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### **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

### THE COLLEGIATE CERTIFICATE - DOES IT MATTER?

Parents would be aware that the School Certificate is no more. It has been replaced with the R.O.S.A. which students will receive if they exit the school system before their HSC. You would also be aware that our Year 10 students will sit for their Collegiate exams in Week 5 (when past students sat for their School Certificate).

As an educator and school leader I try to engage students in their work and emphasise both the value of the R.O.S.A. and the Collegiate exams and the consequences of not performing sufficiently well at school. It is HUGELY annoying therefore, when I am told by a student that "it doesn't matter" especially when they say that they were told this by their parents.

- Until students attain their HSC, the R.O.S.A. is the highest qualification they possess. An interesting statistic: of the approximately 250 Quakers students who leave after Year 10, just 150 sit for their HSC at Wyndham College. So for over 100 of our ex-students, the R.O.S.A. is an extremely important document.
- 2. When students start in Year 11 (wherever that may be), their grades will more than likely determine who gets into classes. If 30 students want to get into a course of 20 vacancies the same students may not get their first choice. The Collegiate exams provide this important information to whichever senior school our Year 10s go to.
- 3. More importantly, a good attitude towards study is not a skill that can be switched on and off at will. Future success, whether at TAFE, HSC, university, apprenticeship or career, is more assured the earlier students develop that academic maturity. Leaving Year 10 with a slack attitude is a difficult habit to break.

### **END-OF-YEAR-10-EXAMS: TIME TO GET FAIR DINKUM**

Some students have worked hard since their Stage 5 studies commenced in Year 9. Some started getting serious in Year 10. Some still have not started. Either way, NOW is the time when the gaps in students' skills and knowledge can be filled. NOW is the time when revision is crucial so any disruption to learning NOW will be regarded even more seriously than usual. Encourage your child to be aware of and take advantage of revision sessions provided by staff. As just one example, I started evening science revision sessions this Monday from 6 to 9 pm and will continue these each Monday night until the exams in Week 5.

### **AEROSOL DEODORANTS**

An old concern that has reared its ugly head again. Aerosol sprays are banned at this school and yet many students still bring them to school.

Why do students so blatantly break school rules designed to protect them?

Why do students not think about how their actions can affect others?

I remember a previous occasion at our school when a student decided that it would be really smart to spray deodorant in the classroom. Such a pity that a friend in that class had severe asthma and required an ambulance. Imagine how YOU would feel if all of a sudden, in the safety of your classroom you couldn't breathe! How would YOU feel if that was YOUR friend in that ambulance? How would YOU feel if it was YOUR aerosol that put them in that ambulance?

As I say to students on assembly: "Look around you. Is that an asthma sufferer sitting next to you? You don't know. But I guarantee you that in every class you go to; every time you are in the change room after PE or sport there are at least THREE students whose health you could damage by using aerosol sprays."

Why do students not think about how their actions can affect others?

I challenge students to prove that they care about others by bringing to school a stick or roll-on deodorant.

### **ESSAonline 2012**

Dear Parent or Carer

The Essential Secondary Science Assessment (ESSA) test for Year 8 students will be held on **Tuesday 13 November 2012**. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSAonline.

ESSAonline contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including a simulated investigation. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW *Science Years 7–10 Syllabus*. Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values.

Since students complete ESSAonline on a computer, they will not need writing materials. However, each student needs to bring **headphones or ear buds** that plug into a school computer. Ear buds for an iPod or portable player are suitable. If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2013. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test. You will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning. The principal of your child's school is able to provide you with more details about the ESSA program if you require additional information.

### Supporting Students through the Learning and Support Team

### 1. The Role of the Learning and Support Team

Students at Quakers Hill High School achieve maximum outcomes when they are able to work in a caring, secure and supportive environment. The whole school community works together to provide quality educational programs and to meet the personal, social and learning needs of all students. Our Learning and Support Team is a group that meets regularly to discuss specific strategies to assist students requiring additional support in areas of learning and behaviour. The Learning and Support Team coordinates the development, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of learning support plans.

### 2. Process of Referral to the Learning and Support Team

Students requiring additional support at school may be identified by teachers and/or parents. Through teacher and parent consultation these students may be referred to the school's Learning and Support Team. The Learning and Support Team then discusses the most appropriate form of support and intervention for the student and communicates this outcome to parents/carers.

In some cases a referral to the Learning and Support Team may result in a referral to the school counsellor. In these cases, written permission will be sought from parents/carers. All referrals to the school counsellor are prioritised by the Learning and Support Team according to level of need at school. Following intervention by the school counsellor parents will be invited to discuss the outcome of this intervention with the counsellor and be provided, in many cases, with a written report.

Should there be a counsellor recommendation for further intervention through a non-DEC service provider (e.g. paediatrician) then this report may be used to provide information to inform additional assessment. The school counsellor, with parent/carer permission, will liaise with outside service providers, as required/requested.

As the school counsellor is employed by The Department of Education and Communities they work in response to referrals from the Learning and Support Team, and are not in a position to respond to requests for assessment from outside service providers. Parents/carers however, may feel free to discuss any issue affecting their child with the classroom teacher in order to determine whether a referral to the Learning and Support Team may be appropriate. The Learning and Support Team will then discuss what intervention is appropriate.

### 3. Requests for Information from non-DEC Service Providers

Parents may choose to independently seek intervention through a non-DEC service provider independent of a school referral to the Learning and Support Team. In some cases, outside professionals will then provide parents with questionnaires to hand to the class teacher, or may request other forms of information from the school. All such requests MUST be made through the principal.

Due to issues of privacy and confidentiality surrounding the release of information, in addition to considerations of teacher workload, parents/carers are kindly requested to ensure that the following protocols are observed:

- The service provider is requested to forward a letter addressed to the principal outlining what
  information and who is required to complete the information. When particular forms are
  required to be completed these need to be included in the letter of request and not handed
  to the classroom teacher
- The parent/legal carer must provide written permission for the release of information
- A return name and address of the service provider is required for confidential return of information through the principal
- All information exchanged will be in writing
- Please allow at least 2 to 4 weeks prior to a further appointment for information to be collected and sent

Note: Letters to service providers outlining the above protocols, together with permission to release information proformas are available from the front office. You are welcome to collect this package prior to your child's first appointment with an outside service provider
