PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

STUDENTS CONTACTING HOME DURING SCHOOL HOURS

Just recently there has been an increase in the numbers of students calling or texting home to ask parents to come and collect them from school because they are not feeling well. Parents are reminded that students' use of mobile phones is for outside school hours and if their child is feeling unwell they should come down to the front office and the office ladies will call home. Thus we can ensure that appropriate medical attention is provided if necessary and we are prepared for the parent to arrive and collect their child. This will happen seamlessly of course if the school is kept up to date with any changes to personal or home phone numbers.

MATHEMATICS CURRICULUM REVIEW

I recently interviewed over 45 students from a range of different classes and years as part of the Mathematics Curriculum Review. Last week I presented my findings to the Maths faculty and overall the response was very positive. Many of the students articulated the importance of the subject and recognised it was very challenging but acknowledged how important it was for them to do well in Maths. They believed their teachers worked them hard in Maths and many of them had a clear indication of how they were progressing and that their teachers encouraged them to do well.

Some of the challenges the Maths faculty now has is to try and make things like Pythagoras' Theorem and algebra relevant to the world of our adolescents. The students fully understand the value of learning about fractions and percentages and things around money management skills but still see little relevance in some of the more difficult concepts the subject covers.

STAFFING UPDATE

Next term we will have a new member of staff Ms Lauren Paa who will be filling the role of Student Support Officer. She will be part of Mr Barry's team who support students who are struggling and disengaged from school. Ms Paa will be working closely with Mr Hutton providing work experience options for a number of our Stage 5 students.

PISA 2012

Programme for International Student Assessment

PISA is coming to our school!

Our school has been chosen to represent Australia for the OECD Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA) which is taking place between 30th July and 7th September 2012. A random sample of 15-year-old students will be part of a once in a lifetime opportunity to represent Australia in education!

PISA is an international assessment, occurring every three years, which measures skills in mathematics, science, reading, problem solving and financial literacy at a point when students have almost finished their compulsory schooling. PISA helps to inform policy makers involved with education on how well schools are succeeding in helping students to acquire the skills and knowledge they will need to meet challenges beyond school.

Since the first PISA assessment in 2000, the survey has continued to raise interest amongst educators and policy-makers world-wide. In 2012, Australia will be one of almost 70 countries participating in PISA. More than 800 schools and over 15 000 students will represent our country in this important project.

PISA is part of the National Assessment Program in Australia. Participation in these sample assessments is an obligation for government schools under the National Education Agreement between the Commonwealth and the States and Territories, and an obligation for non-government schools under Commonwealth schools funding legislation and funding agreements for 2009-2012.

What will PISA mean for our school?

Twenty-five students who are randomly selected from our school will be sampled to complete a two-hour paper-based assessment consisting of mathematics, science, financial literacy and reading questions. These students will also be asked to complete a questionnaire.

After the paper-based assessment and questionnaire, a sub-sample of 20 students who participated in the paper-based assessment will also participate in a computer-based assessment of problem solving, mathematical literacy and reading literacy.
