OUR NEW DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Mrs Kamani Naicker will be relieving DP for the last 2 weeks of Term 2 with Mr Bredin on LSL and Ms Virginia Breen will be relieving HT Science. At the beginning of Term 3 Mr David Blench will relieve for Mr Bredin and Mr Tony Somerset will take over the reins of the PE faculty during this time. Mrs Maricic will be on LSL overseas for the first 2 weeks of Term 3 and Mrs Kuldip Khehra will relieve for her and Mr Chris Lloyd will take over the leadership of the Maths faculty in Mrs Khehra's absence.

CONSEQUENCES FOR INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOUR

It is important for me to remind parents that as part of our school <u>Welfare and Discipline Policy</u> we have a series of detentions that are attempts by the school to allow the students to reflect on their behaviour and accordingly address this behaviour. So students who come late to school without supporting justification from parents will be given a lunchtime detention. Similarly students who fail to adhere to our full school uniform expectations will also be placed on a lunchtime detention. Many faculties also have lunchtime detentions so the student can report back to the faculty and attempt to address the behaviour in a lesson which has impacted negatively on their learning and the learning of the rest of the class.

Students who fail to attend a detention, or who simply forget, are given another chance to redress this and are issued with a second detention. If they fail to attend the second detention, they will then be given an After School Detention (held on a Thursday afternoon from 3.15 to 4.15 in H8). If a student fails to attend an After School Detention without a satisfactory explanation, they will be issued another detention or it may be escalated to a Deputy Principal's Detention (held Tuesday afternoons in the front Admin Office). If a student fails again to follow these expected consequences, a caution to suspend, or a suspension may be imposed by a member of the Senior Executive.

This system of detentions is about the school working with our young people to address their behaviour and ensure everyone works within our SMART expectations, so that we can continue to be a caring educational community shaping a positive future.

UNIFORM

Unfortunately, some students are not adhering to the school uniform policy wearing unacceptable variations in order to 'keep warm'. It is at this point each year that it is necessary to point out that QHHS does have uniform provision for cold weather. Students have the option in choosing to wear the navy blue woollen jumper, the teal sloppy joe or the QHHS sports jacket. **Students are not to wear a long sleeve, coloured top underneath their school shirt**. Long pants are available and QHHS track pants are available for sport.

It is imperative that all students wear black **leather** upper school shoes that cover the whole foot in order to comply with WH&S regulations particularly in the Science and TAS labs. Canvas or fabric shoes do not comply with these regulations and therefore are not acceptable footwear for high school.

Also, students in Years 8 -10 are permitted to wear **the full QHHS sports uniform** on the one day they have timetabled sport only. This will only be scheduled on either a Monday or a Tuesday. Students are not to wear their school trousers as track pants.

The school uniform shop is open on Monday mornings 8:10am – 9:30am. If you are experiencing financial difficulty and you are unable to purchase uniform needs, please contact me so that we can discuss assistance.

HOMEWORK CLUB - NEED HELP GETTING ASSIGNMENTS DONE?

The QHHS Homework Club operates to support students who may require assistance with completing assignments, accessing computers/internet or studying for exams. The Homework Club is supervised by teachers who volunteer their time to help our students and it is held in the school library. The hours of operation are 3:10 – 4pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. SAFETY WHILE TRAVELLING TO SCHOOL

WAIT UNTIL THE BUS HAS GONE AND THEN CHOOSE A SAFE PLACE TO CROSS

Your child is most at risk in the minutes after getting off the bus. To reduce this risk you can:

- Meet your child AT the bus stop
- Wait until the bus has been driven away before choosing the safest place to cross the road, then follow the usual road crossing procedure:

STOP! One step back from the kerb.

LOOK! For traffic to your right, left and right again.

LISTEN! For the sounds of approaching traffic.

THINK! Whether it is safe to cross. Always look and listen for traffic as you cross the road.

 As a driver, remember: When the lights on the bus go 'Flash, flash', you must slow down to 40 km/h.

WEAR A HELMET AND RIDE IN A SAFE PLACE AWAY FROM THE ROAD

- Check that your child wears a bicycle helmet when playing or riding on wheels—bikes, scooters, skateboards or rollerblades. The helmet should be firmly buckled so it fits without wobbling or slipping to the sides. It must protect the forehead.
- Your child's helmet must comply with the Australian and New Zealand Standards (AS/NZ2063). It must be securely fitted and fastened on the rider's head.
- Although children quickly learn to pedal, steer and brake, they are not ready to ride with traffic

on the road.

- Children under 12 and those adults accompanying them may ride on the footpath unless there are signs specifically prohibiting cycling.
- When riding on the footpath, cyclists must keep to the left and give way to pedestrians. Children
 need to take special care at driveways as vehicles may be driving in or out. At intersections, children should dismount and wheel the bicycle across the road as a pedestrian, following the usual
 'STOP! LOOK! LISTEN! THINK! Procedure.
- Your child must wear a helmet when riding a bike in any public place—it's the law.

SAFETY AROUND SCHOOL CROSSINGS

- Ensure that your child always uses the school crossing—it is the safest point of entry to the school.
- Where there is an unsupervised children's crossing:
 - * Drivers must stop at the white line if pedestrians are waiting to cross or are crossing. Drivers must remain stationary until the crossing is completely clear of pedestrians.
 - * Drivers need to know that a children's crossing is a part-time crossing that operates before and after school hours, and at times when children are using the crossing, such as for excursions or during lunchtimes.
- The minimum penalty of a \$344 fine and the loss of 2 demerit points applies if you park or stop on or near:
 - A pedestrian crossing
 - A children's crossing
 - Any marked foot crossing
- The minimum penalty of a \$344 fine and the loss of 4 demerit points applies for failure to give way to a pedestrian.

IMPROVING LITERACY AND NUMERACY NATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

Quakers Hill High School has recently been included in the "Improving Literacy and Numeracy National Partnerships" initiative for 2013. The objective of this initiative is to improve the performance of students who are falling behind in literacy and/or numeracy, including targeted groups such as students from disadvantaged backgrounds and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. It is underpinned by a whole-school approach to improving student outcomes in literacy and numeracy and recognises the critical role of quality teaching.

With Literacy having been selected as our priority focus area and Year 8 being the nominated target group, Quakers Hill High School has established an Improving Literacy and Numeracy National Partnerships Team. The team comprises Mrs Gail Attwood (Coordinator), Ms Emily Gray, (English faculty), Ms Maria Romarosa (English faculty) and Mr Ben Dezman (Learning & Support Teacher).

The team will be working throughout the year to build classroom teacher capacity to improve outcomes in Literacy. With teaching strategies and resources currently being developed to address areas of deficit, teaching staff in all faculties will be provided with a variety of practical, professional learning opportunities which will assist with the embedding and consolidation of literacy skills in classroom instruction. Literacy resources developed this year will extend the impact of the initiative beyond the funded

2013 year, and beyond the current target group. As such, it is anticipated that all students in our school will ultimately benefit from our involvement in this exciting and inspiring opportunity.

FROM THE SCIENCE LABORATORY






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
