Principal's Report

On behalf of the entire Plumpton high school community I congratulate the year 12 cohort of 2012 on their extraordinary contributions to the school over the last six years and sincerely wish you all the very best in each and every one of your future endeavours.

We are all very proud of you, especially your year advisers Mr Sharma and Ms Prasad.

The Beacon partnership is an invaluable program that provides outstanding experiences for our year 10 students.

Ms Hayley Tanti, together with the assistance of Ms Athina Pendespi have done an amazing job coordinating the program at school level. Through their efforts we were acknowledged as the best new Beacon school at the National Awards last year and the best overall school at the NSW awards this year.

One of the most significant events in the program is the *Charter Signing*. This event symbolises a pledge for all students to pursue a pathway that will consist of further study or employment.

This year's Charter signing was an extraordinary success with approximately 250 parents and family and a large number of business and political partners whom were all present to support our year 10 students with their pledge.

Empowering Local Schools (ELS) National Partnerships

As of 2015 all schools in NSW will be required to operate under the new NSW Department of Education and Communities school management model. It is envisaged that this model will give greater flexibility in the areas of finance and staffing. This will enable schools to be more effective in meeting the needs of their school communities. Although there will be greater staffing flexibility there will still be a number of industrial agreements in place that will ensure that certain staffing structures are maintained.

Plumpton High School is one of the 229 ELS pilot schools which will trial the process prior to the state wide roll out. As a pilot school we will enjoy a high degree of support in our transition and we will be among the first to benefit from this new degree of flexibility.

Staff have been undergoing extensive training in budgeting and finance so that we will be equipped with the necessary skills to manage our Resource Allocation funding in 2013. To support the Local decision making process the school has been given a Federal Grant of \$50 000

The Year 8 online ESSA examination and Years 7 to 10 Yearly Examinations have just been completed and staff are currently very busy marking and preparing for reports. Many of our staff have commented on the commitment that students have displayed throughout all of the examinations and hopefully this will be reflected in their results.


It is an extremely busy time of year for our staff as many are involved in the marking of HSC papers, which involves a significant number of after-hours commitment that extends late into evenings and on weekends. We are very fortunate to have such a significant number of HSC markers at our school because this provides invaluable insight to the HSC marking requirements and the standards that are displayed by students across NSW.

The AFL Indigenous Academy has been a highly valued partner to the school over the last 6 years. To celebrate the year 12 graduation of their first intake of students the academy purchased suits for all of the year 12 students in the academy schools of Rooty Hill, Doonside and Plumpton High Schools. They were also given special invitations to the *Deadly Awards* at the Sydney Opera House where Dean Wright was chosen to be interviewed by SBS on the night.

The Academy is currently conducting Aboriginal art classes. The students are taught all of the intricate techniques by renowned aboriginal artist Daren

Other than students from the host school we were the only other school invited to this prestigious function. The F1 in Schools Technology Challenge is the world's largest secondary school technology program. It involves over nine million students from 17,000 schools in 31 nations.

Each year the program engages more than 40,000 high school students in Australia

This year our school entered the challenge for the very first time. Four year 10 students and one student from year 9: Adeel Shams, Alvin Kumar, Muneeb Zahid, Samarth Gorwardia and Cameron Huf-Watt entered as the Phoenix 5 race team. The challenge involves a high degree of technical ability in research, design, construction and testing, extensive portfolio development - the building of community partners and a strong understanding by all of the boys in every aspect of the project's development and of course racing the car that they have constructed.

Their commitment, passion and enthusiasm have been absolutely astonishing. They not only won the regional championship they then qualified for the state titles and have now qualified for the National championships which will be held in Geelong at the beginning of next year.

Congratulations are also in order for Mr Chris Holmes and Mr Stuart Thomson who have devoted countless hours guiding the boys through this process.

Another event that Plumpton High School has gained a formidable reputation is the **BRING IT ON** dance competition. We first entered the competition three years ago and were placed third in the Sydney finals. Last year we were finalists once again. At this year's Sydney finals our students were virtually faultless in their presentation and certainly rose to the occasion in front of an amazing audience (in excess of 2000 people) at the Hillsong Convention Centre at Bella Vista. They achieved their best result ever and were placed second overall. This team of over 30 students has put in a tremendous amount of time and effort throughout the last three months and thoroughly deserve this result. Special thanks must also go to Ms Shukla who coordinated the whole process and all of the staff who volunteered their time to supervise during lunch times and after school.

During the last October holidays

- ◊ The **GWS Performing Arts Centre** had further modifications. It was fitted with high quality stage lighting, extra stage audio inputs and with a combination of split and ducted air conditioning. This was made possible by the remaining funds that were left within the initial building grant.
- ◊ A number of trees had to be cut down due to Work Place and Safety issues. Our Grey Box Eucalypts have been decimated by insects known as lace lerp psyllids. A number of trees were dead and branches had been falling in student recreation areas. We are hoping that the remaining trees will recover. These psyllids have had a devastating effect on the Grey Box Eucalypts throughout the entire Cumberland plain forest area.
- ◊ The school cricket nets were refurbished with new wired mesh sides and the deteriorating treated pine safety railing around some of the school garden area was replaced with new galvanised piped fencing.
- ◊ A new 23 seat bus was delivered to the school. The bus is the result of a partnership with Sunshine Coaches and was negotiated through the Variety Club. It has wheel chair capability and will be used for excursions, PEC initiatives such as numeracy, literacy, science and sport mentoring at our feeder primary schools and grade sporting teams. It will be housed in a new garage that was completed at the end of last term. Currently there are a number of staff who are acquiring the appropriate licence so they will be able to drive the bus. This is going to make an enormous difference to the flexibility and efficiency of programs that we are able to offer the students of our school and our PEC primary schools. There will be an official handover in the not too distant future. This will be reported in the next newsletter.



In conclusion as the term draws to an end I would like to wish everyone a safe and restful holiday.

Remember that there is a very close relationship between high attendance and student success. To encourage students to set high standards for attendance, 3 awards will again be presented at Presentation Day & Graduations in 2012: the Gold, Silver & Bronze Attendance Awards.

Gold Award – 100% attendance (zero days absent)

Silver Award – 99% attendance (1-2 days absent)

Bronze Award – 98% attendance (3-4 days absent)

Note: students may be deemed ineligible for these awards if they are regularly late to school.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents



Did you know that if a student misses as little as eight days in a school term, by the end of primary school they will have missed over a year of education?

The compulsory years of schooling

In New South Wales, all children from six years of age are legally required to attend school or be registered for home schooling. After they complete Year 10 and until they turn 17 years of age, students then have the following options. They may also be in:

- full-time further education and training (e.g. TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship);
- full-time, paid employment of an average of 25 hours per week; or
- a combination of both of the above.

Children are expected to attend all school activities, on time. Regular attendance helps your child:

- develop the skills needed to access the world of work and other opportunities
- to learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- make and keep friendships.

What if my child has to be away from school?

If your child has to be absent from school, you must tell the school and provide a reason for your child's absence. To explain an absence parents and carers may be required to:

- send a note to the school, or contact the school via electronic means such as SMS text message, fax or email, or
- telephone the school, or
- visit the school.

A small number of absences may be accepted by the principal. For example, if your child:

- has to go to a special religious ceremony
- is required to attend a serious or urgent family situation (e.g. a funeral)
- is too sick to go to school or has an infectious illness.

ATTENDANCE

What are school Principals responsible for?

Principals help to ensure the safety, welfare and wellbeing of your child. Principals have to keep accurate records of student attendance and the reasons for any absences. Principals are responsible for accepting or not accepting a parent's explanations for their child's absences. Principals may request further information from parents for long or frequent absences, even where they are explained by parents as being due to illness.

When absences are unexplained by parents, or the explanations are not accepted by the principal, the school will work with parents to help address the issue. The main aim is to sort out what is preventing the child from getting to school and putting strategies in place to help. Sometimes, the school will ask support staff and other agencies to assist.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department may take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unacceptable absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken.

- Attendance meetings and compulsory attendance conferences

Parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a meeting with school personnel and other regional officers. The aim of the meeting is to help identify strategies to support the child and family. Other agencies may also be invited along to help, if parents agree.

If the school and other regional officers have tried to help improve a child's attendance, without success, parents (and sometimes their child) can be asked to go to a compulsory attendance conference. The conference will be run by a trained conference convenor. The aim of the conference is for the school, parents (and sometimes their child) and other identified agencies ("the parties") to further identify the issues which are impacting on a child's attendance.

The outcome of a compulsory attendance conference is for the parties to agree to undertake certain actions to improve the child's attendance. These actions are written in the form of undertakings.

- Applications to the Children's Court – A Compulsory Schooling Order

Legal compliance can be sought through an application to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The aim is to assist a family and/or child to address the issues which are preventing satisfactory school attendance but has the added enforcement of a Court's powers.

- Prosecution in the Local Court

If all attempts by schools and regional support staff fail to improve a student's attendance, action can be taken in the Local Court and the result can be fines up to a maximum of \$11,000.

PLUMPTON HIGH SCHOOL GUIDING PRINCIPLES FOR THE USE OF MOBILE PHONES AND MP3 PLAYERS

General principles

At Plumpton High School, while the increasing use and importance of mobile phones in our lives is recognised, processes have been well established over a long period of time to assist parents and caregivers to deliver messages to their children, which are of an urgent or important nature, without the need for students to have a mobile phone. **For parents who need to contact their child during class time, a call to the office is appropriate and always welcomed. Messages are delivered to students in a prompt manner.** A pay phone is available in the office foyer for use during lunch breaks if required. Students are also able to use office phones in the event of an emergency.

In general, mobile phones are not necessary for communication to and from students during school hours and we ask that this is respected by all. At times before and after school, however, mobile phones offer students and their parents many advantages in terms of ease of communication and a sense of personal safety. For this reason, the school respects the need for students to carry mobile phones, provided students observe the following conditions and courtesies.

Mobile phones and MP3s should not be used during class time for making or receiving calls, sending or receiving text messages, taking photographs or videos, recording conversations, to listen to music or any other unauthorised purpose. Mobile phones and MP3s may be used at lunchtimes, provided such use is appropriate.

At times, teachers may instruct or allow students to use mobile phones or MP3s for specific educational purposes, such as recording an experiment, using music in a dance composition or using an app specific to a subject. At these times students may use their phones but **only when instructed to by their teacher.**

As with all valuable items, students are strongly discouraged from bringing mobile phones and MP3 players to school due to the potential for loss, theft or damage of the item. Plumpton High School accepts no responsibility for the loss, theft or damage to such items including mobile phones.

Should a student have a mobile phone or MP3 at school it must be turned off or placed on silent during lessons and other school activities. It also must be kept securely in the student's bag and not taken out during lessons or other school activities. This will ensure that there is no disruption to the school's learning environment.

Students must not have any material stored on their mobile phones or MP3s which is offensive, harmful or illegal. It is an offence to have images of illegal acts, such as fights, to have pornographic images, to bully or intimidate others through the use of mobile phones or to record people without their consent, on these devices. In such cases the school is required to confiscate mobile phones and refer the matter to police.

Any student who brings a mobile phone or MP3 to school will be responsible for ensuring the above conditions and courtesies are observed. Incidents involving students failing to respect these conditions will be treated in accordance with the Plumpton High School Discipline Policy. The consequences for such cases are shown on page 2 of this policy. Students should remember the school's important expectations which apply to all school members:

Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be A Learner

Consequences for Unacceptable Use of Mobile Phones and MP3 players

Following are the consequences which apply to the inappropriate use of mobile phones and MP3s, as is consistent with the school's discipline policy.

Unacceptable Use	Consequence
A student who has a mobile phone or MP3 out during a lesson or other school activity.	The student will be reminded to put the phone in their bag immediately.
A student who has a phone in their bag which rings or beeps during a lesson or other school activity.	The student will be reminded to turn the phone off or to silent immediately.
A student who uses a mobile phone or MP3 without specific permission or for an unauthorised purpose during a lesson or other school activities.	The device will be confiscated immediately by a teacher. This will be recorded in the school's mobile phone register. The device will be returned to the student at the end of the school day.
A student who repeatedly has their phone or MP3 out during lessons or other school activities, or fails to have their phone turned off or on silent.	The student will be placed on after-school detention or will be required to complete after-school community service .
A student who does not follow the direction or instruction of a teacher in relation to the inappropriate use of a mobile phone or MP3.	This is a serious offence. The student will be referred to the head teacher who will record the incident on the school's behaviour referral system. The student will be placed on after-school detention in the first instance . This will be much more severe in the case of repeat offenders.
A student who repeatedly uses a mobile phone or MP3 during lessons or other school activity. This will be apparent in the school's mobile phone register.	The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone or MP3 to school. The student will be required to complete after-school community service.
A student who uses a mobile phone or other device to record an illegal act, to bully or harass another school member, or to record people without their consent.	The device will be confiscated immediately and may be referred to police. The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone to school. The student will be suspended.
A student who has a device containing material which is offensive, illegal or pornographic.	The device will be confiscated immediately and may be referred to police. The student's parents will be contacted and the student will forfeit their right to bring the mobile phone to school. The student will be suspended.

This policy has been initiated by the Student Representative Council and has been endorsed by the staff of Plumpton High School in August 2008. Updated June 2012

ENGLISH

"SOMETHING IS ROTTEN IN THE STATE OF... *PENRITH*!"

Hamlet's tale of revenge is one of the best known plays in the English language. Murder and intrigue are tearing apart Hamlet's ruling family, and something must be done to restore order but how is truth and inner peace to be found by the undergraduate prince, in this morally grey world of Elsinore?

On Friday, 16th November, Ms McPherson and 18 Shakespeare lovers ventured to the Joan Sutherland Centre in Penrith to see the latest production of *Hamlet*. It was a great opportunity for Advanced English students to see and experience the play that they will be studying in Term 3, 2013 and which they will be required to write essays on in their upcoming HSC.



The Emu Heights Productions performance was set in a modern context and drew on elements of Film Noir and the demise of the Weimar Republic in order to heighten the play's dark and foreboding atmosphere. In the Q & A session after the performance, director Ian Zammit highlighted that in essence, *Hamlet* is a story of murder, corruption and a King being brought to justice and thus, felt that the gritty, shadowy underworld of the 1920s was the perfect backdrop for capturing the core themes of the play.

A highlight of the performance was the ethereal and truly spooky ghost of the King moving between audience members whilst the tortured Hamlet peered through the city smog and shadows to see his



father once more. A chilling performance was also given by Louise Lamella who played Ophelia. From her introduction as playful, naive sister to Laertes, playing with his sword while she thinks no one is watching, to her alcohol-fuelled descent into madness, Ophelia's performance was vivid and heart-wrenching. Students were enraged by the loose morals and seeming unconcern of Hamlet's mother, Gertrude, and appalled by her abusive and deeply disturbed husband, King Claudius.

During the Q & A session, students **Jillian Zarate** and **Madison Pizzilli** queried the cast and crew on the set design, staging, rehearsals and contextual research that was involved in putting such a production together while other students enjoyed their first ever visit to the theatre.

All in all, students thoroughly enjoyed the experience and will be able to draw invaluable insight from this production in order to inform their own interpretation of the play. If you have the opportunity, I sincerely suggest getting out to see Ian Zammit's *Hamlet*. It is a creative masterpiece that will chill you to the core.


HISTORY


Annual Sheep Shearing Demonstration






PEC Literacy Day was *Definitely* a Huge Success!

On Tuesday, 30th October Plumpton High School hosted the inaugural Plumpton Education Community Literacy Day.

The day involved 36 students from the high school and two local primary schools, William Dean Primary School and Plumpton Public School. The students acted as secret agents as they worked together in completing their mission.

The students' mission on the day was to explore the mysteries of persuasive writing and begin to write their own persuasive paragraphs that are designed to bring about change in their community.



The day was in response to a survey conducted by the PEC Student Well-Being Team that found students, their families and community members were concerned about the amount of littering and rubbish in playgrounds and in the community in general.

Students visited several 'Immersion Centres' in the morning. At each centre they investigated the clues for persuasive writing and recorded their learning in their Detective's Handbook. By the conclusion of the immersion centres students had a solid knowledge and understanding of:


- the structure of a paragraph
- the TAP Dance metaphor for exploring a text type, audience and purpose
- the persuasive techniques they could use, including rhetorical questions, using opinions as fact, appealing to emotions, high modality and using statistics.



After lunch, students explored the 'ingredients' of high quality paragraphs by reading and comparing two samples. They then spent time planning and organising their own persuasive paragraphs to satisfy their mission statement.

Students from Year 1 through to Year 8 were involved in the process, where the older students acted as mentors and helpers for the younger students in the learning journey.

The day was structured according to the principles of International Educator, Lane Clark, through an 'Inquiry' learning model. Essentially this meant students were responsible for recording and internalising their learning throughout the day, and all activities were self paced and self directed.




LIBRARY

INFORMATION FOR SCHOOL COMMUNITIES ABOUT MEASLES

Sydney is currently experiencing an outbreak of measles which began in April 2012 and is centred in the South Western Sydney and Western Sydney regions. Many of the cases have been high school students, with a smaller number in primary school. There is potential for the measles outbreak to spread further given young people have large social networks both within and outside of school.

NSW Health advises that measles is a serious viral illness that mainly affects unvaccinated children, teenagers, young adults, and babies too young to be vaccinated. Measles is highly infectious and can easily spread through the air.

Immunisation is effective in preventing the disease. In Australia, infants and young children are vaccinated with measles-mumps-rubella vaccine at 12 months and 4 years of age.

People who are at risk of measles include:

- ◊ Infants <12 months who are too young to have been routinely vaccinated
- ◊ Older children who have not received 2 doses of measles-containing vaccine
- ◊ Adults born during or after 1966 who have not received 2 doses of measles- containing vaccine and haven't had measles infection in the past.

Immunising older siblings and non-immune adults will help prevent the spread of infection to infants who are too young to be vaccinated and who are at risk of severe disease.

The first sign of measles is a high fever which usually begins about 10 to 12 days after exposure to a person with measles (range 7-18 days). A runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes (conjunctivitis), and small white spots inside the cheeks can develop in the initial stage. The rash appears around 14 days after exposure, usually starting on the face and upper neck and spreading over the body, hands and feet. The rash lasts for 4-7 days.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

People with measles are usually infectious from just before the symptoms begin until four days after the rash appears. If you have had contact with someone who has had measles and develop a fever, runny nose, cough, red and watery eyes, it may be measles and seek medical advice.

If you suspect measles, see your doctor, clinic or hospital. It is important to ring before your consultation so you can be seen as soon as possible and arrangements can be made to avoid contact with other patients in the waiting room who may be susceptible to measles.

A person with measles should remain at home until four days after the rash appears to reduce the possibility of spreading it to other people.




