographic.	The device will be confiscated immediately and may be referred to police. The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone to school. The student will be suspended.

This policy has been initiated by the Student Representative Council and has been endorsed by the staff of Plumpton High School in August 2008. Updated June 2012

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents



Did you know that if a student misses as little as eight days in a school term, by the end of primary school they will have missed over a year of education?

The compulsory years of schooling

In New South Wales, all children from six years of age are legally required to attend school or be registered for home schooling. After they complete Year 10 and until they turn 17 years of age, students then have the following options. They may also be in:

- full-time further education and training (e.g. TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship);
- full-time, paid employment of an average of 25 hours per week; or
- a combination of both of the above.

Children are expected to attend all school activities, on time. Regular attendance helps your child:

- develop the skills needed to access the world of work and other opportunities
- to learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- make and keep friendships.

What if my child has to be away from school?

If your child has to be absent from school, you must tell the school and provide a reason for your child's absence. To explain an absence parents and carers may be required to:

- send a note to the school, or contact the school via electronic means such as SMS text message, fax or email, or
- telephone the school, or
- visit the school.

A small number of absences may be accepted by the principal. For example, if your child:

- has to go to a special religious ceremony
- is required to attend a serious or urgent family situation (e.g. a funeral)
- is too sick to go to school or has an infectious illness.

ATTENDANCE

What are school Principals responsible for?

Principals help to ensure the safety, welfare and wellbeing of your child. Principals have to keep accurate records of student attendance and the reasons for any absences. Principals are responsible for accepting or not accepting a parent's explanations for their child's absences. Principals may request further information from parents for long or frequent absences, even where they are explained by parents as being due to illness.

When absences are unexplained by parents, or the explanations are not accepted by the principal, the school will work with parents to help address the issue. The main aim is to sort out what is preventing the child from getting to school and putting strategies in place to help. Sometimes, the school will ask support staff and other agencies to assist.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department may take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unacceptable absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken.

- Attendance meetings and compulsory attendance conferences

Parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a meeting with school personnel and other regional officers. The aim of the meeting is to help identify strategies to support the child and family. Other agencies may also be invited along to help, if parents agree.

If the school and other regional officers have tried to help improve a child's attendance, without success, parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a compulsory attendance conference. The conference will be run by a trained conference convenor. The aim of the conference is for the school, parents (and sometimes their child) and other identified agencies ("the parties") to further identify the issues which are impacting on a child's attendance.

The outcome of a compulsory attendance conference is for the parties to agree to undertake certain actions to improve the child's attendance. These actions are written in the form of undertakings.

- Applications to the Children's Court – A Compulsory Schooling Order

Legal compliance can be sought through an application to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The aim is to assist a family and/or child to address the issues which are preventing satisfactory school attendance but has the added enforcement of a Court's powers.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

If all attempts by schools and regional support staff fail to improve a student's attendance, action can be taken in the Local Court and the result can be fines up to a maximum of \$11,000.

Do you need an interpreter?

Interpreting services are provided, where possible, for parents/carers who do not speak or understand English well and for Deaf parents/carers who use sign language. Mythbusters

This has been an extremely successful course which has further helped these students' skills and confidence in the Industrial Arts classes.



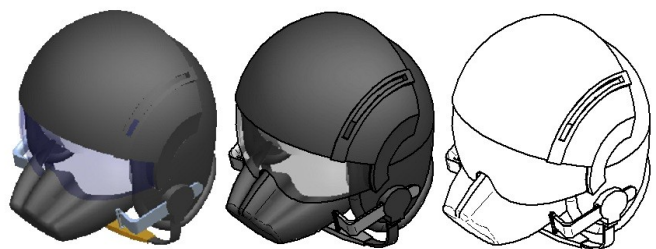
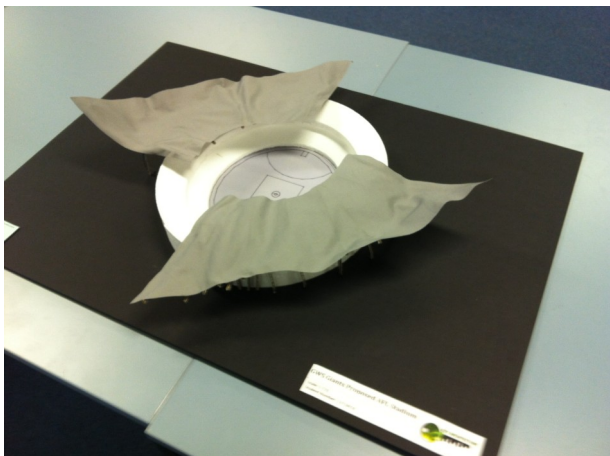

In 2012 8 students have been busy at work completing their Major projects for Industrial Technology Graphics. These major projects range from the product design of a Fighter pilots helmet (Edward Gomez), a new Polaroid digital camera (Joshua Gonzalez), new sports car designs (Shirazz Ali and Abdul Dubloo), a device for holding an Apple iPhone on a bike (Naethiel Lumbea). Additionally Dean Wright designed a new stadium for the GWS AFL team and Jono Tumbaga created a Japanese inspired house. All students had to use CAD programs to design and present their ideas to the HSC markers; some even produced models using high tech CNC process, like those in the manufacturing industry. On the whole the projects demonstrated the student's keen sense of design and use of CAD programs like Google SketchUp, Pro Engineer, Solid Edge and Adobe Photoshop.

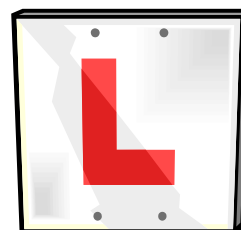
